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DARS Vision and Mission

Vision

A Texas where people with disabilities and families with children who have developmental delays enjoy the same opportunities as other Texans to pursue independent and productive lives.

Mission

To work in partnership with Texans with disabilities and families with children who have developmental delays to improve the quality of their lives and to enable their full participation in society.



DARS Overview

- Assist Texans who have disabilities with finding or retaining employment
- Prepare families with babies who have disabilities and developmental delays age 0 to 3 to meet educational and developmental goals
- Help Texans with disabilities to live independently in their communities
- Help survivors of traumatic brain and spinal cord injuries to regain functionality and independence
- Make disability determinations for Texans who apply for Social Security Disability Insurance and/or Supplemental Security Income



DARS Overview

- 4 Program Divisions
 - Blind Services
 - Disability Determination Services
 - Early Childhood Intervention Services
 - Rehabilitation Services
- Over 3,100 staff
- 148 Field Offices
- Over \$600 million Budget (All funds)



Vocational Rehabilitation Programs

- Assists people with disabilities and whose disability creates an impediment to employment.
- Counselors and rehabilitation teachers provide services to eligible people to enable them to prepare for, find, and keep employment.
- Total served: 94,121 (FY 08)
- Employed: 12,937



Independent Living Services

- Assists people with significant disabilities for whom employment is not appropriate.
- Community-based services concentrate on self sufficiency, quality of life, and independence.
- Total served: 5,499 (FY 08)



Independent Living Centers

- Centers are non-profit entities that are operated by persons with disabilities. The Centers are:
 - Consumer-controlled
 - Community-based
 - Cross-disability
 - Non-residential
- The Centers provide 4 core independent living services:
 - Peer Counseling
 - Independent living skills training
 - Systems advocacy
 - Information and referral
- DARS provides funding for 12 of the 23 centers statewide.
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Services to Children

Early Childhood Intervention Services (ECI)

- ECI is a coordinated system of services for children, birth to age 3, with disabilities or delays in development.
- ECI services are available in every Texas county and are provided by a network of 58 local ECI programs.
- Total served: 52,848 (FY 08)



Services to Children

Blind Children's Vocational Discovery and Development Program

- Provides opportunities for children who are blind or severely visually impaired to learn the skills required for personal independence, potential employment, and other life pursuits.
- Total served: 3,250 (FY 08)



Services to Children

Autism Program

- Pilot program for children with autism ages 3 to 8.
- Program designed to:
 - Provide positive behavior support strategies, including Applied Behavioral Analysis (ABA)
 - Compliment services included in a child's Individualized Education Plan (IEP), if such a plan exists
 - Bill Medicaid, CHIP, private insurance and any other available third party source before using DARS funding
- Total Served: Approximately 275 through FY 09



Disability Determination Services

- The Disability Determination Services
 Division determines medical and vocational eligibility for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) benefits.
- The program is 100 percent federally funded and is governed by the Social Security Administration.
- Disability cases determined: 287,252 (FY 08)



Comprehensive Rehabilitation Services

- Helps survivors of traumatic brain and/or spinal cord injuries to regain functionality and independence.
- Three basic services are provided:
 - Inpatient comprehensive medical rehabilitation
 - Outpatient services
 - Post-acute traumatic brain injury rehabilitation services
- Total served: 629 (FY 08)



Deaf and Hard of Hearing Services

Regional Resource Specialists

 Contractors advocate or provide communication access services for people who are deaf and hard of hearing including information and referral and interpreter services.

Specialized Telecommunications Assistance Program (STAP)

 Provides vouchers to qualified persons to purchase specialized telecommunication equipment for services.

Interpreter Certification

 The program provides testing, certification, and ethics monitoring of sign language and oral interpreters.



Blindness Education, Screening, and Treatment (BEST) Program

- Assists uninsured adults with payment for urgently needed eye-medical treatment to prevent blindness.
- Total Served: 8,404 (FY 08)



Business Enterprises of Texas (BET) Program

 Gives priority to blind persons licensed by DARS to operate vending and food service facilities on federal, state, and other properties.

 Individuals employed by BET businesses: 1,355 (FY 08)
