Updated Information

Calculating and Reporting Job Creation and Retention for Recipients of Recovery Act Funding from Office of Justice Programs, Office on Violence Against Women, and Office of Community Oriented Policing Services

The Office of Management and Budget issued OMB Memorandum M-10-08: Updated Guidance on the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act—Data Quality, Non-Reporting Recipients, and Reporting of Job Estimates (http://www.whitehouse.gov/omb/assets/memoranda_2010/m10-08.pdf) on December 18, 2009 based on feedback from the reporting period ending September 30, 2009. This updated guidance includes important simplifications to the manner in which job estimates are calculated and reported.

The major changes to the calculation and reporting of jobs funded by the Recovery Act are as follows:

- All jobs that are funded or partially-funded by Recovery Act funding are reported (whether created, retained, or existing).
- Jobs data are reported on a quarterly, rather than a cumulative, basis.
- The "award date" is no longer the starting point for calculating the number of days for determining a FTE.
- Recipients can make corrections to reported data until day 22. If DOJ unlocks
 the report by posting a comment in FederalReporting.gov during days 23-29, the
 recipient will be able to make corrections to the report. In addition, recipients will
 be able to make corrections from day 33 until the end of the subsequent

- Recipients will not report on indirect jobs—those resulting from purchases of materials and products.
- Statistical methodology is not a permissible method for estimating jobs data.

The following chart provides a side-by-side comparison of guidance previously issued by the Department of Justice (DOJ) and the new OMB guidance to clarify the changes. It is essential, however, for recipients and subrecipients to thoroughly review the new OMB guidance at the link, above.

Effective February 1, 2010, the www.FederalReporting.gov solution will be open for data corrections. Recipients not required to report jobs impacts of retail purchases, but must report impacts of purchases greater than \$500,000. Recovery Act-funded purchases greater than \$500,000 require reporting of jobs impacts using the FTE calculations.	Recipients should not report the jobs impact of purchases. Recipients are not required to report the jobs impacts of Recovery Act funding on materials suppliers and central service providers ("indirect" jobs) or on local community ("induced' jobs). However, prime recipients should continue to generate estimates of job impact by directly collecting specific data from subrecipients and vendors on the total FTE resulting from the sub-award.

In limited circumstances, permission could be granted to estimate job data using statistical methodology to estimate jobs impacts. If collecting actual numbers will create an unreasonable burden and disrupt the recipient's ability to effectively implement the underlying mission of the program, agencies could permit grantees to statistically estimate jobs.	Permission to use estimate the job data using statistical methodology will not be granted. The new guidance removes the option to use statistical methodology for estimating job data. M-10-08, Section 5.8
	Jobs that are paid initially with non-Recovery Act dollars may be reported as created or retained as long as such dollars eventually will be reimbursed by Recovery Act funds for the jobs reported. M-10-08, Sections 5.1, 5.2 and 5.9
	Jobs funded partially with Recovery Act funds are counted based on the proportion funded by Recovery Act funding. M-10-08, Sections 5.1, 5.3 and 5.5

Additional Key Principles:

- Recipients and subrecipients must maintain documentation supporting all reports of jobs created and retained.
- Recipients are asked to provide a narrative description of the jobs impact in the "description of jobs created" field of www.FederalReporting.gov to describe jobs impacts, including any impacts not appearing in the "Number of jobs" field.
- Recipients should also report on jobs created and retained using the following suggested categories in the "Description of jobs created field":
 - Law Enforcement
 - o Detention, Probation, Parole, and Community Corrections
 - o Policy/Research/Intelligence
 - Information Technology (IT)
 - Construction/Manufacturing
 - Community/Social/Victim Services
 - Administrative/Human Resources
 - o Courts/Prosecution, Defense, And Civil Attorneys
 - Training and Technical Assistance
