Spotlight on Sonora

"Formerly a gunslingers' haven, Sonora now draws tamer travelers in search of starry nights, cool caves and a rocking chair with a view," stated Sheryl Smith-Rodgers in

Texas Parks and Wildlife magazine. The Friends of Historic Sonora Main Street are proud to welcome the annual Summer Workshop for the Texas Main Street Managers and their families July 28–31.

Historic Sonora, the county seat of Sutton County, is located 90 miles from the Mexico border at Del Rio, and 65 miles south of San Angelo. It was founded by rancher Charles G. Adams, who settled on four sections of grassy but dry land in 1885 and named the site after a family servant from Sonora, Mexico. Two years later, he drilled a water well and offered free lots. His abundantly flowing well, located on a proposed courthouse square, attracted a large enough population for Sonora to become the county seat of Sutton County in 1890. A historical marker marks the original well's site. The Sutton County Courthouse, designed by architect Oscar Ruffini and built in 1891, was recently renovated as part of the Texas Historical Commission's Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program.

Main Street managers attending the Texas Main Street Summer Workshop will be treated to sessions in the restored upstairs courtroom as well as a courthouse tour, which will feature the gold-stenciled border (uncovered during restoration) lining the rooms and halls, the beautiful wooden benches and railings, the decorative iron work adorning the

roof and the local stories that make them all come live.

Managers will learn how heritage tourism and nature tourism go hand in hand. They will experience the Eaton Hill Wildlife Sanctuary, historic downtown, the beautiful Caverns of Sonora, Fort McKavett State Historic Site, and a luxurious ranch tour with African animals.

Managers and their families will taste the local cuisine and experience the down home feel of small town entertainment. Sonora, population 3,000,

has had only one empty building in the historic downtown in the last two years and is proud to have had more than \$6 million in public and private funds invested in the economic development of downtown.

Main Street managers will be treated to a wonderful, small, historic West Texas town, true West Texas hospitality and that bigger than life night-time sky filled with millions of twinkling bright stars.

The GO TEXAN Rural Community Program began in a slightly different form in October 2003 under the name Texas Yes!, an initiative launched by the Texas Department of Agriculture designed to promote the growth and prosperity of every rural Texas town, city and county. Membership is free and open to rural communities, rural businesses and other organizations devoted to the success of rural Texas.

Certified members can apply for the Hometown STARS (Supporting Tourism and Rural Success) or Bootstrap Bucks grant funding programs designed to help promote tourism events or festivals throughout the state of Texas (see the Grants section of this newsletter for these opportunities). Learn the secrets of success for growing tourism in your rural community through workshops.

Certified Membership is open to non-metropolitan counties or cities located in rural Texas. Note: for both of the following grants, you must be a GO TEXAN member to apply. Certified membership is open to non-metropolitan counties or cities located in rural Texas. Counties and cities eligible to apply for the GO TEXAN Rural Community Program must be located

in a non-metropolitan area or a city with a population under 20,000.

Hometown STARS Grant Program

The Hometown STARS (Supporting Tourism and Rural Success) matching fund reimbursement program through the Texas Department of Agriculture is designed to help rural communities leverage the dollars they have available to promote tourism events, in turn boosting local economies and attracting new jobs and dollars. The program will reimburse GO TEXAN Rural Community Program certified members for half of approved promotional costs up to \$10,000. Hometown STARS is a matching fund program for communities with experience managing their tourism programs and a budget that will accommodate the matching dollars required. See

Bootstrap Bucks Grant Program

The Bootstrap Bucks reimbursable funding program through the Texas Department of Agriculture is designed to help rural communities promote tourism events. Approved GO TEXAN Rural Community Program certified members can use up to \$2,500 in reimbursable funds for one of four eligible promotional items: banners, posters, newspaper advertisements and radio/television spots. Bootstrap Bucks is a reimbursable funding program for communities just beginning their tourism programs or communities adding new elements to their programs, and it has no matching fund requirement.
