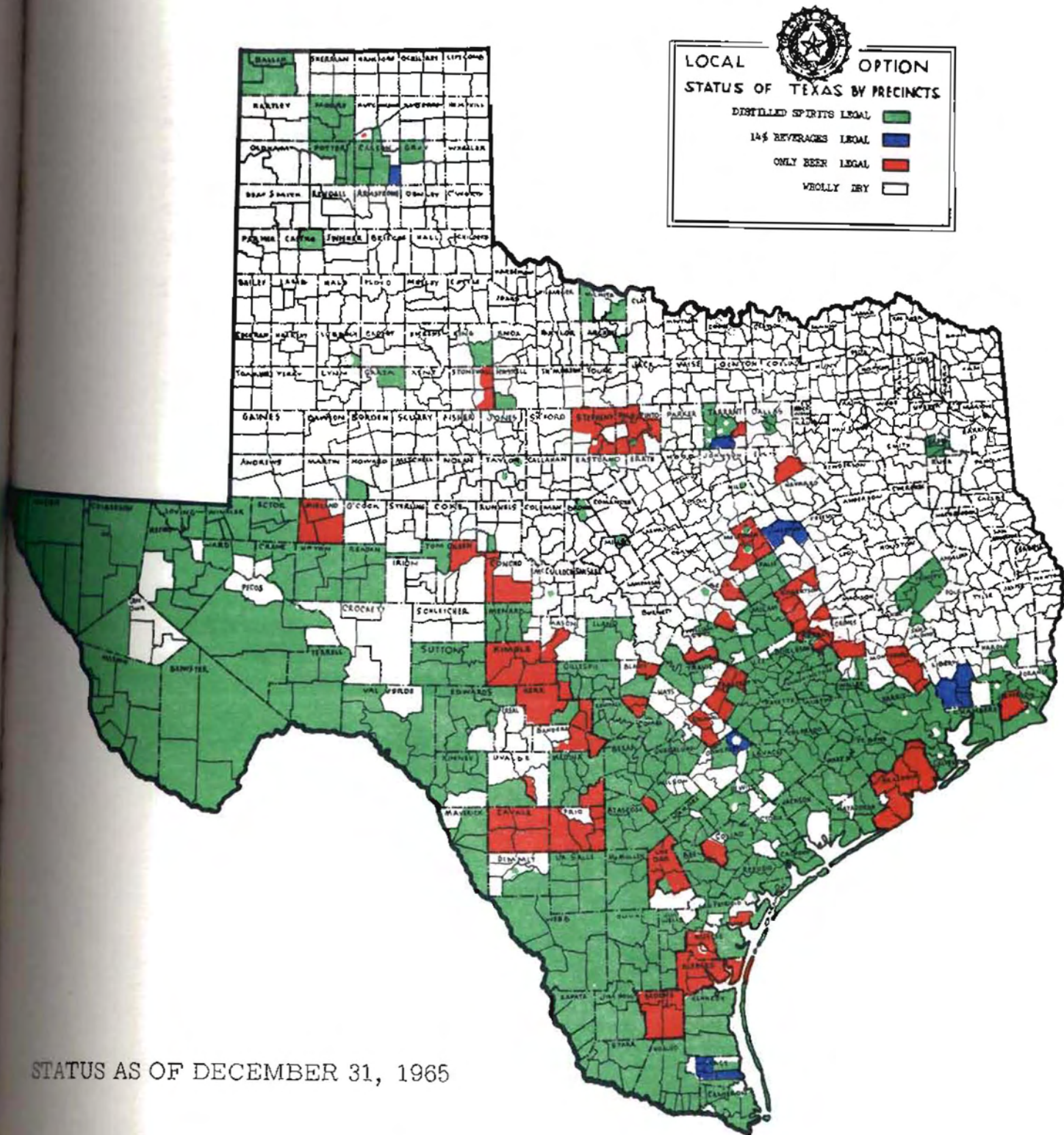

LOCAL OPTION ELECTIONS

There were twenty-four local option elections held in 1965. Eighteen were called to legalize, seven became "wet" and eleven remained "dry". Four elections were called to prohibit, three remained "wet" and one became "dry". One "wet" for the sale of beer before the election was held and became "wet" for the sale of all alcoholic beverages. One "wet" for the sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only before the election was held and remained "wet" for the sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only.

The voting in 1965:

ARCHER COUNTY:

Justice Precinct No. 3, Archer County, on November 6, 1965, voted 78 for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only and 160 against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only. This precinct was "dry" before the election was held and remained "dry".

BAYLOR COUNTY:

Justice Precinct No. 3, Baylor County, on June 12, 1965, voted 32 for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only and 68 against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only. This precinct was "dry" before the election was held and remained "dry".

BROWN COUNTY:

Justice Precinct No. 4, Brown County, on January 9, 1965, voted 514 for the legal sale of beer for off premise consumption only and 295 against the legal sale of beer for off premise consumption only. This precinct was "wet" before the election was held and remained "wet".

Justice Precinct No. 4, Brown County, on January 9, 1965, voted 453 for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only and 344 against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only. This precinct was "wet" for the sale of beer

for off premise consumption only before the election was held and became "wet" for the sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only.

DENTON COUNTY:

The Incorporated city of Lake Dallas, Denton County, on September 4, 1965, voted 139 for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages and 212 against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages. Lake Dallas was "dry" before the election was held and remained "dry".

The Incorporated city of Lake Dallas, Denton County, on October 9, 1965, voted 124 for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only and 190 against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only. Lake Dallas was "dry" before the election was held and remained "dry".

The Incorporated city of Lake Dallas, Denton County, on December 4, 1965, voted 104 for the legal sale of beer and wine for off premise consumption only and 191 against the legal sale of beer and wine for off premise consumption only. Lake Dallas was "dry" before the election was held and remained "dry".

ELLIS COUNTY:

Justice Precinct No. 3, Ellis County, on May 22, 1965, voted 1697 for the legal sale of beer for off premise consumption only and 1566 against the legal sale of beer for off premise consumption only. The precinct was "dry" before the election was held and became "wet".

GRAY COUNTY:

The Incorporated city of Lefors, Gray County, on April 6, 1965, voted 145 for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages and 186 against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages. Lefors was "dry" before the election was held and remained "dry".

GRAYSON COUNTY:

The Incorporated city of Denison, Grayson County, on January 9, 1965, voted 3285 for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages and 1871 against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages. Denison was "wet" before the election was held and remained "wet".

The Incorporated city of Van Alstyne, Grayson County, on October 2, 1965, voted 143 for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only and 387 against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only. Van Alstyne was "dry" before the election was held and remained "dry".

HARRISON COUNTY:

The Incorporated city of Marshall, Harrison County, on January 9, 1965, voted 2300 for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages and 2568 against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages. Marshall was "dry" before the election was held and remained "dry".

The Incorporated city of Marshall, Harrison County, on May 8, 1965, voted 2246 for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only and 2111 against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only. Marshall was "dry" before the election was held and became "wet".

The Incorporated city of Scottsville, Harrison County, on July 10, 1965, voted 12 for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages and 24 against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages. Scottsville was "wet" for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only before the election was held and remained "wet" for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only.

HENDERSON COUNTY:

The Incorporated city of Trinidad, Henderson County, on May 4, 1965, voted 113 for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only and 220 against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only. Trinidad was "dry" before the election was held and remained "dry".

HUTCHINSON COUNTY:

The Incorporated city of Sanford, Hutchinson County, on September 7, 1965, voted 49 for the legal sale of beer for off premise consumption only and 24 against the legal sale of beer for off premise consumption only. Sanford was "dry" before the election was held and became "wet".

JEFFERSON COUNTY:

The Incorporated city of Bevil Oaks, Jefferson County, on January 5, 1965, voted 23 for the legal sale of beer and wine and 102 against the legal sale of beer and wine. Bevil Oaks was "wet" before the election was held and became "dry".

KAUFMAN COUNTY:

The Incorporated city of Terrell, Kaufman County, on July 10, 1965, voted 1365 for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only and 1212 against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only. Terrell was "dry" before the election was held and became "wet".

KING COUNTY:

Justice Precinct No. 3, King County, on January 6, 1965, voted 10 for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages and 13 against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages. This precinct was "dry" before the election was held and remained "dry".

Justice Precinct No. 3, King County, on August 7, 1965, voted 14 for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only and 11 against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only. This precinct was "dry" before the election was held and became "wet".

MENARD COUNTY:

Justice Precinct No. 4, Menard County, on May 8, 1965, voted 17 for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages and 16 against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages. This precinct was "wet" before the election was held and remained "wet".

McCULLOCH COUNTY:

The Incorporated city of Brady, McCulloch County, on August 7, 1965, voted 838 for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only and 755 against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off premise consumption only. Brady was "dry" before the election was held and became "wet".

NAVARRO COUNTY:

The Incorporated city of Corsicana, Navarro County, on October 9, 1965, voted 1116 for the legal sale of beer for off premise consumption only and 1840 against the legal sale of beer for off premise consumption only. Corsicana was "dry" before the election was held and remained "dry".

TAYLOR COUNTY:

The Incorporated city of Buffalo Gap, Taylor County, on December 7, 1965, voted 77 for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages and 76 against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages. Buffalo Gap was "dry" before the election was held and became "wet".
