ADDENDUM F

Local Option Elections

There were seven local option elections during the fiscal year ending August 31, 1996. Three elections were called to legalize the sale of beer and wine for off-premise consumption only. Three other elections were called to legalize the sale of beer and wine. The seventh election was called to legalize the sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption only. As a result of these elections, one jurisdiction remained "dry," three jurisdictions became "wet," and three jurisdictions became "wet" for additional types of alcoholic beverages.

The voting for the fiscal year:

BRAZORIA COUNTY

A local option election was held on February 26, 1996, in the City of Quintana, Brazoria County, for the issue of "The legal sale of beer and wine." The issue passed by a vote of 25 FOR and 4 AGAINST. The City of Quintana, Brazoria County, was "wet" for the legal sale of beer before the election and is now "wet" for the legal sale of beer and wine.

DENTON COUNTY

A local option election was held on December 9, 1995, in the City of Roanoke, Denton County, for the issue of "The legal sale of beer for off-premises consumption only." The issue was defeated by a vote of 212 FOR and 228 AGAINST. The City of Roanoke, Denton County was "dry" before the election and remains "dry."

LIMESTONE COUNTY

A local option election was held on September 9, 1995, in the former Justice of the Peace Precinct #2, Limestone County, for the issue of "The legal sale of beer and wine." The issue passed by a vote of 60 FOR and 44 AGAINST. The former Justice of the Peace Precinct #2, Limestone County, was "dry" before the election and is now "wet" for the legal sale of wine and beer.

A local option election was held on September 9, 1995, in the former Justice of the Peace Precinct #3, Limestone County, for the issue of "The legal sale of beer and wine." The issue passed by a vote of 169 FOR and 152 AGAINST. The former Justice of the Peace Precinct #3, Limestone County, was "dry" before the election and is now "wet" for the legal sale of wine and beer.

NAVARRO COUNTY

A local option election was held on October 28, 1995, in the City of Goodlow, Navarro County, for the issue of "The legal sale of beer and wine for off-premise consumption only." The issue passed by a vote of 44 FOR and 40 AGAINST. The City of Goodlow, Navarro County, was "dry" before the election and is now "wet" for the legal sale of beer and wine for off-premises consumption only."

A local option election was held on February 3, 1996, in the City of Richland, Navarro County, for the issue of "The legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption only." The issue passed by a vote of 68 FOR and 10 AGAINST. The City of Richland, Navarro County, was "wet" for the legal sale of beer and wine for off-premises consumption before the election and is now "wet" for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption only."

PECOS COUNTY

A local option election was held on May 4, 1996, in Justice of the Peace Precinct #4, Pecos County, for the issue of "The legal sale of beer and wine for off-premise consumption only." The issue passed by a vote of 95 FOR and 58 AGAINST. Justice of the Peace Precinct #4, Pecos County, was "dry" before the election and is now "wet" for the legal sale of beer and wine for off-premise consumption only.
