

INTRODUCTION

he South Llano River State Park and Walter Buck Wildlife Management Area (WMA), a 2,630-acre tract in Kimble County, Texas, lies on the west central Edwards Plateau. The clear, usually placid South Llano River courses through the tract. Bottomlands of the South Llano support a local forest of pecan, elm, oak and sycamore that shelters a significant winter roost for the Wild Turkey.

Canyons on the escarpment support diverse deciduous woodlands of hackberry, persimmon, walnut and several species of oak including Live Oak, Shin Oak, Spanish Oak, Lacey Oak and some Chinquapin Oak. Juniper (mostly Blue-berry Cedar) and oak woodlands cover the canyon slopes. Mesquite and succulents are more common in the lowland areas.

Bird life is characteristic of the canyons of the Edwards Plateau with numerous typically western, "arid-land species" present. Woodlands and gallery forests, particularly along the South Llano River, are excellent habitats in which to observe migrants.

Green Kingfishers and Black Phoebes can be seen foraging along the clear river. Ringed Kingfishers, though uncommon, can also be viewed by canoeing or kayaking mainly downstream from the park. Black-capped Vireos are represented by about 35 calling males and are usually found just inside the mouths of the canyons or in some of the higher elevations of the Walter Buck WMA. Hike the Fawn Trail in spring/early summer for this species. The Golden-cheeked Warbler is a rare nester in the area but very infrequently observed. Zone-tailed Hawks are frequently observed soaring along the river corridor both above and below the park. The park bird blinds are an excellent place to see species such as Painted Bunting (spring and summer), Black-throated Sparrow and Rufous-crowned Sparrow. During the warmer months the

Vermilion Flycatcher is a regular around the park headquarters complex or along the high fence on the entrance road. Wild Turkey can be seen foraging in the park lowlands and the WMA throughout the year.

To provide maximum protection for the winter Wild Turkey roost, the park's day use area is closed October through March. Access to the Walter Buck WMA is restricted during hunting season. Specific details can be obtained by calling Walter Buck WMA at (325) 446-3617. Information on South Llano River State Park can be obtained by calling the park at (325) 446-3994.

This checklist was originally compiled by Dr. Nick Jackson, formerly of Junction, and represented observations in the area since 1980. It included five years worth of records contributed by C.C. and Iris Wiedenfeld, formerly of San Angelo. In 2004, the checklist was revised by Rhandy J. Helton, TPWD Biologist (Ret.) and Ann Lemon of Junction. A revision of this checklist would not have been possible without the contributions and observations provided by park birding hosts Bill and Rosita Shane. The revised checklist was reviewed by TPWD Wildlife Biologist Gilbert Guzman and TPWD Wildlife Resource Biologist Mark Lockwood. Nomenclature and organization for this checklist follow the 7th edition of the A.O.U. *Check-list of North American Birds* as currently supplemented.

Please report any new or unusual observations to the state park headquarters or to Rhandy J. Helton or Ann Lemon in Junction. For additional help with finding birds in this area contact the park birding hosts or the checklist compilers.

Please help us protect the natural avian communities in our parks by refraining from using playback tapes of bird songs. Frequent use of these tapes disrupts normal avian activity patterns, including essential territorial behavior, and may lead to nest failure. Thank you for your cooperation.
