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Threat of Well Contamination Eliminated on Fragile Alaskan Coast

Potential contamination on Alaska's
Drew Point has been averted, thanks to a
\$16.8 million ARRA contract to plug and abandon the Drew
Point Well which was threatened by coastal erosion. The well is located on the

Beaufort Sea on the northern coast of Alaska in the National Petroleum Reserve-Alaska (NPRA). The remediation project was completed in April 2010.

Severe coastal erosion along the Beaufort Sea has threatened a number of old exploratory wells drilled before BLM became manager of these lands. The Drew Point Well was drilled in 1978 by the United States Geological Survey as an exploratory well and has served as a temperature monitoring well since its completion. Annual temperature readings were taken in the well hole to help scientists understand global temperature patterns and effects on permafrost.

The contract to plug, remediate and abandon the well was awarded to a small company owned by Native Alaskans. The communities of Nuiqsut, Barrow
