SECTION 1. Subchapter I, Chapter 545, Transportation Code, is amended by adding Section 545.428 as follows: Sec. 545.428. VULNERABLE ROAD USERS.

(c) Provides that the safe distance at which an operator of a motor vehicle passing a vulnerable road user operating on a highway or street is required to pass the vulnerable road user, when road conditions allow, is at least three feet if the operator's vehicle is a passenger car or light truck or six feet if the operator's vehicle is a truck other than a light truck or a commercial motor vehicle.

- (c) Provides that the operator of a motor vehicle passing a vulnerable road user operating on a highway or street is presumed to have failed to comply with the requirement that the operator pass the vulnerable road user at a safe distance if the distance between the operator's vehicle and the vulnerable road user is less than three feet if the operator's vehicle is a passenger car or light truck or six feet if the operator's vehicle is a truck other than a light truck or a commercial motor vehicle.

- (h) Prohibits a person from opening the door on the side of a vehicle that is adjacent to moving traffic unless it is reasonably safe to open the door without interfering with the movement of traffic, including vulnerable road users and prohibits a person from leaving a door open on the side of a vehicle that is adjacent to moving traffic for a period longer than necessary to load or unload passengers or goods.
- (i) Prohibits a person from harassing, taunting, or throwing an object or liquid at or in the direction of any

IN RE: SB488 by Ellis (Relating to the operation of a motor vehicle in the vicinity of a vulnerable road user; providing penalties.), Conference Committee Report

No significant fiscal implication to the State is anticipated.

The bill would create as an offense certain actions of a driver of a motor vehicle in the vicinity of a vulnerable road user. Depending on various criteria, the punishment would be either a fine of between \$1 and \$200; a misdemeanor punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500; or a Class B misdemeanor, which is punishable by a fine not to exceed \$2,000, confinement in jail for a term not to exceed 180 days, or both such fine and confinement.

Costs associated with enforcement, prosecution, and punishment are not anticipated to have a significant fiscal impact. Revenue gain from fines would vary depending on the number of offenses prosecuted and the amount of fine imposed.

No significant fiscal implication to units of local government is anticipated.
