Overview

For more than four decades, volunteers age 55 and over have been serving their communities through Senior Corps Programs. Senior Corps Week was created as a dedicated nationwide celebration to shine a spotlight on the important impact that 450,000 Senior Corps volunteers have on America's communities. During this special week, the Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS) invites the nation to recognize the unique skills, experience, and wisdom that Americans age 55 and over use to help solve tough community challenges.

Celebrations In Local Communities

The celebration was vibrant and visible across the country as project directors and volunteers, elected officials, local media outlets, partner organizations, and community residents all did their part to recognize the contributions that Senior Corps volunteers make in their communities.

Five Governors, including Jan Brewer (R-AZ), Neil Abercrombie (D-HI), Dave Heineman (R-NE), John H. Lynch (D-NH), John Kitzhaber (D-OR) and Ben Shelly the President of the Navajo Nation — proclaimed September 19-23, 2011 "Senior Corps Week."

In Washington, acting CEO of CNCS, Robert Velasco II, and Administration of Aging (AoA) Assistant Secretary, Kathy Greenlee, signed a public Memorandum of Understanding. The agreement will increase collaboration between the two federal agencies for engaging older adults in volunteer service.

In 2010, 14,000 Senior Companions supported independent living for nearly 61,000 elderly adults. Providing transportation to doctor's appointments or helping with grocery shopping helps these elderly adults to remain independent and live in their own homes.

A Nationwide Celebration



Senior Corps Week kicked off with a splash in Times Square. The Times Square CBS JumboTron featured a 15 second PSA video celebrating Foster Grandparents, RSVP, and Senior Companions.



New CNCS data released during Senior Corps Week showed that

one in four or 18.7 million adults age 55 and older contributed **3** billion hours of service, on average, each year, a contribution worth \$64 billion to our nation.
