

Texas Board of Nursing Bulletin

The mission of the Board of Nurse Examiners for the State of Texas is to protect and promote the welfare of the people of Texas by ensuring that each person holding a license as a nurse in the State of Texas is competent to practice safely. The Board fulfills its mission through the regulation of the practice of nursing and the approval of nursing education programs. This mission, derived from the Nursing Practice Act, supersedes the interest of any individual, the nursing profession, or any special interest group.



Sunset Commission Recommendations Move Forward Through Passage of House Bill 2426

House Bill (HB) 2426, sponsored by Representative Vicki Truitt, and its companion, Senate Bill (SB) 907 by Senator Bob Deuell, carried the BNE Sunset Commission recommendations. HB 2426 advanced through the Texas Legislature. Governor Rick Perry signed HB 2426 into law on June 15, 2007.

Changes resulting from passage of HB 2426 become effective September 1, 2007 unless otherwise noted. Changes that amend the Nursing Practice Act (NPA) are contained in Texas Occupations Code Chapters 301, 303, 304, and 305. The following list summarizes the impact of HB 2426:

- Extends the operation of the agency until 2017;
- Changes the name of the agency from the Board of Nurse Examiners to the Texas Board of Nursing (TBON);
- Requires the board, in conjunction with the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board and the Texas Workforce Commission, to establish criteria for initial approval of schools of nursing and educational programs that eliminate overlapping processes.
- Diploma programs in Texas (leading to initial licensure as a RN) completed on or after December 31, 2014 must entitle a licensure candidate to receive a degree upon the student's successful completion of the remaining requirements for a degree program attended through a public or private institution of higher education. The educational institution must be accredited by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.
- Adds a new mandate that future nurses, as part of initial licensure, must pass a jurisprudence exam (regarding

the laws in the NPA and Board Rules that regulate the education and practice of nursing in Texas). This requirement takes effect on or after September 1, 2008;

• Establishes the Advanced Practice Nurse Compact (multi-state recognition) in Texas. The APN Compact is contained in Chapter 305 of the NPA, and must be implemented no later than December 31, 2011.

Additional impacts of HB 2426 on board operations include requirements with regard to:

- Board selection of one or more national nursing accrediting agencies recognized by the United States Department of Education to accredit schools of nursing education programs;
- Consequences to licensure for different types of criminal convictions or deferred adjudications must be explained through guidelines and/or rule amendments;
- Expands the mandatory reporting of a nurse whose practice is impaired or suspected of being impaired through reason of chemical dependency, mental illness, or diminished mental capacity. If a nurse's conduct that is subject to reporting falls into one of the above

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Coming Soon: Advanced Practice Nursing Certification Audit

Advanced practice nurses who completed their programs on or after January 1, 1996 must be certified in the advanced role and specialty that is congruent with their advanced practice nursing education. Certain categories of advanced practice nurses who completed their advanced practice nursing education programs prior to that date are also required to maintain national certification. In order to maintain authorization to practice as an advanced practice nurse, Rule 221.8(a)(1) requires these advanced practice nurses to maintain that national certification.

In the near future, the board will conduct an audit of advanced practice nurses to determine whether they have, in fact, maintained the appropriate national certification as required by current rule. Advanced practice nurses may wish to verify that their certification documents are in order. Certification documents should **not** be sent to the board office until further instructions are provided. Additional information and instructions regarding the audit will be mailed to advanced practice nurses; therefore, they may wish to ensure that their current address is on file with the board office.

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Anita Palmer Resigns from Board

Anita Palmer, who served as a Consumer Member of the Board of Nurse Examiners (BNE) since her appointment to the Board by Governor Rick Perry on March 22, 2004, resigned from her position effective April 24, 2007. Prior to serving on the BNE, Ms. Palmer served as a Consumer Member for the Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners (BVNE). During her combined eight-year tenure on the BNE and BVNE, Ms. Palmer reflected that she witnessed advancement of the profession of nursing. Ms. Palmer's perspective as a consumer member of the board helped provide balance and insight into nursing issues.



Provider Self-Reporting Guidance issued by Office of Inspector General

The Texas Health and Human Services Commission, Office of Inspector General (OIG), has posted industry-requested guidance on its web site to enable and encourage health care providers to voluntarily report and resolve matters involving possible inappropriate payments under Medicaid and other state-administered programs. While the OIG cannot make firm commitments as to how a particular self-report will be resolved, it is generally accepted that making full disclosure at an early stage will allow the provider to work with the OIG toward a better result for the provider than if the OIG were to discover the matter independently. Potential benefits may include quicker resolution of the issues and the possibility of avoiding or decreasing the amount of costs and administrative penalties. The Board of Nurse Examiners for the State of Texas

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Summary of Actions

A Regular meeting of the Board of Nurse Examiners was held April 19-20, 2007, in Austin. The following is a summary of Board actions taken during this meeting.



The Board of Nurse Examiners (BNE) adopted amendments to §214.10, pertaining to management of clinical learning experiences and resources in <u>Vocational Nursing Education</u> and §215.10 relating to <u>Professional Nursing Education</u> which address faculty-to-student ratios in clinical settings in professional nursing education programs. The adopted amendments were proposed and published in the March 9, 2007 issue of the *Texas Register*. Comments to the proposed amendments received were in

support of the rule. Effective date for both rule changes was May 2, 2007.

The Board of Nurse Examiners adopted amendments to §§216.1, 216.3, 216.4, 216.9 and 216.11, relating to Continuing Education. The proposed amendments were published in the May 4, 2007, issue of the Texas Register (32 TexReg 2452). Effective January 1, 2007, the contact hour for continuing education was changed from a 50-minute contact hour to a 60-minute contact hour. This change was

implemented by American Nurses Credentialing Center's Commission on Accreditation. The amendments to \$216.1(8) and \$216.4(1) implement this change. The amendment to \$216.3 updates the CE requirements by deleting the requirement for RNs to take a CE course relating to Hepatitis C (\$216.3(4)) that expired on June 1, 2004. The amendments to \$216.9 and \$216.11

Prescription Pain Medication Usage by the Practicing Nurse

The following questions and answers relate to the use of prescription pain medications by practicing nurses. Board staff frequently receive inquiries from nurses who, because of physical ailments or injuries, must take prescription pain medications.



Should the nurse tell an employer he or she is taking prescription pain medication(s)?

Though not required, staff recommend that a nurse inform his/her employer if the nurse is taking prescription pain medication(s) because it assures protection of patients [Board of Nurse Examiners (BNE) Rule 217.11(1)(B)] and is consistent with behaviors expected of nurses under BNE Rule 213.27 relating to Good Professional Character. However, nothing in the Nursing Practice Act (NPA) requires a nurse to reveal this information to an employer.

Should the nurse continue working if he or she is using a chronic pain medication?

"It depends"---this is up to the nurse and the nurse's treating physician. Short-term or long-term, the effect of any given pain medication (narcotic or not) on a person's ability to function and make correct judgments will vary from person-to-person. With long-term use of a pain medication, the nurse may develop "tolerance" as the body adapts to the presence of the medication and they may not experience common side effects such as lethargy, impaired judgment, and slower response times. Modern pain management has also resulted in better treatment options such as extended-release formulations of pain medications that release small amounts of medication into the body over several hours at a consistent dosage. This produces pain relief at doses that avoid many of the unwanted side effects noted above.

The nurse should discuss with his/her physician the capacity to return to or remain at work. Factors such as the specific demands of the practice setting, the nurse's experience and familiarity in the practice setting, as well as the physician's determination of the nurse's ability to practice safely in a specific setting must be considered. This could include an evaluation by a pain management specialist to evaluate the nurse with regard to possible tolerance, physical dependence, or addiction.

Staff suggest a nurse taking pain medications inform his/her nurse manager to assist in monitoring the practice of the nurse taking chronic pain medication. A nurse manager can determine whether or not changes in assignments (i.e., projects requiring non-direct patient care) are possible/advisable initially or when changes in drugs/dosages are made by the ordering practitioner. This promotes patient safety, meets needs of a facility, and allows a nurse to remain employed. If a nurse believes he/she is impaired by the medication, the nurse should not engage in clinical practice until the impairment is resolved.

Are there certain types of medications that a nurse should not use while working?

The BNE does not prohibit any specific prescription medications obtained by valid prescription. Of course alcohol or illegal substances such as marijuana, amphetamines, or cocaine ingested when a nurse is on-duty or on-call subject to duty would be unprofessional conduct under BNE Rule 217.12(1)(E) and (5). Impaired practice would likely also be considered unprofessional conduct to include 217.12(1)(B) and (4) as well.

Presence of certain prescription drugs in urine or blood drug screens without a valid prescription may result in employment action as well as in the nurse being reported to the Board. Drugs that cause central nervous system depression (CNS depressants), including controlled substances, are among drugs that would be cause for concern if found in specimens from a nurse while on duty or subject to call, regardless of whether or not the nurse exhibited impaired behavior.

What happens if a complaint is registered about a nurse who is using a prescription pain medication? What would be the procedure for investigating this complaint?

Nothing in the NPA and agency rules and regulations precludes a nurse from taking prescription pain medications and practicing. However, if a complaint is received which alleges conduct in violation of the NPA or board rules, the complaint is investigated by the BNE. Specific procedures vary depending upon the case. General processes for disposition of complaints are explained in the NPA and Board Rules.

What happens if a medication error is committed by a nurse who is using the medication?

If a medication error is the result of a possible violation of the NPA or BNE rules, then this error must be reviewed by a peer review committee and/or reported to the BNE for investigation. However, if the error has not contributed to a patient's death or serious injury, is not criminal conduct as defined in Texas Occupation Code in 301.4535 or is not a violation of the BNE's Unprofessional Conduct Rule 217.12 and the nurse's conduct and continued practice does not indicate a risk of harm to clients or others, the medical error may be considered a minor incident. Rule 217.16 Minor Incident outlines actions that employers may take to monitor and remediate the nurse involved in the error.

When does a nurse cross the line between using and abusing pain medication, and who makes this decision?

This is a judgment that should be made by qualified medical practitioners. As mentioned above, this could include an evaluation by a pain management specialist or other qualified practitioner to evaluate the nurse with regard to possible tolerance, physical dependence, or addiction issues. If a nurse is reported to the Board for practice-related errors and an investigation by the Board reveals the chronic pain medication issue, the Board has the authority to request a forensic psychiatric evaluation with pain management and/or chemical dependency components. This would have to be performed by a board-approved and properly credentialed evaluator, with pain management and/or chemical dependency credentials. This evaluation, which the nurse must pay for him/herself, is to gain the professional opinion of the psychiatrist or other appropriate evaluator regarding the nurse's abilities to practice nursing in compliance with the NPA and board rules. See BNE Rule 213.29(c)(1).

Applications for initial licensure and licensure renewal all contain certain "eligibility" questions relating to conditions or actions that, if applicable to the nurse, must be answered on the renewal application every biennium. BNE Rule 213.29(b) establishes diagnoses that must be disclosed on forms of the Board. The actual forms can be viewed on the BNE web page (www.bne.state.tx.us) under "Forms."

Criminal activity by a nurse in relation to drugs or other substances may also impact the ability of the nurse to continue to practice. See BNE Rule 213.28. Staff also recommend review of the Board's Disciplinary Sanction Policies on Chemical Dependency; Fraud; Theft and Deception; and Lying and Falsification on the Board's web page, as these documents explain extensively the Board's perspective on these types of behaviors.

Could a nurse's license be in jeopardy if he or she uses an opiate-based prescription pain medication while working, even if the use is for a legitimate pain concern?

If there is alleged practice impairment secondary to taking an opioid medication while on duty or subject to call, the burden is on the nurse to demonstrate there is no impairment as a result of taking an opioid medication. Each case must be investigated and evaluated by the Board on a case-by-case basis. See NPA Sections 301.452(b) and 301.401. Also see BNE Rules 217.11, Standards of Nursing Practice, and 217.12, Unprofessional Conduct.

A task group has been formed at the National Council of State Boards of Nursing, Inc. (NCSBN) to study regulatory guidelines relating to nurses taking prescription pain medications. The Texas Board of Nurse Examiners will review recommendations prepared by the NCSBN task group when the group completes its work.

Coming in October: Update on 80th Texas Legislative Session

The October 2007 *Bulletin* will feature a summary of bills enacted during the last Texas Legislative Session. The Board of Nurse Examiners (BNE) watched more than 300 bills during the session. At the end, only a small number of bills were enacted which will affect the Nursing Practice Act (NPA). **House Bill 2426**, the Sunset Bill for the BNE, impacted the NPA more than any other bill passed this session (See related article on page 1).

Senate Bill (SB) 993, by Senator Jane Nelson, addressed nursing peer review. A task force under Texas Nurses Association initiated the bill language in an effort to implement recommendations that came out of the first two Institute of Medicine (IOM) reports: TO ERR IS HUMAN (2000) and KEEPING PATIENT SAFE: Transforming the Work Environment of Nurses (2003). These reports advocated shifting from "cultures of blame" to "cultures of safety" in order to create systems that both diminish the likelihood of an error occurring and promote "catching" of errors before they reach the patient. In order to accomplish the goal of improved patient safety, the IOM determined that practitioners needed to be able to report their own errors without fear of punishment, especially when systems factors beyond the nurse's control contributed to the error. One provision of SB 993 requires a peer review committee that determines there may be systems factors involved in a reported deficiency of a nurse's care to report the incident(s) to a facility's Patient Safety Committee. In the absence of a patient safety committee, the peer review committee would be required to report their findings to the Chief Nursing Officer (CNO). However, neither a Patient Safety Committee nor CNO would impact the peer review committee's determination with regard to reporting or not reporting the nurse to the Board.

SB 993 also increases the civil remedies available to a nurse who is retaliated against for advocating for his/her patients, including invoking Safe Harbor. The bill language also adds the civil remedies contained in NPA 301.413 to sections 301.352 and 303.005; these sections address the nurse's duty to refuse to engage in conduct that could jeopardize patient safety as well as to request review of the assignment by a peer review committee.

House Bill (HB) 8, by Representative Debbie Riddle, added "continuous sexual abuse of a child or children under Section 210.02 Penal Code" to the list of 17 crimes located in NPA section 301.4535. Crimes listed in this section of the NPA mandate that the Board must suspend, revoke, or refuse to license a person commits any of the listed crimes.

Nurses Offer Feedback on Proposed Nursing Work Hours Position Statement

The Board of Nurse Examiners voted to send proposed Position Statement 15.26, Nursing Work Hours, back to the Nursing Practice Advisory Committee (NPAC) for further discussion and revision during its April 19-20, 2007, meeting. In October 2006, the Board charged NPAC to develop a position statement to highlight the emerging research that

correlates increased work hours with increased incidence of nursing errors. The Institute of Medicine (IOM) maintains that nursing work hours should be limited to 12.5 hours/day, 60 hours/week, and no more than 3 consecutive 12-hour shifts. The draft position statement (published in the January 2007 BNE *Bulletin*) proposed the same time frames, as research to date indicates patient safety diminishes when a nurse works beyond these limits. The Board delayed taking action on the

proposed position statement in January so that consideration of feedback from nurses and the public could be considered.

The Board received 11,785 individual responses to the online survey (see Figure 1 on following page), approximately 200 additional written comments, and verbal input from nurses and nursing representatives at a public hearing held April 18, 2007 in Austin regarding nursing work hour limitations. Over 95% of the responses felt that regulatory limits on nursing work hours should not be imposed by the BNE, while 88% felt that employers should not limit work hours as outlined in the proposed position statement.




Figure 2 - Reasons Respondents Disagreed with Proposed Position Statement

The reasons why nurses disagreed with the recommended work hour limitations were divided into 5 categories: Staffing Issues, Right to Work, Physical Requirements, Family Obligations, and Financial Hardship (fig. 2). Comments on *staffing issues* related primarily to special staffing plans that

have evolved to meet needs for nursing coverage while also appealing to nurses for the flexibility and financial incentives offered. For example, practice areas such as surgery, cath labs, and flight nursing may offer 24-hour work/on-call schedules where staff may have "down-time" or rest periods during a 24-hr. period.

Nurses submitting *Right to Work* comments believed that no one has a right to place any kind of limit on the amount of hours a nurse works, even if the nurse works full-time 12-hour days at one job and full-time 12-hour nights at another job, with rotating and/or overlapping shifts on the same day. Comments that fell into the *Physical Requirements* category were mainly

from night nurses. These nurses felt it was more disruptive to restful sleep patterns and biorhythms to have frequent breaks in their work week (e.g., 2 nights on and 1 night off, 3 nights on and 2 nights off, etc.). They felt they functioned better on and off the job, and had higher job satisfaction when they could self-schedule to work longer stretches, such as 5 days on and 5 days off. Comments noting *family obligations* such as work schedules that do not conflict with child care needs and *financial hardships* such as the need to work extra shifts to supplement income were also submitted.

The majority of nurses who spoke at the public hearing on April 18, 2007 felt that limiting nursing work hours would worsen the nursing shortage due to limiting income and decreasing flexibility in scheduling. These nurses also felt strongly that increased nursing salaries, better nurse-patient ratios, and better working conditions would alleviate the nursing shortage. These nursing issues are not unique to Texas.

The BNE does not regulate employment issues or facilities, thus these issues are all outside of the Board's jurisdiction. Even the agencies that do regulate different types of practice settings cannot establish rules that mandate nurse-patient ratios, or employment issues such as salaries, benefits, and working conditions, unless they are directed to do so by the State Legislature. Staff would also like to emphasize that Board Position Statements and Guidelines are not state laws or agency rules. Position statements, guidelines, and other board

documents are intended to offer guidance to nurses in how to determine their individual scopes of practice, and how to determine what "best practice" is for given situations. Did you know....

Q: Does the BNE require all nurses (LVNs, RNs, and APNs) to have a current CPR card?

A: No. Maintaining a current CPR card may be a requirement of a nurse's employer and/or an accrediting agency such as the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO). Depending upon the nurse's practice setting, competency to perform CPR may also be a skill a nurse chooses to maintain to help assure the nurse's ability to comply with standards in rule 217.11, specifically standards (1)(B) ...maintain a safe environment for the patient..., and (1)(M) ...implement measures to stabilize a client and prevent complications." Additionally, CPR cannot be counted toward meeting a nurse's continuing education (CE) credit requirements for licensure renewal [see Rule 216.6(1)].

address the updated process the Board utilizes to ensure that licensees comply with the CE requirements. In the past, the staff would randomly audit licensees to determine whether they had complied, and if they did not provide the evidence, an investigation was opened in enforcement. The new process requires audited licensees to prove compliance with CE requisites prior to renewal, and if the proof is not forthcoming, the licensee's license is not renewed (new amendment to §216.11.) No comments were received regarding adoption of the amendments and the effective date for changes to §216 was June 26, 2007.

SUSIE MARIE RODRIGUEZ CAMPOS

Susie Marie Rodriguez Campos secured employment as a Graduate Vocational Nurse (GVN) with a Correctional Facility in Johnson County, Texas, on August 28, 2000. After failing the licensure examination (LVN) twice, she continued her employment and used the title "nurse" after her name, in addition to titles "Jail Nurse" and "Medical Coordinator." From November 2, 2000, through April 2007, while employed with the facility, Ms. Rodriguez Campos practiced vocational nursing without a license. The case was referred to the Johnson County Attorney's Office.



TOMMY CARTER

Tommy Carter secured employment with a long term care facility in Houston, Texas, on December 13, 2004. Mr. Carter was terminated on December 13, 2004 after the facility attempted to verify his license to practice vocational nursing. The only Tommy Carter they found on the Board web site had been delinquent for over four years. The complaint indicated that Tommy Carter represents himself as an LVN and carries a badge that has LVN after his name. The investigation revealed that the Impostor is attempting to use on-line verification of our licensee; however the social security number and date of birth do not match. A case was referred to the Harris County Attorney's office in 2004.

BETTY ANNETTE RHOADES

Betty Annette Rhoades submitted an "Application by NCLEX-PN Examination for Licensed Vocational Nurses" to the Board office on February 27, 2006. Ms. Rhoades was issued a temporary license on July 28, 2006 which expired on October 11, 2006. Ms. Rhoades tested on August 3, 2006 and failed the exam. Ms. Rhoades then submitted a 2nd Application for Licensure by Examination" on August 23, 2006. She took the licensure examination again on September 28, 2006 and failed. The initial Application included an Affidavit of Graduation for Graduates of Texas Approved Vocational Nursing Programs which was signed by an individual who is not an employee of the college and not authorized to sign the document. The case was referred to the Travis County District Attorney's Office.



BRIDGETT PHANA HODGE (KING)

Bridgett Phana Hodge (King) submitted an application for employment as a LVN on May 2, 2007 to a long term care facility in Kilgore, Texas. Ms. Hodge (King) included a copy of an on-line verification record for a Graduate Vocational Nurse (GVN) Permit with an expiration date of September 1, 2007. Pursuant to Board records, Ms. Hodge (King) was issued a GVN Permit on August 16, 2006 with an expiration date of October 30, 2006. Ms. Hodge (King) took the licensing examination on August 23, 2006 and failed. As of this date, Ms. Hodge (King) has not applied to re-test. The case was referred to the Gregg County District Attorney's Office.



CORY J. WADE

Cory J. Wade submitted a resume to a facility in Richardson, Texas, in response to an advertisement in the paper for an LVN. The resume includes a coverletter where Mr. Wade signs LVN, MA after his name. He indicates that he graduated from an LVN Nursing Program, Carroll Tech Institute, Carrollton, GA, in 1993. The Practice Manager from the facility received the resume and noticed a discrepancy in the education credentials because she was also from GA; they use LPN not LVN. The Practice Manager went on line to the Georgia Board of Nursing in an attempt to verify licensure and could not find a license for Mr. Wade. She then tried the Texas web site and was unsuccessful. She contacted the Texas Board and faxed copies of the information. Mr. Wade spoke to BNE staff and admitted that he was not an LVN and had misrepresented his qualifications on his resume.

Patient Safety with Verbal Orders



Verbal and telephone orders are one of the major problem prone areas of nursing and healthcare, with reported errors that have lead to patient harm and even death. Concern for patient safety is such that one of the National Patient Safety Goals - 2007 for the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO) includes the following goal relating to verbal orders:

"For verbal or telephone orders or for telephonic reporting of critical test results, verify the complete order or test result by having the person receiving the information record and "read-back" the complete order or test result. [Ambulatory, Assisted Living, Behavioral Health Care, Critical Access Hospital, Disease-Specific Care, Home Care, Hospital, Lab, Long Term Care, Office-Based Surgeryl'

The National Coordinating Council for Medication Error Reporting and Prevention [http://www.nccmerp.org] developed the following recommendations to help prevent errors when taking verbal or telephone orders cannot be avoided:

Recommendations to Reduce Medication Errors Associated with Verbal Medication Orders and Prescriptions

Confusion over the similarity of drug names accounts for approximately 25% of all reports to the USP Medication Errors Reporting (MER) Program. To reduce confusion pertaining to verbal orders and to further support the Council's mission to minimize medication errors, the following recommendations have been developed. In these recommendations, verbal orders are prescriptions or medication orders that are communicated as oral, spoken communications between senders and receivers face to face, by telephone, or by other auditory device.

Recommendations

Verbal communication of prescription or medication orders should be limited to urgent situations where immediate written or electronic communication is not feasible.

Health care organizations* should establish policies and procedures that:

- Describe limitations or prohibitions on use of verbal orders
- Provide a mechanism to ensure validity/authenticity of the prescriber
- List the elements required for inclusion in a complete verbal order
- Describe situations in which verbal orders may be used
- List and define the individuals who may send and receive verbal orders
- Provide guidelines for clear and effective communication of verbal orders.

Leaders of health care organizations should promote a culture in which it is acceptable, and strongly encouraged, for staff to question prescribers when there are any questions or disagreements about verbal orders. Questions about verbal orders should be resolved prior to the preparation, or dispensing, or administration of the medication. Verbal orders for antineoplastic agents should NOT be permitted under any circumstances. These medications are not administered in emergency or urgent situations, and they have a narrow margin of safety. Elements that should be included in a verbal order include:

- Name of patient
- Age and weight of patient, when appropriate
- Drug name
- Dosage form (e.g., tablets, capsules, inhalants)
- Exact strength or concentration
- Dose, frequency, and route
- Quantity and/or duration
- Purpose or indication (unless disclosure is considered inappropriate by the prescriber)
- Specific instructions for use
- Name of prescriber, and telephone number when appropriate
- Name of individual transmitting the order, if different from the prescriber.

The content of verbal orders should be clearly communicated.

The name of the drug should be confirmed by any of the following:

- Spelling
- Providing both the brand and generic names of the medication
- Providing the indication for use
- In order to avoid confusion with spoken numbers, a dose such as 50 mg should be dictated as "fifty
- milligrams...five zero milligrams" to distinguish from "fifteen milligrams...one five milligrams."
- In order to avoid confusion with drug name modifiers, such as prefixes and suffixes, additional spelling-assistance methods should be used (i.e., S as in Sam, X as in x-ray).
- Instructions for use should be provided without abbreviations. For example, "Itab tid" should be communicated as "Take/give one tablet three times daily."
- Whenever possible, the receiver of the order should write down the complete order to enter it into a computer, then **read** it back, and receive confirmation from the individual who gave the order or test result. All verbal orders should be reduced immediately to writing and signed by the individual receiving the order. Verbal orders should be documented in the patient's medical record, reviewed, and countersigned by the prescriber as soon as possible.
- Health care organizations include community pharmacies, physicians' offices, hospitals, nursing homes, home care

agencies, etc.

Nurses are also encouraged to check with the nursing organizations that represent their specific area of practice, as professional organizations may also have additional guidance statements that are more restrictive and/or prescriptive than the general recommendations listed above.

impairment categories <u>and</u> the nurse is believed to have committed practice violations, then the person or entity, including Texas Peer Assistance Program for Nurses, whose duty it is to report a nurse, must report the nurse to the board. The board will then determine an appropriate course of action. In making its decision, the board must balance the need to protect the public and the need to ensure the impaired nurse seeks treatment. This amendment to the NPA does **not** preclude a nurse from self-referring him/herself to TPAPN, as long as a practice violation is not at issue.

- Board rules must spell out the processes and functions of Board standing advisory committees (Education, Practice, and Advanced Practice);
- Amends grounds for removal of board members and clarification of board member per diem travel expenses;

- Policies must be developed and implemented that encourage the use of negotiated rule making procedures and alternative dispute resolution;
- Required collaboration with the Texas Health Care Policy Council and the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to implement a plan for the creation of innovative nursing education models that promote increased enrollment in the state's nursing programs.
- Statutory references to the BNE are revised to reflect the agency's name change to the Texas Board of Nursing.
