Spotlight on Palestine

Population 17,598

Palestine is a beautiful, historic town located almost midway between Dallas and Houston. It has a unique history in that it was formed in 1846, the year after Texas statehood. It was a sleepy little antebellum town until 1872 when the International & Great Northern Railroad arrived. Many of the residents of the town did not want

the noisy, dirty, smoking industry in their quiet agrarian community, but the inevitable happened. In order to keep the noise of the railroad away from the town square and the surrounding neighborhoods, the railroad located about a mile southeast of the square. The railroad laid out commercial, residential and the industrial sections where the shops and depot were built, resulting in the locals calling the original part of town "Old Town." The area around the railroad became known as

2007, the city has become aware of the amazing quantity and quality of its historic resources. The City Council and Palestine Economic Development Corporation is a 4B sales tax city and established a Façade Improvement Program Grant about the time the city was designated as a Provisional Main Street City. The grant was a matching grant that could be used for exterior improvements only including roof repair or replacement. The program was slow to start, but eventually there were two grants awarded in December 2007. one to the flagship of New Town, The Gregg-Link Building, a threestory Romanesque Revival Building built circa 1900.

In January 2008, there was a lot of

interest in Main Street and about 10 or 12 buildings were planning rehabs with or without an incentive program, but many were late in getting their applications in before the deadline. This started a flurry of interest of building owners in both Old Town and New Town in rehabilitating their buildings. The Palestine City Manager and PEDC announced another grant round for May 2008. In June, grants were awarded for six more projects in both New Town and Old Town, making a total of 27 building rehabs underway in Main Street Palestine. Many of the buildings have existing businesses and several will house new businesses or commercial interests that are coming back to downtown. We look forward to these and more rehabs completed in the coming months. Palestine will once again have a thriving historic business center thanks to the Texas Main Street Program.

GRANTS Keep Texas Beautiful/ HEB Recycling Grants

HEB grocery store and Keep Texas Beautiful (KTB) are proud to introduce the 2008 HEB / Keep Texas Beautiful Recycling Grants, which will provide a minimum of \$20,000 semi-annually in grant funding for recycling programs. Grants will support KTB affiliates' efforts to implement new or enhance existing local,



voluntary recycling activities in HEB service areas, with funding ranging from \$150 to \$3,000.

The Green Bag Grants are being established through funds raised from the sale of reusable green bags at any H-E-B (available for \$0.99 each plus tax), with \$0.05 from each bag sale being contributed to the grant program. GO TEXAN Grants

Note: for both of the following grants, you must be a GO TEXAN member to apply. Certified membership is open to non-metropolitan counties or cities located in rural Texas. Counties and cities eligible to apply for the GO TEXAN Rural Community Program must be located in a non-metropolitan area or a city with a population under 20,000.

Hometown STARS Grant Program

The Hometown STARS (Supporting Tourism and Rural Success) matching fund reimbursement program through the Texas Department of Agriculture is designed to help rural communities leverage the dollars they have available to promote tourism events, in turn boosting local economies and attracting new jobs and dollars. The program will reimburse GO TEXAN Rural Community Program certified members for half of approved promotional costs up to \$10,000. Hometown STARS is a matching fund program for communities with experience managing their tourism programs and a budget that will accommodate the matching dollars required. See

Bootstrap Bucks Grant Program

The Bootstrap Bucks reimbursable funding program through the Texas Department of Agriculture is designed to help rural communities promote tourism events. Approved GO TEXAN Rural Community Program certified members can use up to \$2,500 in reimbursable funds for one of four eligible promotional items: banners, posters, newspaper advertisements and radio/television spots. Bootstrap Bucks is a reimbursable funding program for communities just beginning their tourism programs or communities adding new elements to their programs, and it has no matching fund requirement.
