Spotlight on... Decatur

The city of Decatur is located at the intersection of Highways 380 and 287, just 40 miles northwest of the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex providing a mix of the best qualities of small life with easy access to metropolitan amenities.

Decatur is the county seat of Wise County, which celebrated its sesquicentennial birthday (150 years) in 2006. Festivities included a weeklong celebration highlighting every town in the county including the neighboring Main Street community of Bridgeport. The county-wide festivities included a pioneer festival in

Paradise, a sesquicentennial queens contest at the Bridgeport stage, a chili cook-off in Alvord, fireworks in Runaway Bay, a fish fry and festival in Greenwood and an old fashioned gospel singing in Slidell. The week culminated in a sesquicentennial parade and festival around the base of the Wise County Courthouse in historic downtown Decatur at the end of the week.

Designated an official Texas Main Street city in 1994, Decatur has seen more than 40 rehabilitation projects ranging from simple slipcover removal to complete restoration in its nine square block district. New programs and events have brought old and new friends downtown again. Cruise Nights on the Courthouse Square is held each month, May through October, on the first Saturday and brings classic, antique and custom cars to the square for a one of a kind car show. Thursday Night Flicks is a summertime phenomenon that brings people to the square to watch movies. It is held every other Thursday night beginning in June and ending the second week of August. The last movie night brings the Decatur High School football team to the square for a mini-pep rally to kick off the football season by watching last year's highlights video and an inspiring football movie. (I know I don't have to explain to any of my fellow Texans how important football season is...) The Chisholm Trail Days, Western

Heritage Festival, held in June has been revived and brought back to the square in recent years and this year featured a kid's stick-horse rodeo and chuck wagon competition as additions to the annual home-made ice cream contest, fiddle contest, gun fight performance and live music. The Holiday season begins with Moonlight Madness, an annual chamber of commerce promotion, held on the first Saturday of December, featuring a lighted Christmas parade, horse drawn carriage rides, kids activities and pictures with Santa. Stores city wide stay open late for the celebration. In 2006, merchants agreed to continue the celebration with Christmas on the

Square, staying open every Saturday evening in December, featuring carriage rides, carolers and last-minute shopping bargains. The most recent project of the Decatur Main Street program is the renovation of the historic Post Office Building. An anonymous donation of \$50,000 was the catalyst to get the project started with an additional \$100,000 pledged by city council. The building will become a visitors center and is scheduled to begin renovations soon.

2007 Annual Conference



Learn how to envision, plan and implement ideas that will turn your Downtown into Wowtown! Where and when? The annual Texas Downtown Revitalization Conference in Fort Worth is the place, and October 16-18 are the dates.

The Texas Downtown Association and Texas Main Street Center annually partner to produce this educational and networking opportunity. This year, Downtown Fort Worth, Inc. joins the group as the local host organization. An exciting schedule of educational sessions, tours and exhibits have been planned. Topping the list of outstanding speakers is Kennedy Lawson Smith, the former director of the National Main Street Center and one of the nation's foremost experts on commercial district revitalization and development. Today Kennedy is with the Community Land Use and Economics (CLUE) Group.

Kennedy will be delivering the conference keynote address, titled "The Road Ahead." As Kennedy states, "From gas prices to green architecture, the trends that shape America's decisions about where to live, work and shop are changing — quickly. My keynote session will discuss some of these changes and how they're likely to affect downtowns in the years ahead." Kennedy will also provide a second conference session on "Creating a Dynamic Business Mix."

Other conference sessions include: Downtown 101, Sustainable Communities, Ordinances Every Downtown Should Have, Wowtown Festivals, and Playing Well With Others-Better Boards. There will also be walking tours of Sundance Square, downtown Fort Worth's popular mixed-use district, and South Downtown, where new construction, parks and historic buildings are revitalizing this end of downtown Fort Worth. A special treat will be the Downtown Urban Living Tour, where attendees will see downtown Fort Worth's most sought after residential properties.

Another special function is the Texas Main Street Luncheon on October 17th. At this luncheon, representatives from several local Main Street programs will share some local successes of which they are most proud. National Rec-

New Economic Research Tool

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs proudly introduces Texas EDGE, an online research service designed to help local governments and economic development organizations analyze facts and figures. This expanded research service will provide governments, developers and

businesses across the state with data and analysis useful in revenue planning, financial analysis, economic forecasting, site location decisions and other issues affecting trade and industry growth. "We are putting vital information to use while enabling local governments and businesses to make important decisions regarding economic development," Combs said. "With Texas EDGE, you're not required to know a complicated system, and vou do not have to master special analysis tools. Main Street National Certification

Establish yourself as an expert in the revitalization field and build your professional skills to manage a commercial district revitalization program and resolve complex problems. The Main Street National Certification Institute will be held January 21–25, 2008. It is not a course for beginners; it is designed to give seasoned professionals advanced tools and problem-solving skills. The methodology taught is grounded in the Main Street Four-Point Approach, and those attending should be well-versed in its principles. Applicants must demonstrate they have had training in the basics of the Main Street Approach. 2008 admissions applications must be received on or before October 29, 2007. See

My Hometown Helper Grant Program

To be considered as one of a Dozen Distinctive Destinations, a place must provide an authentic and dynamic visitor experience; have a heritage tourism infrastructure, such as unique shopping, dining or lodging (e.g., historic hotels); have interesting and attractive historic architecture and/or cultural landscapes; and organizations actively working to promote and protect the community's historic assets. This is a great opportunity for Main Street cities to get attention and a great opportunity for rural and urban communities.
