by late July). SFPDs and WFPC broke out into work groups to discuss challenges that each sees as unique to their respective areas. This gave everyone a chance to network and share best practices as echoed by Maj. Gen. Ronald Young, Director of Manpower and Personnel, "My hope is that we are sharing best practices, creating educational opportunities, gaining expertise and sharing experiences with each other."

Army Family Action Plan takes place in Alexandria, VA

Representation from all states participated in this year's Army Family Action Plan (AFAP) Conference held at the Hilton Mark Center in Alexandria, VA the week of January 23rd to discuss family issues needing general officer level attention for resolution.

Participants worked in groups of about fifteen (including subject matter experts) to brainstorm and deliberate the Army's most important issues regarding Family Readiness. The work groups were: Employment/Volunteer, Entitlements, Family Support, Force Support I and II, Medical/Dental, and OCONUS. Fourteen National Guard volunteers participated in these working groups.

Each group came up with a number of issues and were able to come to agreement on one or two main issues the group would focus on to take to the final briefing to General Cody, Vice Chief of Staff of the Army, who presided over the AFAP. Issues were presented by a spokesperson for each group on January 27,2006.

Also in attendance was the AFAP Teen Panel celebrating its tenth year of participation at the AFAP. It put forward the issue of teen employment on bases. The OCONUS group involved teen issues putting forth the issue of post secondary visitation for OCONUS students.

Location, Location

Two key elements that must be taken into consideration during the training's planning phase are the facility and room layout. Typically we utilize a "training room" in an armory or the wing headquarters. I italicized training room because it is typically no more than a multipurpose room that is cluttered with remnants of past events and a climate control system that consists of opening and closing the windows in an attempt to turn on or off the thermostat.

Consider this scenario: John and Marsha Volunteer coordinated with the 131st Widget Company to conduct Operation Ready - Family Readiness Group Leader Training. They were assured that all necessary equipment to conduct the training would be available on site. Upon arrival they discovered that the screen the unit representative swore is always kept in the "training room" could not be located and the cable for the LCD projector was also missing. Additionally they discovered that the outlets in this older Armory did not accept a 3-prong plug.

According to The Complete Guide to Training Delivery, a Competency-based Approach, by Stephen B. King, Marsha King, and William J. Rothwell (AMACOM 2001), "Learning can be positively or negatively influenced by the design or location of a training environment. If learners are uncomfortable, have difficulty seeing or hearing, or are distracted by seating arrangements, then the probability of a successful training event is reduced. A poor physical facility can render your instruction ineffective even if you are an outstanding presenter."

Some of you are lucky enough to have access to a conference room at the wing or state headquarters. While these are usually excellent conference rooms their location adds a logistical challenge for many of your potential attendees. Plus there is always the possibility that the senior leadership may need the room for an emergency meeting.

One solution is to negotiate with local state colleges for classrooms. These resources are often free or at a reduced rate for the military. It also allows our volunteers to see the local colleges first hand as they may be considering going back to college or looking at colleges for their children to attend. College students exposed to your program could learn of the many benefits of being in the Guard. The

college staff will also have the opportunity to witness what we do and may even offer to volunteer their services for our program.

Using universities allows us to provide a professional training environment while building bridges to our community resources. As the great African-American writer and teacher Ralph Ellison once stated,

"Education is all a matter of building bridges"



The Guard Family Management System, a web based client tracking and reporting system, was introduced at the SFPD/WFPC Conference. The initial feedback we received was positive from those in attendance.

This tracking system will allow "real time" data to be entered and also add the ability for the National Guard Bureau (NGB) to "pull' data versus the "push' system that we currently use. The data will enable NGB, the states and territories as well as the unit and Wing Commanders the ability to analyze trends, forecast training needs and validate resource requirements.

During the final development stages of the system, your comments and suggestions are highly encouraged. We brought back many of your ideas (from the conference) to discuss with the contractor. This is the time to voice your thoughts on ways to improve or enhance the system. I look forward to hearing from you!

Lt. Gen. Clyde A. Vaughn commented, "The Family Program is essential to the strength of not only our Guard families but all families regardless of component, we need to make sure we're serving everyone, every time."

During the various breaks between briefings, SFPDs and WFPCs were able to get hands-on access to the new website set to be on-line in late July. Col. Baker, Chief of Family Programs commented, "Our aim with the new website was ease of use, functionality, and customizability. We want everyone in the service member's support circle to be able to use this resource easily."

Concurrent with the SFPD/WFPC Conference was the first State Youth Coordinator professional development seminar. Introduced during the seminar was the State Youth Coordinator Manual (draft), an on-line quarterly State Assessment, an excel budget worksheet for forecasting, and the new youth online community set to roll out in late July. Additional training included Diversity, Empowering Youth, Working Effectively with your SFPD/WFPC,

Counseling vs. Coordinating, Youth Camps, and the DDR Partnership. Kathy Goedde, Child and Youth Program Manager noted, "This time together allowed us the opportunity to focus on the challenge of meeting the social, emotional, and academic needs of all National Guard children and youth and all left encouraged to mobilize an army of volunteers and community resources to make it happen."

Military One Source

Military OneSource offers new online features this month!!

TurboTax services available! The Turbo-Tax® benefit has been activated and will remain accessible throughout the tax season. Federal and state tax returns can be quickly and easily completed using Turbo-Tax® Basic or 1040EZ (offered by Intuit). In order to access this service without fees, filers must access TurboTax® through the Military OneSource Web site. The online program allows filers to complete their taxes using a simple, step-by-step process that double-checks for errors and audit risks, and identifies deductions for specific tax returns. After taxes have been e-filed. filers will receive an IRS confirmation of receipt from TurboTax®. For assistance in taking advantage of TurboTax® e-filing at no cost and for additional financial resources, please call Military OneSource. If a service member requires additional assistance, Military OneSource will refer to the appropriate resources including the nearest installation.

New log-in process. Per direction of the Office of the Secretary of Defense, Military OneSource recently changed the login process. Instead of a generic user id and password, each participant must now create a personalized user id and password to gain full access to the site. Please note, creating a personalized User ID and Password will not require you to disclose personal information other than your Branch of service and Unit/Location. This change, called membership, will improve user access to the site as it is a fast and simple process. Military OneSource participants that have previously created a personalized account will continue to log on using their established personal identification and password.
