Spotlight... The Holiday Season on Main Street

All of our Texas Main Street cities have wonderful downtown events during the holidays—unfortunately, far too numerous to mention each one. Included here is a glimpse at the variety of creativity in our Texas cities during the holidays.

New Braunfels

Wassailfest is held in charming historic downtown New Braunfels on the first Thursday in December each year, (Dec. 6, 2007). Downtown businesses and boutiques open their doors to the community offering a unique blend of Wassail. Wassail is a special blend of apple cider and spices. (The origin of Wassail dates back to England and means "to your Health.")

Wassailfest attendees vote for their favorite Wassail and enter to win prizes from downtown businesses. A variety of Christmas music is performed throughout the historic district by church and school choirs.

Community groups offer a selection of ethnic foods around Main Plaza located in the center of downtown. Thousands of Christmas lights illuminate the district, adding to the charm of this special hometown experience.

Marshall

The Wonderland of Lights in Marshall began in 1987 and is known as the Grandaddy of Texas Lighting Festivals, with more than 10 million lights in the community. The festival begins the Wednesday night before Thanksgiving and runs through December 31. The festival rivals any

Christmas lighting scene in the country. The Historic Harrison County Courthouse is the festival's crown jewel decorated with more than 125,000 lights. Festivities include historic home tours, live entertainment, Church of the Bells, carriage rides, bus tours of the trail of lights, parade, ice skating, real snow and more.



Nacogdoches

For more than a decade, the Nine Flags Festival has paid homage to the rich and spirited history of the oldest town in Texas. That history includes three attempts to establish a Republic of Texas. Thus, nine flags have flown over Nacogdoches as opposed to the six that have represented Texas. They are French, Spanish,

Magee-Gutierrez, Dr. James Long, Mexican, Fredonia Rebellion, Lone Star, Confederate Stars and Bars and United States of America.

Since its conception in 1997, the Nine Flags Festival has become one of the premier holiday celebrations in the state and has been recognized by the Texas Legislature for its community education and historic restoration efforts. The 11th annual Nine Flags Festival will pay special tribute to the French flag with special events planned to recognize the town's French influence. Some of the activities include a lighted Christmas parade, two fireworks displays, a holiday tour of homes, breakfast with Santa Claus and a 5K run. This year the festival will be held Nov. 16 -Dec. 8.

Kilgore

The Mount Kilgore Snow Hill, featuring 40,000 pounds of ice made into a snowhill for sledding, is the premier holiday event in Kilgore. Each year the Kilgore Chamber of Commerce brings snow to downtown for the 20-foot tall Mt. Kilgore snow hill. Towering over the buildings of downtown celebrating Kilgore's history are 60 towering oil derricks representing the more than 1,100 producing wells in Kilgore at the height of the oil boom. This was once known as the world's richest acre. These derricks are topped with shining stars during the holidays helping the city maintain its title as the state's official "City of Stars." The event is filled with children's activities, horse and buggy tours and shopping.

Levelland

Ladies Night Out includes horse drawn carriages downtown transporting shoppers from one locale to the next. Local escorts dressed in Char-

les Dickens costumes will be the doormen for the evening. Christmas music will play over the downtown sound system to compliment the evening event. Local business customer lists help form the invitation lists. The focus is for customers to come and make their Christmas wish lists and to do a little shopping as well.

Corsicana

The second annual World Christmas Market will take place in downtown Corsicana this December. Different areas of downtown will represent four countries and will highlight Christmas traditions, foods and decorations of those countries. Trees will be decorated for each country. Area schools will be invited to participate in the research and decoration for each country. Celebrated countries change yearly. There is also an international pavilion where more countries are recognized and celebrated.

Grapevine

Grapevine is fast becoming the Christmas Capital of Texas and as such, historic downtown Grapevine and surrounding areas in the city will be converted to a winter wonderland this holiday season. Their Lone Star Christmas event, taking place November 15 thru January 5, features 1.2 million twinkling holiday lights, magical train sets, a 40-foot tall Christmas tree, a life-size gingerbread house and more. And don't be

surprised if you run into Santa, Mrs. Claus, live reindeer, or a variety of strolling holiday entertainers!

Grapevine's Carol of Lights includes local choirs and sing-alongs as the switch is thrown in historic downtown illuminating thousands of lights. Also enjoy classic holiday movies during the season on the big screen at the historic Palace Theatre.

Rolling to the tune of numerous festive marching bands, the Parade of Lights illuminates historic downtown with 100 colorfully lighted floats. This is North Texas' largest lighted Christmas parade.

If you are ready to get out of the house after Christmas, the Grapevine vintage railroad will be waiting for you!

AROUND THE STATE IN MAIN STREET

Main Street **Del Rio** sponsored their first Monster Mash on Main in October that filled two blocks of Main Street. Activities included a costume contest, trackless train ride, games, food, entertainment, etc. The board sold 300 tickets and

an additional 200 persons paid at the gate. And they did this all without having a manager — kudos to the advisory board!

Entertainment in Cotton Square
Park was held each Friday in October in downtown **Lufkin**. In conjunction with breast cancer awareness month, they had huge pink bows adorning the trees and awards prize tickets to the hospital's Power of Pink luncheon. On the third Friday the Lufkin police department Crime Stoppers band played with lunch sold by the department's Relay for Life Team. Two baskets were also given away each Friday with items donated by downtown merchants.

Mt. Vernon had its biggest ever Countryfest in October with over 5000 in attendance. A great addition to the festivities was the Preservation Texas traveling courthouse exhibit.

In September, **Pharr** unveiled its 11th historical marker. The "Pharr Volunteer Fire Dept." is also the only one in the lower Rio Grande Valley to honor volunteers in its title. Pharr now has the most historical markers in the Pharr-San Juan-Alamo Metroplex.

Spur's Showcase Your Talent fundraiser netted \$1,648 for restoration projects.
