Beacon Therapeutic CHIPRA Team Connecting Teens to Coverage Chicago, IL



How we Began:

- Deacon's first CHIPRA grant was for outreach to homeless families living in Shelters across the Chicago metropolitan area.
- During the course of our outreach to families, we discovered that there was a significant need for outreach assistance within the teen population.

Who Are They?

According to the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Urban Institute, of all children in Illinois who are without insurance, 44.8% are between the ages of 13 – 18 years of age.

They are:

- * teens who are living in shelters
- teens living with friends or extended family members
- * teens living on the streets
- * teens at home with their parents

Barriers

- Barriers that are specific to the teen population include:
- Do not think they need health coverage
- Lack of knowledge of the way the "system" works
- Difficulty navigating the system
- Difficulty providing documentation
- Transportation to a Community Service Center
- For teens still at home, parents unwilling to sign paperwork or pay premiums

Perceived Need:

- Deften teens do not perceive a need for coverage. There are a fair amount of free medical services available to teens that offer STI and AIDS testing, treatment for STI's and some pregnancy prevention education/services.
- Various Mobile Health Vans and School Based Health Centers are also available to teens without medical coverage, and provide general health care as well as reproductive services.

Lack of Knowledge/Difficulty Navigating System:

- Teens are often not aware of how the system works and have difficulty navigating the rules and regulations of the system.
- If they are told they do not qualify or that their parent needs to apply they accept this from the 'authority figure'
- Often the system discourages teens from getting coverage

Documentation:

- When teens leave home precipitously they do not grab all their documents
- Because there are often strained or absent relationships with parents, parents do not cooperate with teens in allowing them access to their documents
- Parents do not want to drop teens from their case as this will mean a reduction in benefits to the parent

Transportation:

Teens rarely have access to transportation to offices and if there is not a good city transportation system, they have difficulty getting to offices

Transience:

In situations where teens are leaving their parents home, they may not be stably housed elsewhere; they may move from shelter to shelter or couch to couch

Strategies to reach this population:

- Information and education targeted to the teen audience materials appealing to teens (palm card, toothbrushes, condoms)
- Use of electronic media (Facebook)
- use of e-mails for contact as addresses and cell numbers change (renewals)

Strategies cont'd:

- Network with agencies/facilities that serve the teen population
- Deffer incentives for teen to teen referrals
- ▶ Go to THEM don't wait for them to come to you

What we do:

- We meet with teens in shelters, the library, schools, in homes and sometimes in the car!
- We explain the procedure and timeline for applications
- If teens are living at home with parents, parents income information and signature is needed, otherwise we complete application using only the teenagers information

What we do cont'd:

- We bring our computers, scanners, and in our next grant term - mobile printer/fax machines
- We assist with completing application, scan documents into our computer, complete an electronic submission of the application and fax supporting documents to the central office in Springfield

What we Do cont'd:

- We are able to track application, and assist with any problems that may arise through the application process (applicant signs release)
- Once applicant is approved we deliver an approval packet with health and hygiene items and a small gift card plus important phone numbers
- In our ongoing efforts we will be including the promotional items with our contact information

Outreach:

We attend many Health Fairs, speak to parent and teen groups, and network with youth providers to spread information about All Kids and Beacon's Outreach enrollment assistance

Overcoming Barriers:

- We come to the teen, so there is no need for transportation
- use of Homeless Certification documents allows homeless teens to get state ID free of charge
- School ID's can be used for identification; in rare cases we were able to use a photo along with a certifying letter from the shelter

Overcoming Barriers cont'd

- State can use data match from SSA to verify identity so birth certificate is not mandatory
- The state gives a certain amount of leeway in applications on behalf of homeless teens
- All Kids Liaisons have been of enormous assistance, obtaining information from local offices and assisting us when we hit 'snags' with applications
