THE PUERTO RICAN

Lets consider that the people of Puerto Rico represent a cultural and racial mix. During the early 18-century, the Spaniard in order to populate the country took Taino Indian women as brides. Later on as labor was needed to maintain crops and build roads, African slaves were imported. Long after Spain had lost control of Puerto Rico, Spanish immigrants continued to arrive on the island. The most significant new immigrant population arrived in the 1960s, when thousands of Cubans fled from Fidel Castro's Communist state. The latest arrivals to Puerto Rico have come from the economically depressed Dominican Republic. This historic intermingling has resulted in a contemporary Puerto Rico without racial problems. So, Puerto Ricans do not think about racial problems any where they go.

Puerto Ricans are known for their friendliness and warmth. Hand gestures and movements are often used in daily conversation. Many Puerto Ricans will stand fairly close to one another in Social setting. Moving away from a counterpart may be considered offensive or insulting.

In relationships the Wife is "sacred", in the way that everyone has to respect her and behave well in front of her. The majority of the time, the only one that can dance with someone's wife is the husband. The same applies in premarriage relationships. Some exceptions apply when you have a very close and respectful friend; but not always. Puerto Ricans are very protective (extremely protective) with their family, much more with kids.

When it's time for party, regularly the music is loud and they love to dance Salsa, Merengue (originally from the Dominican Republic), Bachata and Reggaeton, as well as some other kinds of dancing. Old people also likes the "Danza" (Dance). When going partying everyone likes to wear the best in accordance with the occasion. Women uses make-up, almost anywhere they go, more for festivities.

As everybody, Puerto Ricans just look for happiness, friendship, and for people with high values that can understand that no one is better than another, that all are create equals.

Regardless the fact that Puerto Ricans are taught English as a second language, communicating in English occasionally can be a little difficult. Sometimes you will find yourself surrounded by Spanish speakers only. Please, understand that is their best way of communication and understanding. What language you will use in another country if it is an American group talking together? Perhaps, you will not have a better time to try learning some Spanish. So try it!

(Including Puerto Rico)



APRIL 1 April, Fools Day: Began in the 1500s when the Gregorian calendar took over from the Julian. Those who forgot to change and attempted to celebrate New Year's (previously celebrated on the 1st April) on the wrong day were teased as Aprils fools.



6 April: Good Friday- is a holy day observed by some Christians. Special prayer services are often held on this day with readings from the Gospel giving accounts of the events leading up to the crucifixion.



8 April: Eastern Day- Easter is a Christian Festival that celebrates the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. On the third day after Good Friday, mourners went to His tomb to collect His body. However, He was not there and they were greeted by an angel who said "He is Risen". (The

rabbit, representing the festivity, symbolized new life and rebirth in ancient Egypt).



13 April, Thomas Jefferson Birthday: Thomas Jefferson -- author of the Declaration of Independence and the Statute of Virginia for Religious Freedom, third president of the United States, and founder of the University of Virginia -- voiced the aspirations of a

new America as no other individual of his era. As public official. historian, philosopher, and plantation owner, he served his country for over five decades.



16 April: José De Diego (1866-1918) Born in Aguadilla, Puerto Rico. Studied law in Spain. He received his law degree and became a doctor of laws in 1892. During the brief interlude between the declaration of autonomy and the U.S. intervention of

Puerto Rico, Diego served as Sub-secretary of Justice and Interior, and then became a magistrate of the Territory of Puerto Rico. After annexation, he combined a brilliant literary career with public service. Diego became a member of the Chamber of Delegates (1903-1917) then Chamber of Representatives, representing the Unionist Party.

Holy Week in Puerto Rico



A generally somber atmosphere prevails during Holy Week (Semana Santa), from Palm Sunday to Easter, processions and pageants are held island wide. Most of Puerto Rico's celebrations are in a religious

vein. Off Holy Week, every town on the island has its "fiestas patronales" or patron saint festival. They regularly begin on a Friday, approximately 10 days before the date prescribed. Although services are held twice a day. In those "Fiestas Patronales" the atmosphere is more festive than religious. Music and dancing take place on the town plaza, and food stalls sell the greatest local specialties.
