Spotlight on... Paris

Paris. Last summer a local professional volunteer, as she is often referred, asked the V&CC director and me to have lunch. She wanted to brainstorm ideas for a new event showcasing local artists, such as an art fair or art show. After some discussion it was decided the event should be held close to the Christmas holidays. Both the V&CC director and I stated very early on that neither of us could independently take on this project. Neither of us possessed the necessary funding and we both valued our sanity; with that said, an alternate plan was derived. Since there are so many different holiday events already taking place throughout the city, we decided to bundle them together for two weekends in December. This resulted in a savings in advertising, enabling all the organizations involved to get the word out more effectively. Some of the groups involved in the planning

process included the Arts Alliance, Community Theater, Garden Clubs, Paris Junior College, local churches and the Downtown Merchants Association. Brochures, commercials and print ads became affordable for all organizations involved. It really worked well to package the events. Planning for this year's event is already under way. We intend to offer carriage rides, an art walk, extended shopping hours, musical performances on the plaza, a tour of homes and countless other activities. We are looking forward to another wonderful holiday event benefiting the entire community.

Meeting new people and working with my community, as well as learning from other Main Street managers and professionals, is such a wonderful part of my job. I've been a Main Street manager for two very short years and in that time, Paris has experienced major growth. Without the help of the state's Main Street office staff and other Main Street managers throughout the state my position would have proved much more difficult. Many thanks go out to all the staff and managers that have assisted me over the years.

AROUND THE STATE

Congratulations go to Main Street manager Frieda Davis of **Decatur** for the achievement of certified Main Street Manager. This is an arduous two-year process and a great accomplishment. Frieda represented Texas well as she received her diploma at the National Main Streets conference in Seattle. Texas now has three certified Main Street managers active in Main Street programs: Julie Glover of Denton, Fabio Angell of Pharr and Frieda Davis of Decatur.

Pharr was recognized by the University of Texas-Pan American Small Business Development Center (SBDC at UTPA) with an Excellence in Service award at their 20th anniversary celebration on November 29th attended by U.S. Rep. Ruben Hinojosa, D-Mercedes. Many of the approximately 50 net business starts in the historic downtown since 2002 continue to benefit through this partnership with the Main Street Board's Economic Restructuring Committee (ERC). Available services include loans, consulting, business planning, start-up capital, business mentoring, and marketing.

GRANTS

Save America's Treasures

Save America's Treasures federal grants are now available for preservation and/or conservation work on nationally significant intellectual and cultural artifacts and nationally significant historic structures and sites. Eligible applicants include nonprofit, tax-exempt 501(c), U.S. organizations, units of state or local government and federally recognized Indian Tribes. Grants are awarded through a competitive process and require a dollar-for-dollar, non-federal match.

The minimum grant request for collections projects is \$25,000 federal share; the minimum grant request for historic property projects is \$125,000 federal share. The maximum grant request for all projects is \$700,000 federal share. The application deadline is 5 p.m. Eastern time, Thursday, **April 26**. This is not a postmark deadline.

Texas Preservation Trust Fund Grant

The Texas Historical Commission (THC) is accepting Texas Preservation Trust Fund Grant Program applications for fiscal year 2008. Application forms are now available on the THC web site,

www.thc.state.tx.us, or by contacting the THC at 512/463-6094.

The deadline for receipt of applications is 5 p.m. on Friday, **April 27**, 2007.

The Texas Preservation Trust Fund Grant Program application process has been revised for the upcoming fiscal year 2008. There are now two steps in the grant application process. First, all applicants are required to submit brief application forms for the THC to review. The THC will select the highest priority projects from the initial applications and invite those applicants to move forward to the second step. Successful applicants will continue the process by submitting detailed project proposals by Aug. 31, 2007. Full project proposals will be considered by the THC for final grant awards to be made in October 2007.

The Texas Preservation Trust Fund Grant Program is your opportunity to save and protect Texas' threatened historic structures and significant archeological sites. Grant awards may be used for restoration work, architectural planning, archeological investigation, preservation planning, curatorial, resource survey and heritage educational training.

By submitting an application, you are notifying our office of educational

needs in your community and advising us of endangered historic properties and archeological sites that may soon be lost if this valuable assistance is not provided. We encourage you to submit an application so we may continue to demonstrate the need for our efforts.

Play a part in preserving significant historic resources and providing heritage education across Texas!

My Hometown Helper Grant Program

Hamburger Helper, a General Mills food brand, is looking to lend a helping hand to neighborhoods throughout the United States with its My Hometown Helper grant program.

Submit a written essay describing how the "My Hometown Helper" grant would improve a community project. Awards will be based on the merit of the project, including its impact and support within your community. Examples of possible projects include: lights or bleachers for athletic fields; repairs to a band shell; computers for the local school or library; playground equipment for a park; holiday decorations for Main Street; money for choir, band or science trips; new uniforms for Little League teams; clean-up projects; and training for volunteer firefighters.

Applicants can request a one-time award ranging from \$5,000–\$15,000 during any single month. All requests for funding must be sponsored by a municipal or civic organization or public school. The program will award "helping hand" grants each month from online applications received through May 2007. Applications will be evaluated monthly. Funds will be awarded based on the merit of the project, including its impact on and support within the community. For details, see

American Greenways Awards Program

The Conservation Fund, Eastman Kodak Company and the National Geographic Society are accepting applications for the 2007 Kodak American Greenways Awards program through June 1. The program awards seed money to stimulate greenway, blueway and trail planning and design. Award recipients will receive grants of \$500-\$2,500 to support pioneering work in linking the nation's natural areas, historic sites, parks and open spaces. Grants can be used for public outreach, planning, design, construction, technical assistance, legal and other costs but not for academic research, general institutional support, lobbying or political activities.

Local, regional and statewide non-profits, as well as community-based and municipal government organizations are encouraged to apply. In 2005, Kodak, The Conservation Fund, and the National Geographic Society awarded 47 community grants. Save Our History Grant

Inspire the youth in your community to become the preservationists of tomorrow. Museums, historic sites, historical societies, preservation organizations, libraries, and archives are invited to partner with a local school or youth group and apply for funding to help preserve the history of their communities. Each year, the History Channel awards \$250,000 in grants of up to \$10,000 to organiza-

tions that partner with schools or youth groups on community preservation projects that engage students in learning about, documenting and preserving the history of their communities. Application deadline is **June 1, 2007.**

Grant winners are also eligible to receive an additional \$10,000 award at the Save Our History National Honors Event, when the best grant winners are recognized for their outstanding community preservation projects.

The \$10,000 Save Our History
American Express Award is given
to the organization that best demonstrates the ability to engage students
in preservation activities and educate
them about the importance of historic
preservation.

The \$10,000 Save Our History Lowe's Community Award is given to the organization that demonstrates the best outreach to and participation in the project by local community members including government officials, business leaders, local cable affiliates, the media, etc.

And, finally, the \$10,000 Save Our History Newsweek Classroom Award is given to the organization that partners with a school system and achieves the highest level of active student participation in a preservation initiative.
