### Fruits of Partnership

Can a justice center and parking garage be an opportunity for historic preservation and revitalization in downtown?



Construction on the new justice center and parking garage is progressing and hopefully all will be complete by April, 2010.

There are currently three cranes operating in downtown Waxahachie! All of this activity is the result of a successful partnership between Ellis County and the City of Waxahachie. The County, which occupies several buildings around the square as well as a couple of satellite offices, had outgrown its facilities and wanted to consolidate them all in one place. They were considering several locations downtown being one of them. The City of Waxahachie recognized the importance of keeping the county employees and facilities in the central business district, so the city council offered to build a three story garage to accommodate the increased need for parking if the county would commit to building their new facilities downtown. A bond election was held to fund this major project and it passed--with the voters

Since the beginning, the city and county have worked together on every aspect of the project. This has allowed both entities to receive better pricing and contributed to the "campus" feel by designing the project together and as part of a larger plan for the entire site. The goal was to find a company that had experience in building all

three types of facilities — jails, justice facilities, and parking garages. All through the process, there has been a multi-disciplinary team in place with representatives from each entity having input. It truly has been a partnership and the results are taking shape for all to see.

Two of the cranes downtown are working on new buildings one block east of the Ellis County Courthouse and another is south of the current jail. The new county buildings include a new justice/administration building

and an expansion to the existing jail facility. The new Ellis County Courts and Administration building will be on the same block as the new parking garage the city is constructing. It will house many of the county offices such as the tax assessor/collector, county clerk, district clerk, and county engineer. It will also contain four state of the art courtrooms and have the capacity for two more which may be built out in the future. The jail expansion will add another 288 beds to the existing jail.

The parking garage will be three stories and have the capacity to hold 317 vehicles. It has been designed so another story can be added in the future, which could accommodate another 106 vehicles. The garage will also contain an elevator and cutting edge security features like lights, cameras and 911 phones scattered through each floor of the garage. Another feature will be a concealed corridor linked to the existing jail facility, in which prisoners can be transported to the new justice center without being exposed to the public. This limits liability for the county in attempting to transport prisoners by vehicle or foot and allows for more security and control in getting them to the courts. It is another aspect of the project that serves as a great example of the city and county working together to meet the needs of each other and the community.

Estimated completion dates for these new facilities are: parking garage January 2010, jail expansion February 2010, and Justice and Administration Center April 2010.

When the new county buildings are finished and the workers move into them, several buildings around the beautiful Ellis County Courthouse will be vacant and ripe for development. This will be a great opportunity for us to revitalize our downtown even more by getting businesses in those buildings that are not just open Monday

through Friday, 8-5 and vacant all weekend like when the county offices occupied them. It will start a whole new phase in seeing the downtown Master plan to fruition and will complement the redevelopment that is already being spurred by this project.

### Galveston Architecture Named to America's 11 Most Endangered Historic Places

The National Trust for Historic Preservation has recently named the 11 Most Endangered Historic Places in America and the Cast-Iron Architecture in Galveston, Texas is on the list.

The late 19th century Greek Revival and Italianate-style buildings with elaborate cast-iron storefronts in Galveston's 12-block Strand/Mechanic National Historic Landmark District constitute one of the largest collections of historic commercial buildings in the country. More than 44% of the buildings in the district have cast iron storefronts, and these storefronts have been in jeopardy ever since Hurricane Ike hit in 2008. At that time, the downtown commercial district was flooded with 10 –13 feet of a noxious mix of salt water, oil and debris. Once the water receded, the full impact of the devastation could be seen to Galveston's trademark decorative castiron embellishments.

As of June 2009, the Galveston City Council has included \$775K in non-Housing Community Development Block Grant Disaster Funding in round one of its application process to help fund the restoration of the city's Cast Iron Architecture. A ten-year dream will come to fruition with the grand opening of the Mineola Museum of Transportation and History. From the time the city purchased the 1937 depression-era postal facility in 1998, ideas, dreams, fundraisers and hard work have been put forth to achieve the goal to make this building a historic museum. The results are a variety of scenes that display the memorabilia donated from through-

out, not only the community, but from areas across the states. Museum Board member, Sharon Chamblee, devoted years to encouraging the directors to help gather historic facts, memorabilia, and artifacts to fill the 14 different scenes.
