Youth Stewardship Volunteers are needed at Hanauma Bay to educate park users about proper reef etiquette, to minimize human impact at the bay and to promote stewardship for Hawaii's coastal resources.

We ask our youth stewardship volunteers to be:

- At least 16-21 years old
- Have their own transportation to and from the Bay
- Commit to one four-hour shift per week for a minimum of two months. Shifts run every day from 9 a.m. – 1 p.m. (except on Tuesdays when the park is closed for maintenance)
- Shift rotations cover 2 volunteer stations: The Entranceway and the Education Center Lookout
- No experience is necessary!

2011 Youth Stewardship Volunteer Training will be held mid-June on Wednesday mornings from 9 a.m.-12 p.m. The sessions will cover an introduction to park history and interpretation, proper reef etiquette practices, frequently asked questions, Hawaiian fish and invertebrate identification, Hawaiian culture, and coastal plant identification.
