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The mission of the Texas Board of Nursing is to protect and promote the welfare of the people of Texas by ensuring that each person holding a license as a nurse in the State of Texas is competent to practice safely. The Board fulfills its mission through the regulation of the practice of nursing and the approval of nursing education programs. This mission, derived from the Nursing Practice Act, supersedes the interest of any individual, the nursing profession, or any special interest group.



Ask the webmaster@bon.state.tx.us

Have you contacted the Texas Board of Nursing (BON) recently? Did you contact the BON by phone? You may have had to wait to talk with a Customer Service Representative. The number of phone calls received by the agency increased approximately 22% in the past year. Last year, the BON received 267,401 phone inquiries, as compared to the 219,438 calls received in 2006.

An alternative to using the BON's phone system for inquiries is to use the agency's primary e-mail address, webmaster@bon.state.tx.us. The BON webmaster e-mail address responds to all types of questions or inquiries. Staff members in the Operations Department route all e-mail inquiries addressed to the webmaster to the appropriate staff person or department for response.

All departments at the BON receive and respond to webmaster inquiries. *Customer Support* and *Licensing* receive the largest number of webmaster inquiries per week. Nurses or applicants for nurse licensure frequently inquire about the status of their applications for licensure, authorization to take the NCLEX[®] examination, renewal status or whether a change of name or address has been processed. Staff in these departments frequently receive these types of questions and most inquiries of this type are responded to within 24 hours.

Other inquiries received through the webmaster include questions relating to nursing practice or education. These are responded to by the Nursing Department. Nursing practice and education consultants respond to a wide variety of questions which are often specific to the practice or education setting of the person making the inquiry. The Nursing Department responds to questions relating to advanced practice nursing or the status of applications for advanced practice approval. Inquiries related to BON workshops, and the *Board of Nursing* Bulletin are responded to by the Nursing Department.

The administrative staff for the *En*forcement Department receive the webmaster inquiries relating to investigation of nurses and candidates for nurse licensure who had incidents identified on criminal background screening checks done through the Department of Public Safety and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. They respond to inquiries related to investigations of nurses related to complaints received by the BON. The Board is limited in the information it can provide while cases are under investigation or are under review.

The Administration/Legal Department responds to webmaster inquiries related to agreed orders, administrative law hearings and legislative inquiries. Questions to the webmaster should always include the name, license number, and phone number of the person making the inquiry in case BON staff have additional questions or need additional information in order to respond to the inquiry. BON staff recommend that the Frequently Asked Questions Section of the BON web site (http:// www.bon.state.tx.us/olv/faqslicensing.html) be consulted prior to making an inquiry to the webmaster, since in many instances, the answers can be found here without having to wait for a return email or phone call.

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National Council of State Boards of Nursing Elects Kathy Thomas as Director at Large

The NCSBN Delegate Assembly met in Memphis, Tennessee, August 5-8, 2008, for their annual meeting. In addition to conducting its regular business, the delegates elected board members to serve NCSBN during the next two years. Ms. Thomas has served as the NCSBN Representative to the Advanced Practice Registered Nurse (APRN) Joint Dialogue Group since 2007. She was previously the chair of the NCSBN Nursing Practice and Education Committee from 1999-2001, served on the NCSBN APRN Advisory Committee from 1995-2007, and NCSBN



task force studying the Feasibility of Developing a Core Competency Examination for Nurse Practitioners from 1993 to 1995. She has also met with states considering adoption of the Nurse Licensure Compact offering insights on how the Texas Board adapted its operations in response to passage of Compact legislation in the year 2000.

Ms. Thomas joined the Texas Board of Nurse Examiners in 1989. She became Executive Director in 1995. She has been in this position through the transition of the agency to the Texas Board of Nursing in February, 2004. 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Summary of Actions



A Regular meeting of the Board of Nursing was held July 17-18, 2008, in Austin. The following is a summary of Board actions taken during this meeting.



The BON also proposed amendments to 22 Texas Administrative Code §§214.1 -214.13, concerning Vocational Nursing Education and 22 Texas Administrative Code §§215.1 - 215.13, concerning Professional Nursing Education. At the July 2006 Board meeting, the Board issued a charge to the Advisory Committee on Education (ACE) to review rule language regarding clarity and consistency between Chapters 214 and 215. ACE addressed this charge during the June 13, 2008 meeting in Austin and continued the process during the June 24. 2008 telephonic conference. The proposed amendments to Chapters 214 and 215, through reorganization, rephrasing, addition and deletion of language to provide clarity for the intent of the rules, demonstrate consistency between the rules, and describe the processes that actually occur. Additional non-substantive changes were made throughout Chapters 214 and 215 for the purposes of correcting spelling/grammatical errors and providing correct numbering of items. No comments were received on the proposed amendments to Chapters 214 and 215, and the amended chapters become effective October 19, 2008.

The BON proposed an amendment to 22 Texas Administrative Code §217.17, concerning the Texas Nursing Jurisprudence Exam (NJE). The proposed amendment is necessary to implement recommendations made by the Sunset Advisory Commission. House Bill 2426, enacted during the 80th Regular Texas Legislative Session, in part enacted the requirement for the exam in the Nursing Practice Act (NPA), adding language to §301.252 which requires the BON to adopt a rule regarding the development of the examination, applicable fees, administration of the examination, reexamination procedures, grading procedures, and notice of results. This requirement affects applications received after September 1, 2008, from candidates for initial licensure by examination and those seeking to endorse their nursing licenses to Texas. Since the initial adoption of §217.17 in November 2007, board staff have continued to work out the details of development and administration of the NJE. In doing so, staff determined that the original rule language required revision in order to accurately reflect the processes now being put into place for this new examination. No comments were received on the proposed amendment to §217.17, and the amended rule becomes effective October 19, 2008.

The BON proposed amendments to 22 Texas Administrative Code §221.4 and §221.6 and the repeal of §221.5, concerning Advanced Practice Nurses. The proposed amendments and repeal are necessary for the purpose of aligning 22 TAC Chapter 221 with Chapter 305 of the Nursing Practice Act (the Advanced Practice Registered Nurse (APRN) Compact) and national standards. At its October 2007 meeting, the Board charged the Advanced Practice Nursing Advisory Committee (APNAC) with reviewing Rule 221 and discussing issues related to recognition of advanced practice nurses in preparation for implementation of the APRN Compact. As part of its discussion, the Board directed the APNAC to examine two specific issues.

First, the issue of whether Texas should begin referring to nurses in advanced practice as APRNs rather than as APNs (advanced practice nurses). APRN is the term utilized in the compact language, and the term clearly identifies the licensee as both an advanced practice nurse and a registered nurse. It was the consensus of the APNAC to recommend that the Board begin using APRN in order to be consistent with Chapter 305 of the Nursing Practice Act. The other issue the Board directed the APNAC to discuss is whether it would be in the best

interest of the public to refer to authorization to practice as licensure rather than continuing to refer to advanced practice approval as an authorization that is linked to registered nurse (RN) licensure. The process used to review and approve applicants as advanced practice nurses is a licensure process, even though it is not presently called a license. Calling the approval a license will not change the advanced practice nurse's scope of practice in any way. The APRN's scope of practice will remain as set forth in current laws and regulations. The Board utilizes a licensure process because it believes advanced practice nursing has evolved as a result of the complexity of services provided and the level of knowledge, skills, and competence required by individuals who provide such care. The services provided by APRNs exceed the scope of practice of RNs. Therefore, the potential for harm to the public is significantly greater for APRNs than for RNs, and a higher level of accountability is necessary.

The Board's approval process ensures public protection through activities that include but are not limited to a detailed review of the individual's advanced practice nursing educational preparation related to the specialty for which he/ she is seeking approval, verification of current RN licensure, and verification of appropriate national certification in the role and specialty that is congruent with the advanced practice nursing education. At least 50% of boards that are members of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN) already refer to their approval process for nurse anesthetists, nurse-midwives and nurse practitioners as licensure. Nearly 40% also license clinical nurse specialists (NCSBN Member Board Profiles, data last updated January 22, 2008). Typically, licensure is considered the preferred method of regulation when the regulated activities are complex, requiring specialized knowl-edge, skills, and decision-making.

Licensure in any profession is required when the potential for greater risk of harm to the public exists and the professional must be held to the highest level of accountability. Another key element of licensure is a unique and identifiable scope of practice. APRNs

Educators Explore Innovations in Nursing Education at BON Workshop

More than 200 nursing educators from around the state converged at the Capital Annex in Austin on September 25, 2008, to attend a workshop hosted by the Texas Board of Nursing (BON). Subject areas discussed included: Innovative Faculty Models, Misconceptions Preventing Innovation, the Nursing Education Capacity Summit, and What's Happening That's Innovative in Nursing Education Throughout Texas. Speakers included: BON board members and staff; Nancy Spector, National Council



of State Boards of Nursing; Alexia Green, PhD, RN, Dean and Professor, Texas Tech Health Sciences Center's Anita Thigpen Perry School of Nursing; Clair Jordan, MSN, RN, Executive Director, Texas Nurses' Association; Bertha Almendarez, PhD, RN, Chairperson, Nurse Education, Del Mar College; Beth Mancini, RN, PhD, CNA, FAAN, Associate Dean, Undergraduate Programs and Acting Director, BSN Program, School of Nursing, University of Texas at Arlington and Glenda Walker, DSN, RN, Director, School of Nursing, Stephen F. Austin State University.

are engaged in activities that may include providing medical aspects of care in collaboration with a delegating physician. The knowledge, skills and abilities required to provide advanced practice nursing care significantly exceed those acquired through entry-level nursing education programs that prepare individuals as RNs. Likewise, their scope of practice goes well beyond that of the RN and cannot be performed without completing an advanced practice nursing educational program. Therefore, the Board has established the minimum qualifications necessary for safe and competent practice, and applications for licensure are reviewed to determine that all qualifications have been met. Calling the approval a license is not intended to replace RN licensure; rather, it will assist the public by providing greater clarity in identifying those RNs who are eligible to practice as APRNs in this state. The public is familiar with the concept of licensure for LVNs and RNs, and this change would reinforce to the public that APRNs complete formal education beyond the RN level and must meet certain criteria to practice at the advanced practice level. The APNAC recommends that the Board consider using the term licensure to describe the advanced practice recognition process.

One of the biggest changes recommended by the APNAC is to eliminate provisional authorization to practice for new graduates. The public, employers, and legislators have relayed to staff that the concept of provisional authorization is confusing. Eliminating this level will help to eliminate the confusion associated with it. Additionally, all certifying examinations are available via computer testing methods, allowing applicants to test quickly after graduation. Based on data from the NCSBN, graduates who delay taking VN or RN licensure examinations after graduation are less likely to be successful. It is reasonable to consider that this same concept is applicable to APRNs and certification examinations. In order to allow adequate time for test results to be received, the APNAC also recommends changing the interim approval period to 120 days from the current 90. Comments were received on the proposed amendments to Chapter 221, and the Board of Nursing will discuss the comments at the regularly scheduled meeting of the Board on October 23-24, 2008.

The BON proposed an amendment to 22 Texas Administrative Code §223.1, concerning <u>Fees</u>. The proposed amendment sets a "not to exceed" fee for the jurisprudence exam. The jurisprudence exam was developed in-house by Board staff and a private consulting firm, the iBridge Group. The Board staff anticipates that the Board will be able to absorb all developmental and maintenance costs at this time but would like the option to charge of fee if it is deemed necessary at a later date. The Board staff will evaluate the costs of the jurisprudence examination on March 1, 2009 and again on August 31, 2009. No comments were received on the proposed amendment to §223.1, and the amended rule becomes effective October 19, 2008.

BON Receives Grant for Criminal Background Screening of New Nursing Students

The Texas Board of Nursing (BON) was awarded a \$50,000.00 grant from the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN) for criminal background screening of new nursing students to take place when students are first enrolled or are planning to enroll in approved Texas nursing educational programs. Under the grant, BON criminal background screenings for nursing students will take place beginning October, 2008.

Early criminal background checks are needed for several reasons. A student's criminal background may be an impediment to their clinical experiences based on facility requirements. Early criminal history screening also helps to avoid needless use of nursing educational resources when the graduating student would not qualify for licensure due to criminal history. Students currently self-disclose their criminal history to the schools. Texas laws do not permit complete access to criminal history information for nursing educational programs prior to student exposure to clinical settings. State law permits nursing educational programs access to student criminal history background information for law enforcement and employment purposes only. The Texas Board of Nursing has the authority to conduct FBI criminal background checks on all of its applicants for licensure according to Texas Occupations Code § 301.1615, and Texas Government Code §§ 411.087 and 411.125. The NCSBN grant enables the agency to conduct early criminal background screening as the agency is currently only funded to conduct background checks prior to graduation from a nursing program.

The BON currently conducts more than 13,000 background screenings of nursing graduates per year. In Fiscal Year 2007 (September 1, 2006 to August 31, 2007), the Board conducted 8,343 criminal background checks on registered nurse (RN) students and 4,963 vocational nurse (VN) students. Of those checks, the Board experienced a 12.27% criminal history rate for RN students and a 18.43% criminal history rate for VN students, which produced an additional 1,332 licensure eligibility issues requiring investigation by Board staff. During the same time period, 17,836 students were enrolled in approved RN educational programs and 5,867 students were enrolled in approved VN educational programs.

The BON will evaluate the effectiveness of the early criminal background screening at the end of the grant funding period in August 2009. The BON is seeking legislative funding to continue early criminal background screening for nursing students in fiscal years 2010 and 2011. The grant funds two staff positions for one year to assist with conducting the background checks.

BON Online Jurisprudence Exam Prep Course Now Available to Assist Exam Takers

The Texas Board of Nursing (BON), in collaboration with the e-learning development company Enspire Learning, has completed the web-based prep course for nurses required to take the jurisprudence exam. This course is available to any nurse or applicant for nurse licensure. Section 301.252 of the Nursing Practice Act (NPA), enacted during the 80th Texas Legislature (HB 2426 - Truitt) requires all nurses seeking licensure, by examination or endorsement, to achieve a passing score on a jurisprudence examination prior to obtaining licensure. BON Rule 217.17 was adopted on November 15, 2007 to implement the jurisprudence exam requirement. Completion of the exam

prep course is recommended, but not mandatory, for nurses needing help in preparing for the exam. Currently licensed nurses are exempt from the jurisprudence exam requirement. The BON began administering the 50question jurisprudence exam to candidates for licensure in September 2008. Exam takers may reference the Board's Rules and Regulations and NPA while taking the exam. The exam is accessed through the BON web site.

Content for the Jurisprudence Exam Prep Course addresses five major topic areas: Nursing Licensure and Regulation in Texas; Nursing Ethics; Nursing Practice; Nursing Peer Review; and Disciplinary Action. When Does a Nurse's Duty to a Patient Begin?



A nurse's duty to his/her patient(s) is a frequent topic of emails and phone calls to Board of Nursing (BON) staff. A nurse's duty is **not** defined by any single event such as clocking in or taking a report. From a BON standpoint, the focus is on the relationship and responsibility of the nurse to the patient(s), not to the nurse's employer or employment.

Employment versus Licensure

One example of an issue that frequently arises is a nurse who notifies his/her employer that he/she is quitting a job at the end of an assigned shift. Some nurses in this position have relayed to BON staff that the employer "said they would report me to the Board for patient abandonment." Board Position Statement 15.6 Board Rules Associated with Alleged Patient Abandonment explains that typically this is an employment (not licensure) issue when a nurse decides to quit his/her job, with or without notice, provided the nurse does not have responsibility for patients at the time. If the employer has a policy that "requires a two-week notice," this is an employment issue but not a violation of the Nursing Practice Act (NPA) or board rules. In other words, the BON would not take action on a nurse's license just because the nurse guit his/ her job without notice at the end of a shift. It should also be noted that Rule 217.12(12) regarding leaving a nursing assignment does **not** apply to the situation in which the nurse completes his/her scheduled shift, and then turns in notification of job resignation.

A Nurse's Duty: Not Limited to Assignment

All nurses, regardless of practice setting or position title/role, are required to adhere to the NPA and other statutes, as well as the board rules. Two of the main rules that relate to nursing practice are Rules 217.11 *Standards of Nursing Practice*, and 217.12 *Unprofessional Conduct*. The standard that serves as the foundation for all other standards is rule 217.11(1)(B)

"...maintain a safe environment for clients and others." This standard supersedes any physician order, facility policy, or administrative directive. The concept of the nurse's duty to maintain client safety also serves as the basis for behavior that could be considered unprofessional conduct by a nurse.

Position Statement 15.14 *Duty of a Nurse in Any Setting* explains the nurse's duty that was established by a landmark case, *Lunsford v. Board of Nurse Examiners*, 648 S.W. 2d 391 (Tex. App. -- Austin 1983) **www.bon.state.tx.us/ practice/position.html#15.14**. As the case of Lunsford points out, when a nurse knows, or should have known that a situation potentially places a patient at risk of harm, the nurse has a duty to intervene. The nurse's knowledge based on educational preparation, experience, and licensure as a nurse establishes that the nurse understands the minimum standards of care and has the ability and duty to recognize potentially harmful situations for the patient.

This is why the nurse's duty is not applied solely based on a nurse being "assigned" to provide nursing care to a patient. A nurse who has knowledge that a situation places a patient at risk of harm has a duty to the patient (or potential patient as in Lunsford).

Rule 217.11(1)(S) relates to nurses who supervise other staff. This standard requires nurses in supervisory positions to "make assignments to others that take into consideration client safety and which are commensurate with the educational preparation, experience, knowledge, and physical and emotional ability of the persons to whom the assignments are made." Likewise, staff nurses are required to accept assignments within the nurse's educational preparation, experience, knowledge, and emotional ability [§217.11(1)(T)]. The standards do not exist or apply in isolation, but compliment each other; thus, all applicable standards should be considered by a nurse in determining the most appropriate course of action.

Safe Harbor Peer Review

"Safe Harbor" ("Request for Peer Review") can apply to nurses in both staff and supervisory positions when the nurse believes an assignment may place patients at risk of harm, thus violating the nurse's duty to the patient. Safe Harbor provides a means by which a nurse can protect his/her nursing license from board action as well as have nursing peers in the same practice setting review the requested assignment. New

Nurses on Guard - Error Prevention and Management -

Advanced Practice Nurses Co-Signing Verbal Orders Originating with Another Provider

In recent months, advanced practice nurses have called the board office to inquire whether it is permissible for them to sign verbal orders that originated with another health care provider for patients whom they have never met or assessed. Although the Board has not adopted a position statement that specifically addresses this issue, there are a number of existing rules that are pertinent to this situation.

Rule 217.11(1) of the Standards of Nursing Practice requires nurses at all levels of licensure to:

- (1)(B) Implement measures to promote a safe environment for clients and others.
- (1)(C) Know the rationale for and the effects of medications and treatments and shall correctly administer the same.
- (1)(T) Accept only those nursing assignments that take into consideration client safety and that are commensurate with the nurse's educational preparation, experience, knowledge, and physical and emotional ability.

It is important to consider whether it is in the best interest of patient safety for advanced practice nurses to co-sign verbal orders for patients they do not know or have never personally assessed. If an advanced practice nurse knows and has worked with a patient, then this **may** be an acceptable practice. However, it is a different situation when the advanced practice nurse is unfamiliar with the patient. From a licensure standpoint, if an advanced practice nurse's signature appears on an order, she or he would bear some responsibility for ensuring that the order was the correct order for the patient regardless of whether the order was given by that advanced practice nurse or another provider.

Generally speaking, a nurse's cosignature on a medical record indicates that s/he personally witnessed an event or assessed a patient and agrees with what is documented. In the case of a cosignature on an order, it would imply that the advanced practice nurse knows the patient and agrees the order is the correct one for that patient. In a situation in which an advanced practice nurse signed a verbal order for a patient s/he did not know, the board might reasonably ask how the advanced practice nurse determined that the ordered medication/ treatment was safe or appropriate for that patient. How would the advanced practice nurse know the patient was free of any conditions that would contraindicate the selection of that medication or treatment? If the advanced practice nurse has not personally seen and assessed the patient, how would s/he know that is the correct order? It does not matter if the verbal order was given by another advanced practice nurse, physician or physician assistant; the advanced practice nurse's signature on an order implies s/he knows the patient, is in agreement with that order, and is accountable to the board for the correctness of that order.

Although the standards do not specifically reference ordering/prescribing medication, the concepts applied to medication administration are equally applicable. The order must be appropriate for the specific patient and ordered correctly. If the advanced practice nurse had been asked to issue the original verbal order, did s/he have sufficient knowledge of the patient's health status to give the order without personally assessing the patient at the time the request was received? If the answer to this question is no, then it is reasonable to presume that co-signing that particular verbal order does not take patient safety into consideration.

Rule 221.13(e), one of the core standards for advanced practice nursing, reminds the advanced practice nurse that s/he retains professional accountability for the care and management s/he provides. Protocols, privileges or other types of collaborative agreements with physicians provide delegated authority for advanced practice nurses to provide medical aspects of patient care; these documents do not discharge an advanced practice nurse's duty to a patient nor do they relieve him/her of the responsibility to comply with the laws and regulations governing nursing practice.

The unprofessional conduct rule in Rule 217.12 provides some information regarding those activities the Board considers to be misconduct. This includes:

- (1) Unsafe practice–actions or conduct including, but not limited to:
 - (A) Carelessly failing, repeatedly failing, or exhibiting an inability to perform vocational, registered, or advanced practice nursing in conformity with the standards of minimum acceptable level of

nursing practice set out in Rule 217.11;

- (E) Accepting the assignment of nursing functions or a prescribed health function when the acceptance of the assignment could be reasonably expected to result in unsafe or ineffective client care;
- (4) Careless or repetitive conduct that may endanger a client's life, health, or safety. Actual injury to a client need not be established.

It is possible that such a practice could be viewed as unprofessional conduct. However, as with all disciplinary cases, the facts and circumstances surrounding an individual case would be considered in determining whether the specific situation rose to the level of being considered unprofessional conduct.

If a nurse (including an advanced practice nurse) is asked to accept an assignment that s/he believes would cause him/her to violate the Nursing Practice Act or Board Rules, the nurse has the option of invoking safe harbor if s/he works in a facility that hires, employs, or contracts for the services of ten or more nurses. If safe harbor is not an option because peer review is not mandatory in the practice setting, then the nurse can still refuse to engage in an assignment that s/he believes in good faith would constitute a violation of the Nursing Practice Act or Board Rules (Nursing Practice Act, Section 301.352).

Such practices also have implications for civil liability and litigation. This is beyond the board's purview, and nurses who need additional information with regard to this issue should contact their own personal counsel for this type of information or for legal advice.

Nurse's Duty to a Patient

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Incident-Based (Rule 217.19) and Safe Harbor (217.20) peer review rules became effective May 11, 2008. The Peer Review section of the web page http://www.bon.state.tx.us/practice/gen_practice.html (under Nursing Practice) contains safe harbor forms, resource documents, and the peer review rules. Nursing associations that represent LVNs, RNs and advanced practice nurses as members may also have information about Safe Harbor Peer Review for their members and other nurses.

The BON has no authority over employment issues, but a nurse does have civil recourse in matters where the nurse's decision to invoke Safe Harbor was made in "good faith", but negative employment action occurred as a result of the nurse's request. A nurse also has "whistleblower" protections when the nurse reports a facility, physician, or other entity for violations of laws relating to patient care and/or illegal acts, such as fraud [NPA 301.4025, rule 217.20(i)].

In summary, BON staff have heard a number of nurses disciplined by the board proclaim "if I had only known and understood about my "duty to the patient" under the NPA and board rules, I would not have gotten into trouble with the Board of Nursing." Please do not wait to become familiar with the laws that govern your nursing practice. A sound knowledge base regarding the rules and statutes will help you protect your patients as well as your nursing license.

Alert: Advanced Practice Nurses With Prescriptive Authority

Effective September 1, 2008, state law requires that all prescriptions for controlled substances include the prescriber's controlled substance registration number issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) in addition to the United States Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) number. Advanced practice nurses with prescriptive authority must put both DPS and DEA numbers on all prescriptions for controlled substances in Schedules III through V. Advanced practice nurses with prescriptive authority must have their own DPS and DEA numbers to prescribe controlled substances.

Rhode Island Joins the Nurse Licensure Compact

Rhode Island joined the Nurse Licensure Compact (NLC) effective July 1, 2008. Twenty-two other states have enacted legislation allowing for participation in the NLC. Other states in the Compact include: Arizona, Arkansas, Colorado, Delaware, Idaho, Iowa, Kentucky, Maine, Maryland, Mississippi, Nebraska, New Hampshire, New Mexico, North Carolina, North Dakota, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Virginia and Wisconsin.

Kathlyn Yvonne Jones applied for an LVN position in the flu clinics of a healthcare agency on September 17, 2007. Ms. Jones was hired and received orientation to work in clinics in the Dallas area. In December 2007, the facility discovered that they did not have a copy of Ms. Jones' LVN license in her personnel file and that no verification of license had been completed upon hiring. They attempted to verify her license on-line and were unsuccessful. The agency contacted the Board office and verified that Ms. Jones did not hold a license to practice vocational nursing in Texas. The case was referred to the Dallas County District Attorney's office.

ELAINE GONZALES TREVINO

Elaine Gonzales Trevino secured employment as an LVN with a home health agency in Victoria, Texas, on April 3, 2008. Ms. Trevino informed the agency that she was in the process of obtaining endorsement to Texas from Nevada. Ms. Trevino worked as an LVN from April 3, 2008 through May 5, 2008. The agency was not able to verify her licensure and they terminated her employment on May 7, 2008. The case was referred to the Victoria County District Attorney's office.

JAMIE GAYLE SMITH (GEORGE)

Jamie Gayle Smith's license to practice professional nursing in the State of Texas was revoked on November 10, 2003. Ms. Smith continued to practice and continued to use the initials "RN" after her name at two places of employment.

PATRICIA N. BRITT

Patricia N. Britt's license to practice vocational nursing (LVN) in the State of Texas was revoked on March 20, 2007. Ms. Britt applied for employment on January 14, 2008, with a physician's group in Richardson, Texas. During the interview Ms. Britt misrepresented herself as an RN and was hired. Her duties included patient care and she signed her name followed by RN in the patients' medical records. Ms. Britt also wore a pin with her name followed by the initials RN. Ms. Britt was terminated from employment on January 22, 2008. The case was referred to the Collin County District Attorney's Office.

Advisory Committee Update

Advisory Committee on Education Addresses New Board Charges

The Advisory Committee on Education (ACE) met on September 10, 2008, via conference call, with nine committee members, one liaison Board member, and several board staff participating. ACE members reviewed the four new charges issued by the Board and planned the committee's response for these charges. The four new charges are as follows:

- 1. Review and revise the Differentiated Entry Level Competencies (DELC).
- 2. Study and make recommendations regarding the issues involved with permitting a student who has partially completed a professional nursing educational program or graduated from a professional nursing educational program and then failed the NCLEX-RN[®] examination, to apply for licensure as a vocational nurse in Texas by taking NCLEX-PN[®] examination.
- 3. Determine the addition of clinical requirements for programs outside Texas' jurisdiction that do not require clinical learning experiences to be included in the program of study and want their graduates to be eligible for nursing licensure in Texas.
- 4. Review the revised Board processes for addressing programs overall pass rates that are below 80% in relation to the Sunset Advisory Commission's recommendation 1.9.

The first ACE meeting beginning the process of addressing the new charges was held on October 1, 2008, in Austin, with seven committee members and several Board staff in attendance. The next ACE meeting is scheduled for November 17, 2008 in Austin. The committee's address of the new charges will continue during this meeting.

Nursing Practice Advisory Committee

The Nursing Practice Advisory Committee (NPAC) met on September 5, 2008, to discuss and make recommendations to the Board for proposed revisions to Rule 217.16 relating to Minor Incidents. This review was necessary to assure that the Minor Incident Rule accurately reflected changes in the statutes as a result of Senate Bill 993 and House Bill 2426 [80th Texas Legislative Regular Session (2007)]. The changes relevant to the Minor Incident Rule mainly relate to the Board's Rule 217.19 relating to Incident-Based Nursing Peer Review. Revisions to both Rule 217.19, *Incident-Based Nursing Peer Review and Whistleblower Protections*, and 217.20, *Safe Harbor Nursing Peer Review and Whistleblower Protections*, were adopted on May 11, 2008.

Board consideration of proposed revisions to the Minor Incident Rule is tentatively slated for the October 2008, Board Meeting.
