STRATEGY DESCRIPTION AND JUSTIFICATION:

Nutrition services including both congregate and home delivered meals (see service description below) are the highest funded Older Americans Act programs. Nutrition services are delivered through approximately 200 providers across the state and are vital to maintaining healthy, independent living for older persons. This reduces the burden on the state's long-term care system and health-related costs. Services are also provided for nutrition consultation, education, and counseling.

Congregate Meals: Meals that comply with the Dietary Guidelines for Americans and provides a minimum of one-third (1/3) of the daily recommended dietary allowances (RDA) as established by the Food and Nutrition Board of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Science and are served in a congregate setting. These include standard meals and therapeutic meals/liquid supplements.

Home Delivered Meals: Meals that comply with the Dietary Guidelines for Americans and provides a minimum of one-third (1/3) of the daily recommended dietary allowances (RDA) as established by the Food and Nutrition Board of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Science and are delivered to an eligible person in his/her place of residence. The objective is to help recipients sustain healthy, independent living. These include standard meals and therapeutic meals/liquid supplements.

Statutory Authority: Human Resource Code, §§101.008, 101.022, 101.025, 101.027, 101.030, and 101.008; Older Americans Act, 42 USC Chapter 35.

EXTERNAL/INTERNAL FACTORS IMPACTING STRATEGY:

Nutrition services, primarily home delivered meals, have received increased funding throughout the years. The Older Americans Act was reauthorized in November 2000. The reauthorization increased the categorical transfer authority from 30 to 40 percent between congregate and home delivered meal programs and from 20 to 30 percent between supportive services and nutrition programs. While the state has observed a decrease in congregate meals and an increase in home-delivered meals, current data indicates the number of congregate meals served across the state have began to increase. This may be attributed to the economy as well as the establishment of additional meal sites. Nutrition programs continue to depend heavily on the use of volunteers. These volunteers contribute a tremendous value to these programs. If not for volunteers, meal programs would be forced to hire drivers and additional staff. As a result, the cost per meal would increase and the number of meals and older persons served would decrease.

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
