There are essentially three activities. The manufacturing of pulp involves separating the cellulose fibers from other impurities in wood or used paper. The manufacturing of paper involves matting these fibers into a sheet. Converted paper products are made from paper and other materials by various cutting and shaping techniques and includes coating and laminating activities. *NAICS 3221 (Pulp, Paper, and Paperboard Mills) and 3222 (Converted Paper Product Mfg).
