**NOTICE OF A COMMISSION DETERMINATION NOT TO REVIEW AN
INITIAL DETERMINATION TERMINATING THE INVESTIGATION AS TO
CERTAIN CLAIMS**

ACTION: Notice

SUMMARY: Notice is hereby given that the U.S. International Trade Commission has determined not to review an initial determination (“ID”) (Order No. 13) of the presiding administrative law judge (“ALJ”) terminating in part the above-captioned investigation under section 337 of the Tariff Act of 1930 (19 U.S.C. § 1337) based on the withdrawal of certain claims.

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION: The Commission instituted this investigation on December 31, 2007, based on a complaint filed on November 21, 2007, by Trend Micro Incorporated (“Trend Micro”) of Cupertino, California. 72 Fed. Reg. 74329-30. The complaint alleges violations of section 337 in the importation into the United States, the sale for importation, and the sale within the United States after importation of certain systems for

detecting and removing viruses or worms, components thereof, and products containing same by reason of infringement of claims 2 and 4-22 of U.S. Patent No. 5,623,600 (“the ‘600 patent”). The complaint named three respondents: Barracuda Networks, Inc. of Campbell, CA (“Barracuda”); Panda Software International S.L. of Spain; and Panda Distribution, Inc. of Glendale, CA (collectively “Panda”). The complaint further alleged that an industry in the United States exists as required by subsection (a)(2) of section 337.

On March 14, 2008, the Commission issued notice of its determination not to review an ID granting Trend Micro’s and Panda’s joint motion to terminate the investigation as to Panda on the basis of a settlement agreement.

On June 10, 2008, Trend Micro filed a motion to terminate the investigation in part as to Barracuda on the basis of withdrawal of claims 2, 5-8, 12, 16-17, 20, and 22 of the ‘600 patent.

The ALJ issued the subject ID on June 18, 2008, granting the motion for termination in part. No party petitioned for review of the ID pursuant to 19 C.F.R. § 210.43(a), and the Commission found no basis for ordering a review on its own initiative pursuant to 19 C.F.R. § 210.44. The Commission has determined not to review the ID.

The authority for the Commission’s determination is contained in section 337 of the Tariff Act of 1930, as amended (19 U.S.C. § 1337), and in sections 210.21(a) and 210.42(h)(3) of the Commission’s Rules of Practice and Procedure (19 C.F.R. §§ 210.21(a), 210.42(h)(3)).
