Spotlight on Llano

Llano is a unique Hill Country community of 3300 people geographically divided by the Llano River with a commercial district on both sides. Visitors can stroll on walkways on both sides of the river and view its natural beauty. More than 25 historic buildings have benefited from Llano Main Street's grant program. Benches and decorative planters have been strategically placed around the streets and the Confederate soldier statue, which calls attention to our historic downtown.

In 1999, the city received Transportation Equity Act for the 21st century (TEA-21) funding to build a working depot museum and renovate the railroad tracks within the city. Now completed, it is a transportation museum, as well as a visitor's center.

Llano Main Street's 2004 Texas Capital Fund grant funded restoration around the rail yard with sidewalks and lighting linking both sides of the river. The railroad came to Llano in the 1890s. Main Street and the Master Gardeners developed a pocket park in that area with lighting, benches and native greenery, called Pioneer Park. The 2007 Texas Capital Fund Grant will continue the sidewalk project beginning at the south end of the bridge continuing by the Llano River, and ending at the beginning of East Main Street, into the Main Street commercial district.

The entire south side of Llano is a historic district in the National Register of Historic Places. Located in the historic district, the Llano County Courthouse was one of 19 original recipients of more than \$3 million in grant funds from the Texas Historical

Commission dedicated to the restoration of Texas courthouses. The courthouse has been restored and the tower reconstructed. The rededication of the courthouse was held in 2004 and it continues to proudly serve as the historic centerpiece of Llano.

Since 1990, focusing on the local heritage, we have sponsored a Heritage Day Festival the third Saturday in October, which focuses on living history, re-enactments, music and vendors.

Llano Main Street Program operates concessions at the historic 1927
Lantex Theater every second Saturday of the month for the Hill Country Opry, featuring legendary country entertainers, and sponsors a movie on a different Saturday. The Main Street Program will assist in the restoration of the old Llano County Jail, known as Old Red Top.

Future projects include a shopping

Save America's Treasures

Fiscal Year 2008 grant applications for the Save America's Treasures grant program and the Preserve America grant program are now available.

Save America's Treasures matching grants are awarded for preservation

and/or conservation work on *nationally significant* intellectual and cultural artifacts and historic structures and sites. Eligible applicants include Federal (including NPS), state, local and tribal government entities and nonprofit organizations. Applications are due **May 20, 2008**. Preserve America Grants

The Preserve America matching grant program provides funding to support preservation efforts through heritage tourism, education, and historic preservation planning. Eligible applicants include Designated Preserve America Communities and Neighborhoods, State Historic Preservation Offices, Tribal Historic Preservation Offices, and Certified Local Governments in the process of applying for Preserve America Community Designation.
