Lost Maples

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Hidden deep in a remote Hill Country canyon lies a fall color display that rivals any found in New England. Each November at Lost Maples State Natural Area, bigtooth maple trees transform into a spectacular blaze of red, yellow and orange hues. During the rest of the year, the park is less crowded and visitors can enjoy the park's other beautiful characteristics — steep, rugged limestone canyons, bubbling springs, plateau grasslands, wooded slopes and clear streams — at their leisure.



Camping: Campsites with water and electricity. Primitive camping areas.



Picnicking: Day-use area with tables and rest rooms.



Birdwatching: Especially rewarding during the spring.



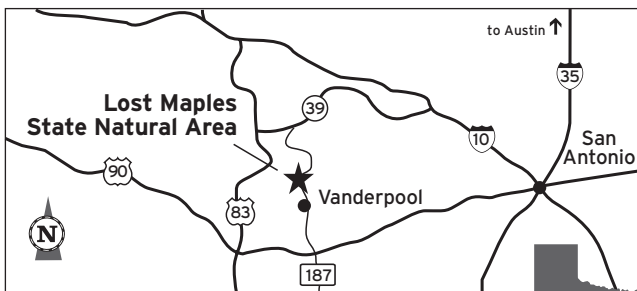
Trails: Nature trail wanders through bigtooth maples. Ten miles of hiking trails.



Interpretive Center: Exhibits about local natural history.
