The Recovery Act (ARRA)

- The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA)
 - Preserve and create jobs
 - Promote economic recovery
 - Invest in transportation, environmental protection, and other infrastructure that will provide long-term economic benefits
 - Stabilize state and local government budgets and avoid reductions in essential services
 - Ensure that recovery spending is transparent and accountable



The Recovery Act & DOT

- The Recovery Act provided a total of \$48.1 billion to be administered by DOT
- "Transportation is the public face of the Recovery Act."

TIGER Discretionary Grants

The Department published a notice for the new \$1.5 billion TIGER Discretionary Grants program on Monday, May 18, 2009. The notice announces funding availability, project selection criteria, application requirements, and the deadline for submitting applications, which is September 15, 2009. Funds will be awarded competitively to State and local governments who submit applications for capital investments in surface transportation infrastructure, including highway or bridge projects, public transportation projects, passenger and freight rail, or port infrastructure investments. <u>View more information</u>.

Overview of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (Recovery Act) was signed into law by President Obama on February 17th, 2009. It is an unprecedented effort to jumpstart our economy, create or save millions of jobs, and put a down payment on addressing long-neglected challenges so our country can thrive in the 21st century. The Act is an extraordinary response to a crisis unlike any since the Great Depression, and includes measures to modernize our nation's infrastructure, enhance energy independence, expand educational opportunities, preserve and improve affordable health care, provide tax relief, and protect those in greatest need.

Implementing the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009

Transportation is a great enabler of economic growth, the lifeblood of commerce. It moves people to jobs and goods to the marketplace. Without strong transportation arteries, economies stagnate. We will use the transportation funding in the Act to

DOT Plans and Reports

The Recovery Act and related guidance include several provisions that require DOT to take steps beyond standard practice, including reporting, information collection, budget execution, risk management, and specific action related to award type.

DOT Reporting and Plans will include the following:

- Major Communications
- Formula Block Grant Allocation Reports
- <u>Weekly Updates</u> starting March 3rd; provides a breakdown of funding, major actions taken to date, and major planned actions
- Monthly Financial Reports starting May 8th; provides obligations, expenditures, and other financial data by Treasury Account, vendor, and award number, as well as information on allocations of mandatory and entitlement programs by State, county or other appropriate geographical unit
- Agency Transaction Data Feeds starting May 5th; provides all Recovery Act assistance transactions (primarily grants, loans, and loan guarantees)
- Agency Recovery Plan <u>HTML</u> | <u>PDF</u> <u>M</u> no later than May 15th; provides both broad recovery goals and the agency's coordinating efforts
- <u>Recovery Program Plans</u> no later than May 15th; provides a separate plan for each Recovery Act program named in the legislation

Customer Relations Management (CRM) Software

- RightNow Technologies
- SAAS (software as a service) or "hosted" product.
- Software product used to manage communications/questions/answers with your customers



CRM Workflow

- Link from your library's webpage to webform, FAQs, etc.
- Customer asks question through email or webform
- Agent/librarian logs into the software application, opens question, compiles answer/info for customer, then replies.



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Pros and Cons

- Keeps cost down
- Provides better service to customer and better control to library; Allows for detailed reporting on your activities, types of customers, and branches/divisions served.
- Can login from work or home securely
- FAQ database
- Smart Assist feature
- Learning curve
- Hidden costs depending on your situation



Recovery Act Customers and Questions

Recovery Act FAQ Library - Introduction

- Stakeholders looking for answers to urgent questions about ARRA funding, many questions not unique
- NTL had knowledgebase set up already in RightNow
- Modal administrations had FAQ's scattered all over
- RightNow Knowledgebase allowed storing and searching all FAQ's at the same site
- NTL required to respond to inquiries within 24 hours, needed streamlined processes



Creating FAQ's Customers Need

- Created basic FAQ right after ARRA passed, with links to DOT agencies, legislation, states, etc. in response to customer inquiries before TIGER Team initiated program
- Created other FAQ's based on mode-specific Q&A; checked for updates regularly
- Created FAQ's based on answers to our questions by specialists within DOT



Questions & Answers on American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) Issues Raised by State DOTs

Originally issued: 1/23/09 Latest Revision: 5/20/09 The dates of additions or updates to specific Questions and Answers are indicated with the individual questions.

Planning and Environment

Question PE-1: What should local agencies be doing to ensure their projects are "ready to go" as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA)?

Answer PE-1: In order for a surface transportation infrastructure project to advance for Federal funding, it must be included in the relevant metropolitan Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) or Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). Therefore, we strongly encourage you to reach out to your Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) or State Department of Transportation (State DOT) to begin work as soon as possible to ensure your projects are included in an approved TIP or STIP, so they are ready and available to advance upon the President signing economic recovery legislation. Please note that transit related projects should be coordinated with the relevant transit operating agency as well as relevant MPOs or State DOTs.

Question PE-2: Can the State and MPOs do public involvement; demonstrate fiscal constraint; determine conformity and other planning process steps that are needed for various scenarios prior to passage by Congress so MPOs can vote approval literally hours after the President signs the bill?

Answer PE-2: Yes, the State and the MPOs can do the necessary planning work such as model runs; analysis work needed for conformity, if necessary; and public involvement prior to the passage of the recovery bill by Congress. **This work should have already begun. If it has not, it should be started immediately.** These planning activities are eligible for SPR and PL funds. For purposes of fiscal constraint, it is reasonable to assume a doubling of Federal highway dollars based on last year's program size. Once the planning and necessary conformity work has been completed, the MPO policy boards and State DOTs may amend their plans, TIPs and STIPs even before the recovery bill is passed. FHWA, in coordination with FTA, can make any necessary conformity findings on the amended plans and TIPs, and approve the STIP amendment request prior to the bill's passage.

TIGER Team Reporting - Objectives

- Indicates volume of questions we answer and for which DOT agencies (FHWA, FRA, etc.)
- Shows who our customers are (specific government agencies)
- Shows what the hot issues are for a given week (top FAQ's)
- Based on the classifications given to each incident as it is resolved



Recovery Act Reporting: Daily

- Counts total questions answered in last 24 hours
- Report is run in RNT Analytics module, then data transferred to Excel spreadsheet



Recovery Act Reporting: Weekly Reports

- Graph showing weekly totals
- Summary of customer types including list of all federal/state/local governments that contacted us
- Summary of top FAQ's on the web site (ranked by usage)
- Top 3 FAQ's for the week (# times used by Reference team to answer questions)
- Number of e-mails vs phone calls
- Summary of subjects and number of questions handled for each administration
- 1-page report e-mailed to all TIGER Team members across the US DOT
