Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Norton Schwartz joined service leaders for a Pentagon ceremony marking the 150th anniversary of the Medal of Honor. "During World Wars I and II, American Airmen routinely performed with valor, meriting the honor and respect of a grateful nation. Four Airmen were awarded the nation's highest honor for heroic deeds in the first world war, and 38 were awarded the medal during the second world war," General Schwartz said.

Military OneSource also offers families a host of online moving resources, including "Plan My Move," which features a moving calendar and travel and arrival checklists, and "Military Installations," which links families to information about their new base and the local community.

Active duty Air Force positions available

Air Force officials are accepting applications from Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve members who wish to serve on active duty. Prior-service members who separated from the Air Force with an honorable discharge may be eligible to enter active duty in a number of career fields. FAMILY, HEALTH AND SAFETY

TRICARE extends Web-based counseling program

The <u>TRICARE Assistance Program</u> has been extended through March 20, 2012. This demonstration program lets active-duty service members and their families' beneficiaries use the Internet and a webcam to speak face-to-face with mental health counselors 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year from any U.S. location. Rollout approaches for Young Adult TRICARE enrollment

TRICARE will soon allow qualified young adults, up to age 26, to purchase military health plan coverage on a month-to-month basis. <u>TRICARE</u> will to roll out the new Young Adult Program, including an option to make coverage retroactive to Jan. 1, in the near future.

Classes aim to spark interest in science, technology

<u>Department of Defense Education Activity</u> officials will roll out four innovative classes in some DOD high schools in the fall, with plans for a wider-scale launch to follow if the program proves successful. The courses are robotics engineering, biotechnology engineering, gaming technology and green-technology engineering.

Application Period Open for Operation Purple Summer Camp

The National Military Family Association is now accepting applications for <u>Operation Purple Summer Camps</u>. This free summer camp program supports military children, ages 7-17, dealing with the stress of war. Each camp is "purple" and open to children of active duty, National Guard or Reserve service members from all branches of the military. Applications will be accepted until April 29th. Priority is given to military children with a parent deployed or deploying anytime between September 2010 and December 2011.

April 1, 1954 - President Eisenhower signed into law a bill creating the Air Force Academy.

April 1, 1972 – Air Training Command activated the Community College of the Air Force at Randolph AFB, Texas.

April 3, 1967 - Chief Master Sgt. Paul W. Airey became the first chief master sergeant of the Air Force.

April 6, 1924 – Four specially built Douglas World Cruisers -- each with a crew of two men -- set off for the first flight around the world.

April 6, 1949 – The X-1 rocket plane flew at 1,000 mph, an unofficial world-record speed for piloted planes.

April 6, 1959 – NASA announced that seven pilots from the U.S. armed services are chosen for the Mercury astronaut program. Airmen selected are Capts. L. Gordon Cooper Jr., Virgil I. Grissom and Donald K. Slayton.
