A Laundry List of Rule Changes

June 1999 to April 2001

icensees haven't heard much from the Board in the last year and a half - except for those who received a CE audit letter, and some of those may wish they hadn't. A few people who think that their copy of the new rules must have gotten lost in the mail have called to check on the last publication date. However, the new issue of the rules which accompanies this newsletter is the first one printed since June 1999. (If you are interested in rule changes as they occur, new rules are posted at www.ecptote.state.tx.us shortly after they are adopted.)

We hope to make up for our absence with this Spring 2001 mailing. Board and staff have worked hard in the last year or so to reorganize the administrative rules and procedures of the PT and OT Boards, so that the Executive Council of PT & OT Examiners can function efficiently for both boards. Some of the effort – intellectual and fiscal – is being directed toward a remodeled database, but

much of the reorganization energy has been focused on rewriting rules and procedures and fitting the right staff in the right positions. We are not through with the process, but the March 2001 issue of the rules reflects the fact that the Board has completed the major rulemaking chores required by the reorganization.

The rules that have been amended, adopted, or repealed as of the January 2001 Board meeting are included in the March 2001 rules, with a memo listing the rules affected. The full text of the rules doesn't appear in the newsletter. What follows is a summary of the changes made to each rule since July 1999.

Chapter 321. Definitions
Definitions were added for "boardapproved entity," "jurisprudence
exam," and "endorsement."

Chapter 322. Practice
This chapter, which was created in

Facility Registration Update

PT Facilities Currently Registered - 1,349

The Executive Council has been registering PT and OT facilities for over five years now, and most licensees know that working in a facility which should be registered, but is not, can cause serious problems – usually, license suspension for licensees working in that facility, with the potential for monetary fines for facility owners (and licensees working there) as well.

But I Thought It was Registered...

Good intentions don't outweigh the fact that a facility that should be registered isn't, or that a facility's registration has expired. The people who ultimately care whether a clinic is registered or renews on time are the licensees who work there, since they are the ones who always pay the price. Whether you are the "Therapist in Charge" or not, your license is on the line, so keep track of your facility's registration expiration date!

Which Facilities are Exempt?

Sometimes facilities are unregistered because they are exempt by law – if you look at §347.6, Exemptions to Registration,

censees are responsible for limiting the number of assistive personnel they supervise to the number they can supervise competently.

Which is the Right Path for You?

Taking Time Out from Active Licensure in Texas

re you faced with Practice Status Interruptus? In other words, are you leaving Texas? Taking time off for fulltime parenthood? Whatever your reasons for taking your license off the wall, don't let it lapse unless you understand the consequences. The PT Practice Act clearly



states that the Board can't renew your license if it has been expired for more than one year, and that to get licensed again requires taking the national exam to prove you still know your stuff. Few people want to go this route. However, there are two clear options (besides simply keeping your license current) for those who are putting practice in Texas on hold.

Expiration & Restoration

If you are licensed and actively practicing in another state, you may wonder whether you need to keep your Texas license current. The answer is, probably not — depending on how long you work outside of Texas. There is one exception to the law that says the Board cannot renew your license if it has been expired for more than one year, and that's for folks like you. If you hold and have held a license in another state and have been in active practice there for at least two years, you are eligible to "restore" your Texas license. Although the Board at one time allowed expired licensees working in other states to apply by endorsement, this is no longer possible. Please consult §341.6 for all of the details.

Going Inactive

Putting your license on inactive status is the *only* option for those who will not maintain active licensure in some state continuously. If you want to go inactive, call the Board when you get your next renewal application, since that is when you can make this choice. The requirements for this status have evolved in recent years; the CE requirements are now the same as for someone with an active license. It is not an escape route for people who are lacking CE, since you cannot go inactive unless you have the required CE. The primary advantage is financial, since the inactive fees are less than active renewal fees – although the Board has adopted an inactive renewal fee, which should take affect in September. If you are considering going inactive, please read §341.8 in the new rules carefully, and, if you have any questions, contact the Board before you send in your renewal application. **b**

Chapter 323. Powers and Duties of the Board

The Board amended §323.1, Types of Examinations, to reflect changes to the exam process over the last few years.

Chapter 325. Organization of the Board

The Board amended §325.7, Board Member Terms, to eliminate language which reflected the temporary process used to create staggered terms for board members.

Chapter 329. Licensing Procedure

Professional Responsibility, Professional Judgment –

A Note from the Chair Cynthia Fisher, PT, MS

"Your *Professional Responsibility* is to practice in compliance with the provisions of the Practice Act and Board Rules. These documents set the minimum standards, in most cases, of acceptable practice. Not all practice scenarios or environments are addressed by rule. Your *Professional Judgment* should be your guide when you apply these statutes and rules to your specific circumstances."

These words have been in the newsletter before, and if you graduated from a Texas PT or PTA program in the last few years, you may have seen them as part of a presentation by Board staff during a visit to your graduating class. Sometimes I think we should require licensees to have a "Professional Responsibility/Professional Judgment" sign hanging in their facility along with the Consumer Information sign that's required by rule.

If the Board did require licensees to display the Professional Responsibility/Professional Judgment sign, it wouldn't be for the patients' benefit. It would be for the PTs and PTAs treating them – especially for licensees who wonder why the Board doesn't define how many miles or how many minutes away a supervising PT can be and still be considered "readily available." It would be for PTs and PTAs who wish the Board would set a limit on how many aides they can supervise. It would be for licensees who have a hard time standing up to an employer or director or patient family member who insists that the licensee continue to provide services to a patient who isn't progressing, and who should graduate to restorative care. It would even be for PTs and PTAs who ask how many days they have to wait to start dating a patient they just discharged!

eople ask board members and staff questions like these for different reasons. Sometimes they don't want to think a question through themselves – or they've called for a quick settlement of an argument they are having with another PT. Sometimes they simply lack confidence in their own judgment. Sometimes they can't figure out where their copy of the rules is. (By the way, did you know that you can download a new copy from the board's website?) Whatever the reason, when they call, many are surprised to be told that there is no pat answer to some of the most common questions. So their next question is usually about why the Board doesn't answer those questions in the rules. If these are such common questions, wouldn't it be more efficient, more convenient for everyone, to just put the answers in the rules? This is where the new Professional Responsibility/Professional Judgment sign comes in.

What is professional responsibility, exactly? You could say it's part of the privilege and burden of professional licensure. Being licensed means that you are authorized to offer services that other, non-licensed people can-

The law clearly states that you have to have a certain education, a certain exam score, and so on to be allowed to call yourself a PT or a PTA. That means that in a room full of nurses, occupational therapists, massage therapists, or athletic trainers, no one but you can legally offer, provide, or get paid for providing, "physical therapy." That's the privilege of licensure, to have a range of services that no one else can provide, to be able to use a title that no one else can use.

eing a licensed professional means that you are held to certain standards. You are expected to provide services for the good of the patient, not just for your own good or profit. You have promised to follow the rules established by the Board. You have accepted Professional Responsibility for your decisions and actions. When the Board added a requirement for two hours of continuing education in ethics and professional responsibility last year, it was in recognition of

the fact that the rules do not and cannot contain all of the answers to the practical and ethical questions and dilemmas licensees face every day. To write specific rules for each licensee in each situation would be impossible - each rule would have to reflect the condition of the pa-

These are the tools that you use to assess aspects of the situation, which might include the condition of a patient, the skill level of your licensed or unlicensed

Can an MD or a DC do the same treatments and modalities

as a PT? The Board gets many calls from licensees who don't realize that modalities and treatments are not restricted to the Physical Therapy profession. The distinction is that no one but a PT or PTA may advertise, bill or call the services they provide "physical therapy".

Q & A Can I accept a referral from a Physician's Assistant or a Nurse

Practitioner? You may accept an order from any practitioner authorized by law to prescribe treatment. The referring practitioner must be licensed by a state board, but not necessarily by a Texas licensing board. This includes PAs and Advanced Practice Nurses (APNs).

The text of the Practice Act changed during the 1999 Legislative session, but the intent did not. PAs and APNs may still refer for treatment. (see §322.1)



EXPIRED LICENSES

The Board is just completing its third random audit of continuing education (CE) compliance. The process has highlighted several recurring problems which can be avoided easily by licensees who plan ahead. We are listing them here so that you may benefit from someone else's experience!

Counting your CEUs before they hatch

Back in the day of sending CE in with your renewal application, you had to finish the CE before you sent in your renewal. You couldn't renew without completing the CE. Now you can – all you have to do is sign the renewal form and send it in. This means that some people sign the form before the CE is complete, before it is approved, or before they have even signed up to take the course. Most do so with the best intentions, but unfortunately, that's not enough. Read the form that you are signing – you are attesting that you have completed the requirements. If the course is

cancelled, if it isn't approved by TPTA, if you are unable to take the course due to unforeseen twists of fate – none of these things justify having submitted your renewal before your CEUs are 'hatched". Our suggestion is don't mail the form *until* you have done everything you need to do.

Submitting your CEUS before they are approved

The Board still allows you to get a CE course approved after you have taken it, so long as it is approved before your license expires. What this means, though, is that you are responsible for making sure that it gets approved before your license expiration date. A common problem we see in the audit is that peo-



ple don't check TPTA's list of approved courses before they take a class. (The list is available online at www.tpta.org.) When it's time to submit the renewal, suddenly they are having to learn the hard way how to get a course approved - a time consuming process which requires assistance from the course sponsor. On the other hand, some folks don't think to check the approval status before they renew; the audit letter is the first thing that makes them even consider the approval status. At that point, it can be just a little too late. Think ahead. b

Who Files Complaints & How to Do It

The Board fields complaints from all different directions. There are complaints from patients or their family members. There are "inhouse" complaints, the kind where board staff realize that a licensee is working with an expired license, or where the CE audit turns up someone who didn't really have the number of CEUs they claimed. Another source of complaints is other state, federal or local agencies who discover a violation of the PT Practice Act in the course of investigating some other bad behavior.

But in large part, the Board relies on complaints filed by its own licensees. When licensees become aware of serious practice violations, they often call the Board to discuss the problem with an investigator. Sometimes a concerned licensee finds that they have been overly strict in their interpretation of the rules, but most often, they wind up filing a formal complaint based on their discussion with staff.

If you ever feel the prickles of suspicion on the back of your neck, and are almost certain that you are aware of a violation, we urge you to call the Board and ask to speak to an investigator. The investigator can quickly determine whether your concern is justified, based on the language in the Act and rules.

The next step is to decide whether the knowledge you have is enough to act on. This usually means that there must be some hard evidence, not just a hunch or hearsay, since the Board must have evidence of wrongdoing to take disciplinary action. However, even if you do not have that evidence in hand, what you know may highlight a situation that requires attention.

An investigator giving it that attention may turn up the evidence to base disciplinary action on. An-

inally, remember this: if you have evidence or knowledge of wrongdoing – whether it's harming a patient directly, or practicing without a license – and you do nothing to stop it, you are condoning it. Condoning a violation is in the list of detrimental practices in the PT rules, so be aware that doing nothing isn't the safest path at all. If you need more information on how to make a complaint, call the Board and ask to speak to an investigator. b

other thing the investigator will do is help you determine the best way to submit your complaint.

revised since the last printing, although most of the changes were non-substantive, meaning what applicants or licensees have to do or submit hasn't changed appreciably. The goal was two-fold: update

the description of licensure procedures so that they clearly and accurately described processes which have evolved over the years, and make the process for OT and PT licensure as administratively similar as possible. Both boards benefited from the review process, and many



of the small but confusing details of licensed life are now the same for PTs and OTs. For example, changes to §329.1, General Licensure Requirements and Procedures, include a longer grace period for notifying the Board of an address change – you now have 30 days to notify us instead of 10. Content has also been amended in §329.5, Licensing Procedures for Foreign-trained Applicants, where the changes include recognition of CAPTE accreditation of foreign PT programs, and changes to English language proficiency requirements. All of the sections have been rewritten and reorganized. Even though you may already have your Texas license, please review the entire chapter to refresh your memory – if nothing else, it will prepare you for your next go-round with the "open-book" jurisprudence exam.

Chapter 341. License Renewal

n short, a big part of being a professional is that you are expected to apply your own "gray matter" to the "gray areas" in the Act and rules, as well as in life. If the Board could come up with a hard-and-fast answer for most of the questions licensees ask, you would be incredibly limited professionally, since you wouldn't have to think about anything at all - and wouldn't be allowed to, either. No decisions, no judgment, just a whole lot of looking things up in the rules. To keep this from happening to the PT profession in Texas, the Board tries diligently to make rules which give you a framework for decision making, and to leave many decisions for you and before you frustratedly flip the



coin to reach a decision, call, email or write the Board. Board staff are available to assist you in working through the cloud of uncertainty. If need be, they will make sure that the Board addresses your question in the most appropriate way. Ultimately, your question may wind up on a board meeting agenda. If the Board can't answer your question based on the rules as they exist, it may have to propose a new rule, or rule amendment. After all, change is the only certain thing, and the rules are often a little behind the crest of a new wave. b

Q & A Say the PT or PTA treats the patient in the morning. Does the PT or PTA have to interact with the patient during the time the aide carries out the identical treatment in the afternoon?

YES. The PT or PTA must interact with the patient DURING EACH treatment session. This requirement is not based on the nature of the treatment.



Q & A Who is held responsible when physical therapy is provided in a nonexempt facility with an expired registration, or no registration at all?

Any PT or PTA who works in that facility, as well as the owner of the facility, and the "Therapist In Charge" if the facility registration is expired. The Board historically suspends the licenses of all licensees who work at the

(Facility Registration Update, continued from page 1) several specific practice settings are named – home health and educational institutions (colleges, universities, school). That rule also points you to the Texas Health and Safety Code for other exempt facilities, such as hospitals, nursing homes, etc. If a facility is *licensed* (not Medicare "certified") under Title 4, Subtitle B of the Health and Safety Code, it does not have to register as a PT facility.

At one time there was some confusion about how to determine whether a facility is exempt from registration

The people who ultimately care whether a clinic is registered or renews on time are the licensees who work there, since they are the ones who always pay the price.

with this Board. If you are unsure whether your facility is exempt, call the state agency responsible for licensing your "type" of facility. (Look on the back page of this newsletter for phone numbers.) You can also find out more by going to the websites for the Texas Department of Health, (http://www.tdh.state. tx.us/license.htm), and the Texas Department of Human Services (http://www.dhs.state.tx.us/ programs/Itc/certification.html). Both of these sites are excellent sources of information, with the types of facilities licensed by either agency clearly listed. A recent addition to the TDH site is a list of hospitals licensed by the agency, including satellite facilities covered by that license number. If you cannot find your facility, or facility "type" listed at one of those websites, your facility probably needs to be on our list.

Who Must Register?

Ok, so if you are not an exempt facility, what are you? You are any location where physical therapy takes place. You could be:

n an outpatient clinic that offers physical therapy only;

n a work hardening facility with a PT and a chiropractor;

n a CORF (comprehensive outpatient rehabilitation facility) with PT, OT and SLP;

n a physician's office where a PT works;

n a gym where a PT hangs a shingle;

n a public pool where a PT or PTA does aqua therapy, or a private ranch where a PT offers hippotherapy:

n an industrial site where a PT sets up shop to

provide services to the employees...or any number of other places or kinds of facilities where physical therapy is practiced. PTs (and PTAs) are constantly coming up with new ideas. If you don't know what you are, you are welcome to call the Facilities Department and ask for help.

Getting Registered...

Registering your facility is easy – call us (512/305-6900) or email us (*info@ecptote.state.tx.us*) to request an application. If you have more than one location, you will need an application for your primary facility, and addendum applications for your additional facilities. The fee is \$300 for the first facility, and \$100 for each additional facility with the same owner/ownership group. If a PT facility is registered, and OT services are offered at the same location, the OT facility may request a fee waiver when it registers or renews – contact the Facilities Department or go to *www.ecptote.state.tx.us* for more information. But don't forget – both PT and OT must be registered, and each must have its certificate displayed, fee or no fee.

... And Staying Registered

Last but not least – some facility information has to be updated when changes occur, or at time of renewal. Check Chapter 347 for the details, but the Board sets strict requirements for reporting changes in the Therapist in Charge, for example. And don't forget – a facility's registration must be renewed annually. If the issuance date on your facility's registration certificate is more than a year ago, you should have a renewal certificate posted along side the original certificate. If you don't, you could be working in an unregistered (expired) facility. **b**

processes are now very similar, with the exception of Continuing Education (CE) procedures and requirements. PTs and PTAs will find that §341.1, Requirements for Renewal, §341.6, License Restoration, and §341.8, Inactive Status, may need careful review before the next license renewal date. Please take the time to look over the entire chapter, as all licensees are affected by these particular rules! b
