How have recruiting processes changed in the past 5-10 years?

•Processes are similar, not a lot of changes to the overall process.

- Looking for the most qualified candidates
- Looking for teachable candidates
- Looking for a solid work history

•Employers still review applications for completeness and work history

•Biggest difference: Most jobs require some computer knowledge

What to avoid during an interview or other contact with potential employer:

- Not being properly dressed or groomed for the meeting/interview
- * Not engaged in the interview process
- Written communication filled with errors and mistakes
- Poor telephone etiquette
- * Late for interview
- Not who you know, it's what you know
