Senior Air Force leaders, scholars discuss national security challenges

Secretary of the Air Force Michael Donley and several other senior Air Force leaders participated in the third annual National Security Scholars Conference at the University of Southern California. The conference provided an opportunity for foreign policy and international security experts from 14 different West Coast universities and think tanks to discuss the Air Force's strategic direction and its contribution to national defense.

CURRENT ISSUES

Air Force officials announce criteria for basing of TACP/ALO training

The current Tactical Air Control Party/Air Liaison Officer schoolhouse at Hurlburt Field, Fla., lacks adequate facilities to produce the required number of TACPs and ALOs due to an increased demand to support Army units. Basing criteria includes mission and training requirements; facilities and infrastructure; support capacity; and costs. The release of the candidate bases for the TACP/ALO schoolhouse is expected in summer 2011.

Officials announce Eglin as MQ-1 squadron candidate base

The Eglin Air Force Base complex in Florida is a candidate for an Air Force Reserve Command MQ-1 Remote Split-Operations squadron consisting of 140 personnel and associated equipment. There are no remotely-piloted aircraft associated with this action, only ground control systems. Based on the results of these efforts, officials expect to announce the preferred alternative in summer 2011.

Air Force announces fighter training mission preferred basing decision

Randolph Air Force Base, Texas, is the preferred location for consolidation of the Introduction Fighter Fundamentals training units. As a result of the decrease in IFF graduate requirements, Air Force officials are consolidating IFF training from the current five locations down to three. The move is projected to save the Air Force approximately \$55 million over the next eight years.

PERSONNEL ISSUES

Air Force further reduces officer RIF requirements

RIF-eligible officers from previously announced competitive categories for chaplains, medical service corps and 1999 and 2000 judge advocate general year groups will not meet the September 2011 reduction-in-force board. The RIF board will now only consider: Captains: line of the Air Force, 2000 and 2003 through 2005 only. Majors: line of the Air Force, 2000; judge advocate general, 2001 through 2003; and biomedical service corps, 2000 and 2001. For detailed criteria, visit the Air Force personnel services website.

Some officer development applications due by May 31

Officers considering 2012 advanced academic degree and experience broadening programs should get their applications started, since some applications are due as early as May 31. This Week in Air Force History

May 6, 1994 – First Lt. Leslie DeAnn Crosby graduated from the Air National Guard's F-16 Fighting Falcon training course in Tucson, Ariz., and became the first U.S. Air Force Reserve woman fighter pilot.

May 7-8, 1992 – The Command Band of the Air Force Reserve marched in a parade in Moscow, becoming the first U.S. military band to visit the Russian capital.

May 9, 1932 – First blind solo flight was made relying solely on instruments.

May 10, 1972 - Operation Linebacker began during the Vietnam War.

May 12, 1968 – Lt. Col. Joe M. Jackson landed his C-123 Provider on a special forces airstrip that was being overrun by hostile forces. Despite intense enemy fire, Colonel Jackson rescued a three-man combat control team, earning the Medal of Honor.

May 12, 1980 – The KC-10 Extender made its first flight.

May 13, 1911 – Lieutenants H.H. Arnold and T.D. Milling became the first Wright School Army pilots.
