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Spotlight on... McKinney

For more than 150 years, McKinney's downtown has been a community gathering place. Generations have shopped, worked, lived and enjoyed some of life's milestones in the same buildings that today make up McKinney's historic downtown. It's still a place to gather, with more than 100 unique shops, restaurants and entertainment options. At the heart of this gathering place is the McKinney Performing Arts Center (MPAC) at the restored historic Collin County Courthouse.

This embrace of the new and old, historic and trend-setting, daytime festivals and nightlife activities embodies the spirit of McKinney and its historic downtown.

McKinney's brand is 'unique by nature' and that carries over into everything we do in historic downtown. Our historic downtown has a wonderful mix of retail, office, arts, entertainment, residential, restaurant and leisure opportunities that truly make the district a unique destination.

Today, historic downtown McKinney features specialty shops, art galleries, furniture stores, exquisite antique collections, gift shops and apparel boutiques. More than a dozen restaurants, including upscale dining options, sandwich shops, outdoor patio dining, neighborhood pubs and wineries also help make the area a popular destination on evenings and weekends.

McKinney Main Street also hosts a variety of family-friendly festivals throughout the year. The festivals include Krewe of Barkus, a dog parade and Mardi Gras celebration; Art and Jazz Festival, a two-day celebration of music and the arts: Killis Melton's Ice Cream Crank-off. an ice cream competition and tasting event; Scare on the Square, a safe and secure trick-or-treating celebration; and Dickens of a Christmas, historic downtown's premier event featuring a Victorian theme complete with horse drawn carriages, traveling carolers, visits with Santa Claus and the annual Christmas tree lighting ceremony.

These events are vital to our continued growth and success because they draw new customers to our Historic Downtown. Some residents and visitors may not know what our area has to offer. Festivals give people an opportunity to come to Historic Downtown, and once they experience it, just like with all the diverse neighborhoods in McKinney, they are hooked.

Value of Volunteer Time

The current estimated dollar value of volunteer time is \$18.77 per hour.

The estimate helps acknowledge the millions of individuals who dedicate their time, talents, and energy to making a difference. Charitable organizations can use this estimate to quantify the enormous value volunteers provide.

Youth Volunteers

Involving youth in local Main Street Program goals can be vital to the community. Key findings from the report issued by the Independent Sector and Youth Service in America, "Engaging Youth in Lifelong Service," on youth volunteers in America include:

Forty-four percent of adults volunteer and two-thirds of these volunteers began volunteering their time when they were young.

- Adults who began volunteering as youth are twice as likely to volunteer as those who did not volunteer when they were younger.
- High school volunteering recently reached the highest levels in the past 50 years.
- In every income and age group, those who volunteered as youth give and volunteer more than those who did not.
- Those who volunteered as youth and whose parents volunteered, became the most generous adults in giving time.

Overcoming barriers to youth

service. Despite the many benefits, there still remain some barriers to youth service that must be overcome

if programs are to be successful. The first one is the organizational "mindset" preparation needed for adults and youth so that working together is a productive and enjoyable experience for both groups. Some issues to address in the preparation stage include:

- Advice to adults about "dos and don'ts" on how to work with youth, and for youth on how to work with adults;
- An open discussion about stereotypes that adults and youth have of each other;
- Exercises to practice "shared power;"
- Appropriate training for various age groups;
- Clear definition of roles and responsibilities for both adults and youth;
- Decision-making processes that include youth in meaningful ways; and
- Attention to logistics such as the availability of transportation, suitable scheduling and snacks for young volunteers who come after school.

July 27–28, Monahans

The Butterfield Overland Stagecoach and Wagon Festival includes a parade, all-kids rodeo, bull rides and dancing under the stars. Events to be held at the Ward County Fairgrounds.

July 27-29, San Angelo

The National Cowboy Day Festival includes a special collection of boots, spurs, handcrafted saddles and other artifacts. Fort Concho National Historic Landmark hosts a Western movie festival, a special chuckwagon dinner and campfire concert. Tours of the famous San Angelo boot makers are available. Call 325/655-4136.

For preservation month in May, **Levelland** created a traveling preservation project that was on display in two elementary schools. This display consisted of pictures of Levelland in the early 1900's. In the 1920's there was a community black-eyed pea patch planted in front of the Hockley County Courthouse, so to add some fun for the children, there was a jar of dried peas that everyone got to guess how many there were. The winner received \$10 in Levelland bucks to be used at any business in Levelland. In conjunction with the traveling project, both schools held assemblies where Mrs. Sycily Lattimore spoke on what it was like to live and grow up in Levelland in the early 1920s.

On July 6, **Plainview** will induct former Texas Speaker of the House Pete Laney and his wife, Nelda, into the Plainview Walk of Fame for his support in Plainview and in all of Texas. There will be a plaque unveiled in front of the historic Fair Theater in the Main Street district.
