Roma receives \$520,000 in disaster funds to repair flood damaged homes

TDHCA expects disaster funding to assist nine homeowners in recovery process

(AUSTIN) — The quality of life for nine Roma homeowners whose homes suffered extensive flood damage last September should soon dramatically improve as the result of today's \$520,000 disaster relief award to the city from the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA). The award was made through a portion of TDHCA's HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) Program reserved for income eligible households who own the home in which they live.

"The residents of Roma took a cruel hit from nature last September, and the city is still struggling to make repairs," said Michael Gerber, TDHCA Executive Director. "TDHCA is pleased to provide these funds and help these families rebuild their lives and communities."

Heavy rains that fell on Starr County beginning on September 13, 2006, resulted in severe flooding in and around the city of Roma. The Governor's Division of Emergency Management, accompanied by TDHCA staff, conducted a preliminary damage assessment the week of September 15.

Governor Rick Perry subsequently requested TDHCA make available any financial assistance to the area possible. The Department communicated with city and county officials regarding the potential use of HOME Program funds to respond to this natural disaster, and staff visited with city officials to provide technical assistance with the application process. Roma officials applied for an award, and today the Department's Governing Board gave final funding approval.

The city will utilize \$500,000 of the funds to rehabilitate or reconstruct nine homes and apply the balance toward covering administrative costs as allowed under federal rules.

The US Department of Housing and Urban Development is the funding source for the HOME Program, and funds are designed to assist households at or below 80 percent of the area median family income. Eligible applicants include units of local government, public housing authorities, Community Housing Development Organizations and other nonprofit groups, and qualifying for-profit organizations.
