#### 2. State's Primary Education Funding Formulae

Two formulae known as Basic State Aid and Additional State Aid were used.

#### Basic State Aid

Funding through the Basic State Aid formula provides state equalization funding to school districts. Each school district has a revenue control limit (RCL) established by the State. This determines how much money each district may expend each year. The RCL is determined by:

- Student enrollment adjusted for size and grade level,
- Add-on funding for disabled students, English language learners, K-3 students
- Transportation as determined by the route-miles per student and ancillary expenses such as bus passes and field trips calculated by each district
- Teacher experience in relation to a calculation of an average district
- Soft capital funding
- · Capital outlay revenue limit
- If the school qualifies as rural or small then additional funding is available

Districts receive revenue streams including property taxes, other dedicated taxes, and State support. Districts that are unable to raise sufficient funding locally receive Basic State Aid. In this manner Basic State Aid provides State funding in such a way as to equalize funding across districts with disparate property tax bases.

#### Additional State Aid

State law requires the State to provide a partial offset for local property tax revenue growth due to property tax-base valuation increases. The State provides to districts 39% of each homeowner's primary property tax rate up to a maximum of \$580. Additional State Aid also provides funding for the portion of any primary property tax total that exceeds 1% of the value of the home. The Arizona Constitution prohibits primary property tax assessment totals above 1% of the value of the home.

APPENDIX C Part 5, Section A (5)

5. Process for Awarding Funds to Public IHE's

The Governor's Office will require IHE's to apply for funds. Upon successful application, each university will receive funds in proportion to eligible reductions taken from the FY 2008 base. Community colleges will receive funds in proportion to eligible reductions where applicable, and through approved statutory funding formulae. The Governor's Office will evaluate the anticipated uses of funds using the following preliminary criteria:

- Accountability, Transparency, and Reporting
   The Governor's Office will be working with IHE's to ensure effective and rigorous
   mechanisms exist at each institution to measure and ensure compliance with ARRA
   accountability, transparency, and reporting requirements for all monies including
   Stabilization Fund dollars.
- Limit Tuition and Fee Increases
   IHE's will use stabilization funds, as coordinated by the Office of the Governor, to mitigate tuition and fee increases. Institutions will be required to provide detailed analysis of tuition and fee increases that were avoided through the use of Stabilization Fund dollars.
- Prevent Personnel Reductions
   Each institution will be expected to use the funds, where practicable, to prevent reductions in personnel that would disrupt or degrade academic functionality and quality of instruction.
- 4. Drive Higher Education Reform Coordinated by the Governor's Office, IHE's will be expected to use funds to drive fundamental reform in the State's higher education system. New methods of delivering higher education and improving accessibility among the State's rural communities will be considered. Frameworks for more effectively providing postsecondary education in a rapid-growth environment are also critical given the State's high-growth population and expanding demand for baccalaureate opportunities.
- Mitigate the Effects of One-time Funding
   Institutions will expend funds as coordinated by the Governor's Office in such
   manner as to mitigate the impact of the anticipated reduction in such funding
   availability in two years.
- 6. Create Jobs
  The overarching goal of higher education reform in the State is to create a highly educated, globally competitive workforce. Stabilization funds will be used to retain highly skilled faculty and facilitate innovative reforms, program enhancements, and facility repair and modernization needed to produce a more efficient, effective higher education system.

On behalf of the citizens of the State of Arizona, please find enclosed for your review the application for the State Fiscal Stabilization funding pursuant to the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA).

As is the case in many states across the nation, Arizona's budget has been hit hard by the recession. In the midst of this financial distress I have been working continuously to minimize the impact of budget cuts on education at all levels. The \$1.017 billion in ARRA funds for Arizona will not balance our state budget, nor prevent significant spending reductions. However, they will certainly provide us assistance in protecting K-12 and higher education from massive reductions despite our severe budget shortfalls.

These funds will play a role in helping us mitigate teacher layoffs and student tuition increases while I work with the Arizona Legislature to prepare a comprehensive and sustainable state budget plan that prepares for an eventual funding cliff. For example, in applying these monies to universities I have called upon the Arizona Board of Regents to prepare a new business model that would avoid a devastating cliff when stimulus funds are exhausted.

Further, it is my intent to use the Government Services Fund in four key areas including education reform, health care and children's programs, innovation, technology and economic development, and public safety. I plan to assign allocations at a later date after our budget situation for FY 2010 and FY 2011 is clarified.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit this application and I look forward to working with you and your staff as we move ahead with implementation of ARRA funding.
