How to Share These Resources

As a first step, we encourage you to make enough copies of the Parent Guide and Student Guide for each family in your school. The guides should also be given to your principal and guidance/school counselor. Your principal may even be interested in making the copies for you. Be sure to add a customized cover to the guides that includes the name of your school, your PTA unit logo, or even the school mascot or logo. There may even be a local business or community organization interested and willing to help with the printing costs. You may want to consider putting an electronic copy of each guide and other resources on the computers in your school's library or media center.

Here are other ideas for sharing the resources in the toolkit with your school community:

- Choose one of the topics in the Parent Guide or Student Guide for discussion at PTA meetings throughout the year.
- Encourage parents, teachers, students, and guidance counselors to use the resources during parent-teacher conferences, discussions about course selections, and while exploring options for summer jobs or internships.
- Make copies of the resources available at college and job fairs for youth.
- Ask school staff to display posters and other information in highly visible locations throughout the school, including hallways, the cafeteria, counseling centers, and career preparation classrooms.
