School's out for summer?

Not likely for Academy cadets

While many college students spend their summers relaxing and enjoying time away from their studies, Air Force Academy cadets have a bit more on their plates.

A cadet's summer is broken up into three periods of about three weeks each. During each session cadets participate in programs ranging from summer academics and research to language and cultural immersion programs, as well as a host of other programs geared toward producing well-rounded leaders.

Depending on class year, each cadet is required to participate in at least two summer sessions before they have the opportunity to take a three-week break during the other period.

Cadets completing their freshman year must complete Global Engagement, a 10-day course that introduces them to the Expeditionary Air Force concept of deploying to a crisis situation, establishing bare-base operations, executing the mission, defending the base and re-deploying home.

They spend the remainder of the period in Airman programs like soaring, jump training and unmanned aerial systems, or in space and cyber courses.

In addition, the rising sophomores must complete Combat Survival Training, and some even complete extra course work to be better prepared for their sophomore year, according to Jim Fairman, who is the chief of summer scheduling for the Commandant of Cadets Training and Support Directorate.

Once they've completed those training requirements, they then have the opportunity to take three weeks of leave.

Rising juniors spend at least one period filling leadership cadre roles in cadet programs like Basic Cadet Training, Summer Seminar, flight programs and a host of others.

"Most of our programs are cadre-driven," Mr. Fairman said. "So our challenge is to ensure we have enough cadets filling these leadership roles for those programs to be successful."

In addition, the soon-to-be juniors also participate in Operation Air Force, a program designed to give cadets the opportunity to experience firsthand everything an operational Air Force base has to offer.

"Cadets travel to bases across the Air Force, including locations in the U.S. Central Command area of responsibility," Mr. Fairman said. "Some travel to

Lackland Air Force Base (Texas) to be assistant military training instructors for enlisted basic training. They bring the skills they learn at Lackland back to the Academy to enhance training for leadership cadre."

While rising juniors can also take leave for one three-week period, many of them choose to give up their leave to participate in cadet summer language programs, according to Mr. Fairman.

The language immersion program allows cadets to spend three weeks in foreign language studies at a university abroad while living with a host family. Other cadets participate in the cultural immersion program which provides them the opportunity to visit a foreign country and experience the culture firsthand.

By the time the cadets are rising seniors, they've met most of their training requirements, but they're still required to participate in the Academy's training events as leadership cadre.

"We have to manage training for 3,600 cadets for three summer periods, so we need all the help we can get," Mr. Fairman said. "If cadets don't choose other summer programs, we put them to work as cadre."

In addition, rising seniors may also participate in the Cadet Summer Research Program, where they spend five weeks working on a research project for a Department of Defense agency or a civilian company.

"A lot of people think cadets have the summer off," Mr. Fairman said, "but between training and leadership obligations, they really don't get much time off for vacationing like other college students."

Lorenz on Leadership: Widows and children left behind

Eight United States Air Force Airmen were shot and killed in the same action while serving our great nation and our Air Force April 27, 2011 in Kabul, Afghanistan. On that same day, three other Americans from our sister services also died in other actions around Afghanistan. These eight Airmen, two Soldiers and one Marine who died that one day in Afghanistan are American heroes who were doing their duty to protect our country while trying to help the Afghan people. They gave the ultimate sacrifice for all of us.

Those servicemembers who gave their lives that one day in April were also individuals who left behind hundreds of people who loved and respected them. I was fortunate to know three of the eight Airmen. One was a member of the Academy Class of 1999 when I was Commandant at USAFA, one worked for me at Maxwell Air Force Base, Ala., in our commander's action group, and the third had been one of my instructor pilots while flying T-1's at Randolph AFB, Texas.

I was honored to attend memorial services of two of those who died that day; one at Langley AFB, Va., and the other in the Cadet Chapel at the Air Force Academy. Both ceremonies, which I am sure represented those held all over the country for the others killed that cold day in April, were professionally accomplished with tenderness and all the people who attended were sad but proud of the lives these great Airmen had led. One of the most touching moments at one of the funerals was when the flag of our great nation was presented to the widow; she let out a cry of sadness that cut straight into everyone's heart. Then the missing man formation flew over head with such a great roar. There was not a dry eye in the crowd.

At the receptions following the funerals, we all talked about these great Americans. We reminisced and told stories about these Airmen whose lives had ended so abruptly.

ly. As the food was served after the Academy memorial, I noticed the little seven-year-old daughter of my former cadet who had grown up to fly F-16's and become a husband and a father. His daughter was dressed in her Sunday best sitting all alone in the corner of the room playing with a small toy. She looked so small and all alone, but was deeply engrossed in her game. She had read a beautiful prayer at the funeral service and everyone in the chapel sat and listened to her read with great pride and sadness. As I watched her, I realized she did not know how her whole life had changed because of the events of that cold, dark day in Afghanistan halfway around the world. She would never again be able to talk to her daddy. He would never again be able to tuck her into bed at night. Forevermore, for the rest of her life, when asked about her father she will have to say, "He died fighting for us in Afghanistan."

At the other memorial service at Langley, I was honored to present the Purple Heart to the widow of my deputy CAG chief at Maxwell. He was somewhat older since he was prior enlisted before he became an officer. As I presented the medal to his widow, also an Air force officer who has served overseas in harm's way, I saw before me her son who was born just a month before his father was killed. This young baby, who bears the name of his father, will never know or be held by the father who loved him very much. This young baby will only know his dad by the stories that others who knew his father will tell him in the future.

We all have a responsibility and duty to celebrate the lives of our Airmen, Soldiers, Sailors, Marines and Coast Guardsmen who have paid the ultimate sacrifice for our nation. However, we also must remember that for every one of them we celebrate, they each left behind moms, dads, wives, husbands and many, many children. In the years to come, please take the time to help those who are left behind. It is the ultimate way to remember those who have sacrificed so much for us all.

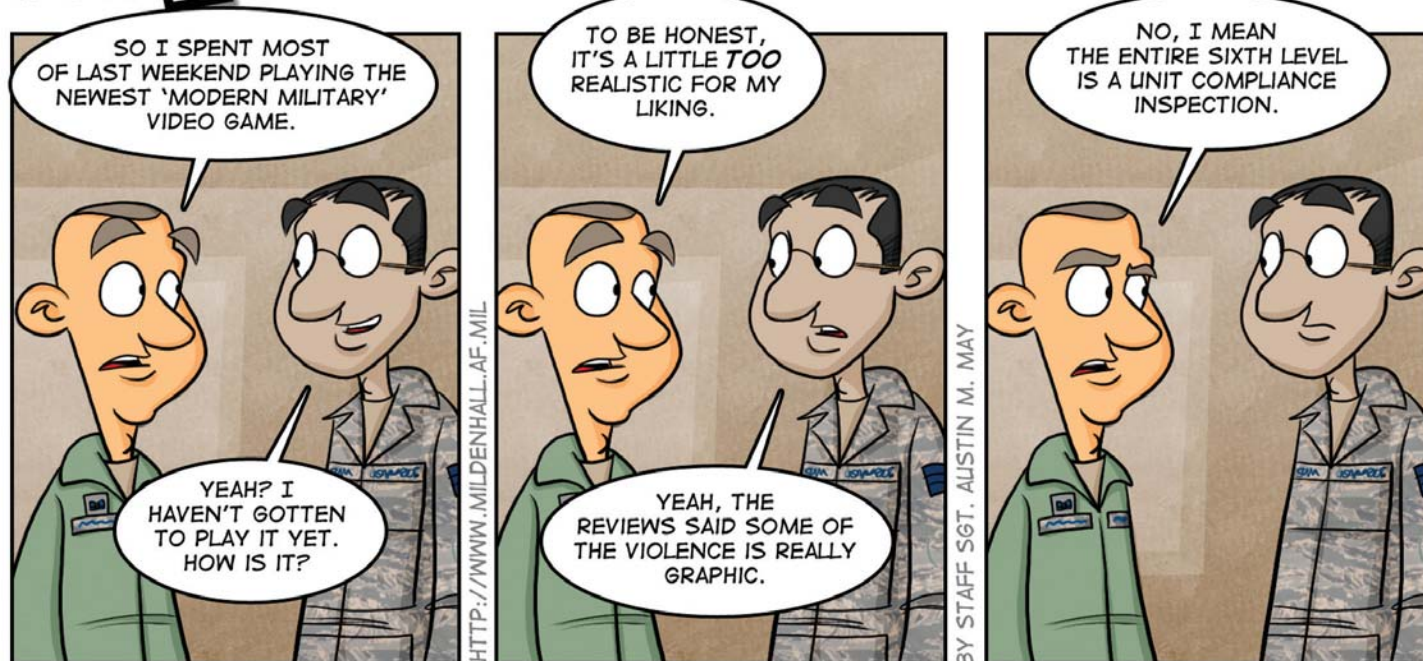

Selective Re-Enlistment Bonus

Airmen cash in on new official list

RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE, Texas (AFNS) — Enlisted members now have 77 Air Force specialties from which they can receive a selective re-enlistment bonus.

Officials said this fiscal year's program retains a heavy emphasis on retaining Airmen with 17 months to six years of service, and made adjustments in the 6 to 10 and 10 to 14 years-of-service zones. There were no adjustments in the 18 to 20 years-of-service zone.

"Balancing the enlisted force is a constant challenge; using SRBs is certainly one of the most effective retention tools the Air Force can employ to retain our number one priority ... our Airmen," said Michael McLaughlin, the chief of Air Force re-enlistments at the Air Force Personnel Center here.

Officials added no Air Force specialty codes to the list and increased 13 AFSCs in at least one zone. A total of 36 AFSCs had a zone eliminated or decreased and 13 AFSCs were removed from the program.

All increases and additions went into effect May 16, and all decreases and deletions will go into effect Wednesday. Any re-enlistments or extensions of any length completed prior to the official message release will remain valid. Airmen who are eligible for re-enlistment and are affected by decreases or removals should re-enlist before Tuesday to receive the previously approved bonus.

These bonuses do not apply to Air Force Reserve or Air National Guard members.

To determine eligibility for re-enlistment with an SRB entitlement, members should contact the career development element at their local military personnel section.

Air Force senior leaders reflect on founding Air Commando

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — The former deputy commander of the 1st Air Commando Group died Monday.

Retired Maj. Gen. John Alison was 98 years old and is survived by his wife, Penni, and son, David.

"General Alison was a superb Airman and an Air Force legend," said Secretary of the Air Force Michael Donley. "As a highly decorated World War II combat ace, veteran of the Korean War and father of Air Force Special Operations, General Alison paved the way for hundreds of thousands of warrior Airmen who followed in his footsteps. The incredible life he led remains a source of tremendous inspiration, and we are grateful for his enduring legacy of leadership, service and patriotism. On behalf of the men and women of the U.S. Air Force, we express our deepest sympathies to General Alison's wife, Penni, and to his family and friends."

Before helping to establish the 1st ACG, General Alison was a decorated fighter pilot. He was an ace with six confirmed aerial victories during World War II and continued to mentor AFSOC's Air Commandos well beyond his time in service.

His dedication to the Air Force and Special Operations earned him several accolades. In 1994, he was inducted to the Air Commando Hall of Fame, and he was selected to speak for the Air Command and Staff College's "Gath-

ering of Eagles" in 1985, 2004 and 2009. Also in 2005, he was enshrined in the National Aviation Hall of Fame, and most recently was the first inductee into the U.S. Special Operations Command's Commando Hall of Honor in October 2010.

Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Norton Schwartz recounted General Alison's contributions to the Air Force and nation.

"From his combat daring in World War II as a P-40 Warhawk pilot and a leader of the 1st ACG, to his extraordinary public service after the war, our nation owes General Alison a huge debt of gratitude," General Schwartz said. "While we mourn his passing, we can all take solace in the fact that his heroic service and sacrifice during the Second World War and afterward endures in today's special operations forces and the Air Force Association, which may well be his greatest legacy."

Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force James A. Roy noted General Alison's pioneering role in special operations.

"It is with deep sadness and respect that we mark the passing of one of the Air Force's first Air Commandos," Chief Roy said. "As a true expeditionary Airman, General Alison's legacy from World War II ace to father of Air Force Special Operations and more will endure the test of time."

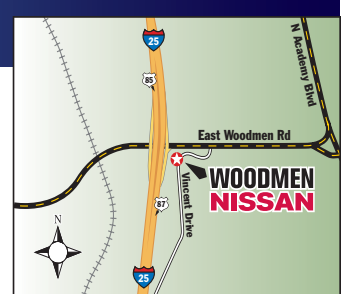

Teens soar at 11th-annual aviation camp

Thirty-six teens from around the Air Force came to the Air Force Academy from Saturday to Thursday to take part in the 11th-Annual Teen Aviation Camp.

All the 16- and 17-year old campers come from Air Force families and have parents who are active duty, retirees, reservists, or members of the Air National Guard. Teens and their families only have to pay for the cost of transportation to the Academy, the camp and its activities are free. The Air Force Services Agency sponsors and organizes the camp.

"I went to space camp a few years ago, but that is more geared towards NASA," said 16-year-old Paige Johnson of Stoneham, Colo. "Then I heard about this camp, and since I really want to fly planes, I knew this was the one for me."

Ms. Johnson's father is Col. Loren Johnson of the Air National Guard. He was a fighter pilot in the Air Force and even served as Thunderbird No. 8. She said she wants to follow in her dad's footsteps becoming a pilot or an aeronautical engineer.

Another camper, 16-year-old Jacob Swortzel said he is also inspired by his father: Lt. Col. Robert Swortzel, a reservist who trains pilots at Luke Air Force Base in Phoenix.

"I'm interested in aviation because my dad flies and I've seen what he's done in his career and I think it's great how he's served his country," Mr. Swortzel said.

Over the course of the camp, the teens were introduced to aviation and the Academy. They toured labs, met with cadets, professors, and admissions representatives, ate in Mitchell Hall, built gliders, and flew aboard T-41 Cessnas.

Camp counselors, like Payal Mehta of Minot Air Force Base, N.D., kept things running smoothly all week at the camp. She, like the other counselors, works for Air Force Services.

"The impact is the best part of being involved in camps like this," Ms. Mehta said. "These kids are our future; I want to help

lead and guide them and show them what's out there for them."

Con Fisher and Kimberly Gilman, from the Air Force Services Agency headquarters in San Antonio, organized this event.

This was Mr. Fisher's third year as the lead on this camp. He spent two years before that as a counselor.

"We are here to ensure everything runs smoothly," Mr. Fisher said of his role here.

They work with the Air Force Academy Services office to set up this camp throughout the year and when it comes time for the camp, Mr. Fisher and Ms. Gilman take over the operation on the ground.

"I like this camp," Mr. Fisher said. "It lets teens know what they need and what they should focus on if they want to get into the Academy and if they want to become pilots."

The camp wrapped up Wednesday with glider flights, tours of the Academy, an evening sit down with Academy Admissions representatives, and a close-out party. The teens departed Thursday.

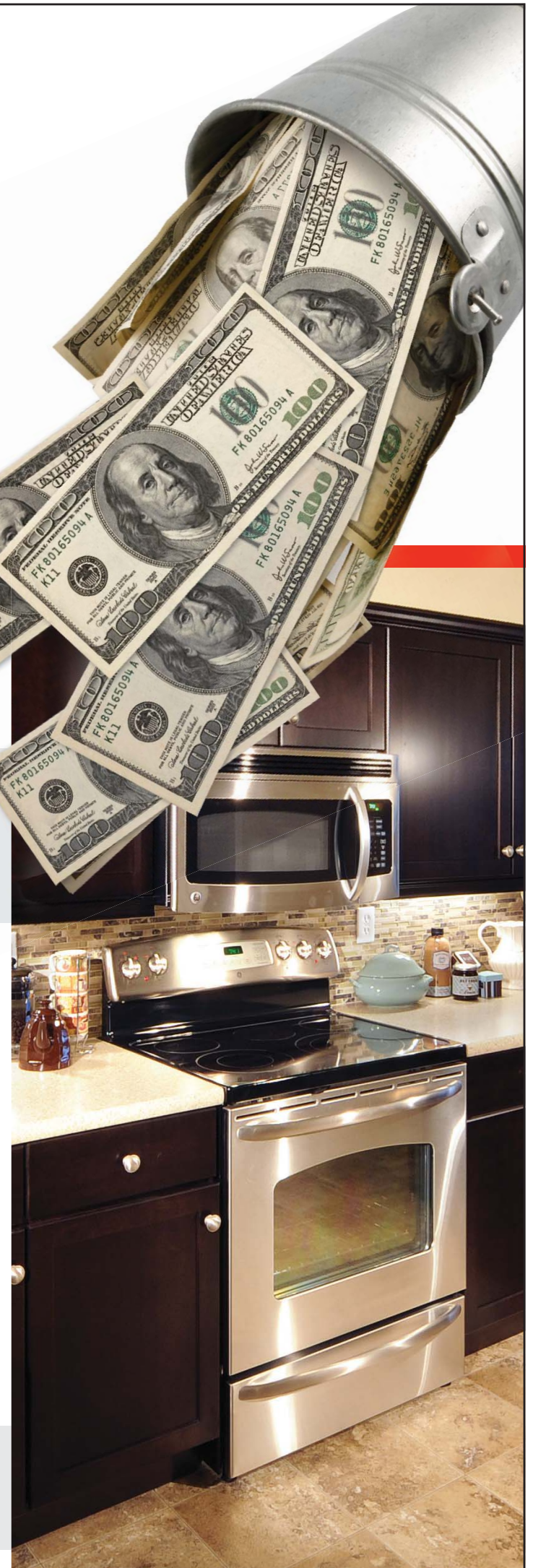

10th AMDS offers one-stop shop for medical readiness

Servicemembers now have help from a new Physical Exams section in the 10th Aerospace Medicine Squadron to ensure their individual medical readiness requirements are up-to-date.

The 10th Aerospace Medicine Squadron recently established a single point of entry to help active-duty servicemembers maintain their readiness by offering labs, immunizations, preventative and Web-based health assessments, doctor visits and hearing tests.

"By providing a single access point for IMR requirements, we hope to streamline the overall process and improve service and continuity," said Tech. Sgt. Al McGough, the Physical Exams section NCO in charge.

Under the new program, individuals and their supervisors must keep track of their medical readiness status. Sergeant McGough said the Physical Exams section will continue to send out reminders for the time being, but eventually, the responsibility will fall on the servicemember and his unit.

Active-duty Airmen can now access their medical readiness status on the Air Force Portal by selecting "Medical Readiness - Deployment Health" under the Fitness and Health drop-down menu. Airmen who find that they are yellow or red in their IMR status for a lab or an immunization, should report to that respective 10th Medical Group clinic with their ID cards.

As always, members must complete an online Web health assessment before scheduling a PHA. To complete a WHA, go to <https://afwebha.afms.mil>, then call the central appointments at 457-CARE or go to <https://www.tricareonline.com/> to schedule an appointment.

During the PHA, the Physical Exams section will review existing Air Force Form 469s, "Duty Limiting Conditions Reports," as well as medical records and interval histories for conditions that may require further evaluation. The Physical Exams section will educate, counsel and make referrals regarding identified health risks, IMR requirements, duty limitation code actions, review-in-lieu-of actions and appropriate clinical follow-ups.

Waking up to the Academy experience

High school students experience Academy life firsthand

About 350 high-school students found out Tuesday morning, about a half hour before sunrise, what distinguishes the Air Force Academy from other four-year colleges.

A half-second blast from an air horn signaled cadets to spring into action at 5:10 a.m. They pounded on doors, yelling, "Wake up! Open this door right now! Hurry up!" Young men and women dressed in gray shorts and blue T-shirts shuffled -- some more quickly than others -- into the tight hallways of Vandenberg Hall. Cadets led them through push-ups and four-count leg lifts and had them recite the phonetic alphabet or sing the Air Force Song.

Cadets 2nd Class Bryant Mateus from Cadet Squadron 17 and Allison Swaney from CS 19 were among the element leaders giving attendees a small taste of life as a freshman, or Doolie, during Basic Cadet Training.

"Get louder! You're not loud enough!" Cadet Mateus shouted. "Why was my element last week a lot louder than you are?"

"If you can't sing the Air Force Song with pride, then don't sing it at all. That's an insult to the Air Force Song," Cadet Swaney said as she told her element to start over.

That wake-up call is exactly what 17-year-old Dallas native Jared Johnson said he was looking forward to.

"I want to see if I can stand it," he said Monday afternoon, shortly after arriving here for the three-day seminar.

The Summer Seminar seeks to immerse high school juniors and seniors in cadet life to help them decide whether they want to apply for the Academy, said Lt. Col. Lee Taylor, the Academy Admissions office's regional director for much of the southwestern United States.

While the "Doolie for a Day" segment may be most memorable for attendees, it's only one facet of the overall program.

"This is our premier recruiting program," Colonel Taylor said. "We have the students live a representative sample (of Academy life) for three days so they can make an informed decision about whether they want to be here. Our goal is to motivate them to complete the process and get an appointment."

The Dean of Faculty staff worked with Admissions to create an academic information fair, a new addition to this year's seminar. The event gives students information on the Academy's core curriculum and helps them see where academics fit into the scope of cadets' professional military education.

"The students get about 90 minutes to mingle with faculty representatives from our 20 departments," said Maj. Conrad Preedom, an instructor with the Department of Management and the Dean of Faculty's project officer for this year's seminar. "The students can ask or discuss anything, but they generally want to know about how their expertise and goals align with the Academy curriculum."

More than 50 instructors offer workshops that illustrate building and flying gliders, set-

ting up a forward base, discussing ethics and philosophy and more, Major Preedom said.

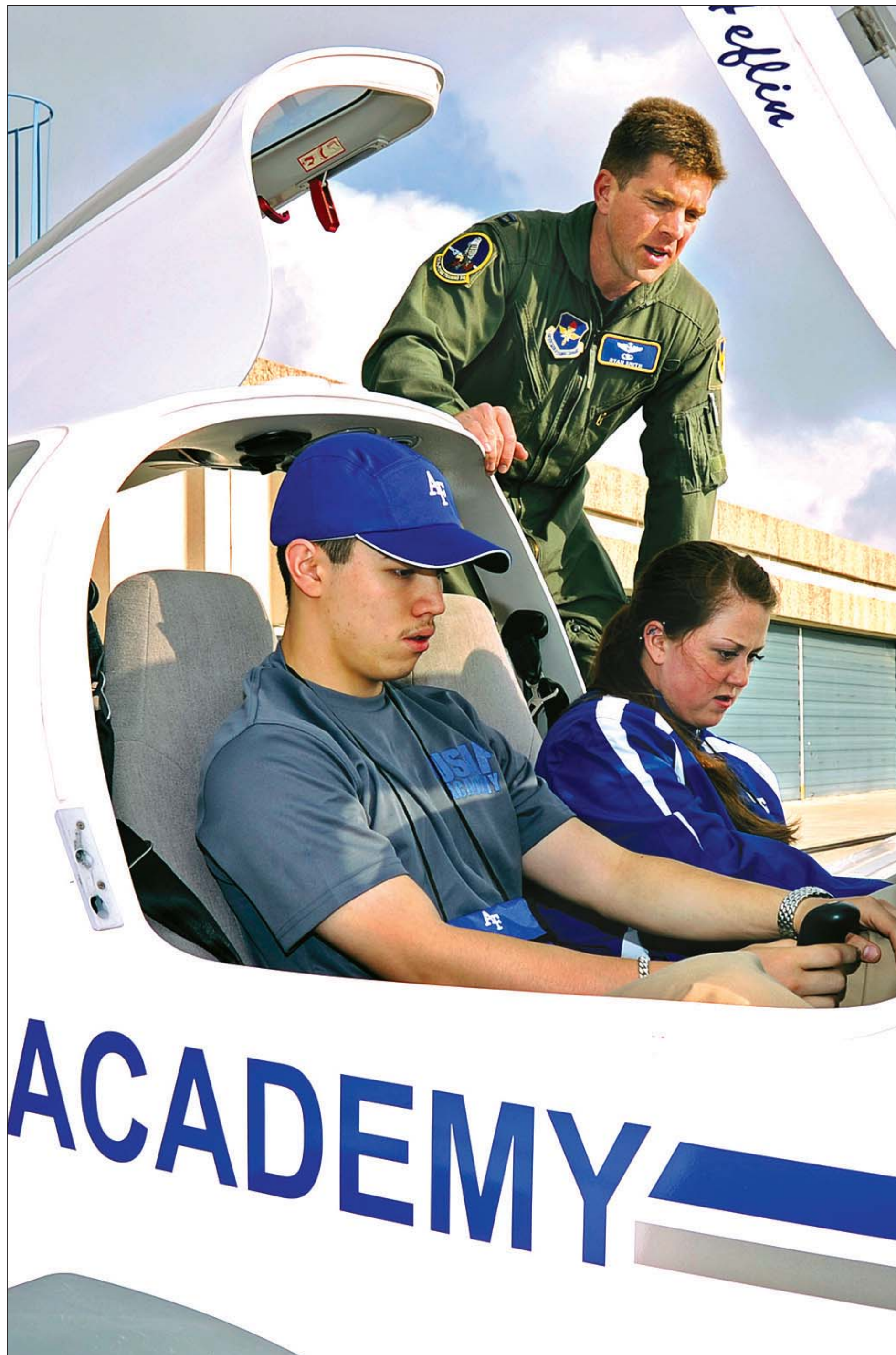
In addition, a series of "way forward" briefings informs students on how to navigate the application process and what they can expect from military life after the Academy, Colonel Taylor explained. Cadet element leaders hold question-and-answer sessions with the attendees each evening to answer miscellaneous questions about cadet life.

Those aren't the only recent changes to the Summer Seminar program. In 2009, the seminar schedule was compressed from five days to three so that the Admissions office could set up a third session, Colonel Taylor said. Based on student feedback from previous years' sessions, presenters hold their sessions in the morning and early afternoon, with physical activities scheduled toward the late afternoon and evening.

Other Summer Seminar highlights this year include an element-based scavenger hunt called the "This Amazing Place" race, modeled after the TV show, "The Amazing Race," and practice sessions for the candidate fitness assessment, which includes a one-handed basketball throw, pull-ups, push-ups, crunches and a one-mile run.

Roughly 40 percent of students lean toward applying to attend the Air Force Academy even before they arrive, Colonel Taylor said. Another 20 percent are considering either the Air Force Academy or one of the other military service academies. More than 90 percent of those who attend leave more motivated to complete the application process.

Students' families pay \$350 for the experience, which includes lodging, meals, travel to and from the Colorado Springs Airport, Air Force Academy clothing and backpacks and three 17-hour days of physical and academic activity. The price does not include transportation costs to or from Colorado Springs. Colonel Taylor said the Admissions office can waive the cost of attending Summer Seminar on a case-by-case basis.

Kazlauskis named permanent baseball coach

Air Force's interim head baseball coach has been named permanently to the position, Athletic Director Dr. Hans Mueh announced June 2.

Mike Kazlauskis retired from active duty effective June 1 and signed a three-year contract through the 2014 season.

Kazlauskis retired with the rank of major after 20 years of service with the U.S. Air Force. As the interim head coach in 2011, Kazlauskis led the Falcons to a 19-36 overall record, leading the program to the most wins since 2002. The 19 wins were also the second-most in school history against Division I opponents and the most Division I wins by a first-year head coach at the Academy.

"This is my school, and no one is more proud than I to have gone through the Academy and to have served for twenty

years in the Air Force," Kazlauskis said. "It is a tremendous honor and a privilege to be associated with the Academy and the Air Force as the Head Baseball Coach. Our job, as a staff, is to ensure success not only on the baseball field but in all facets of the Academy and that each young man is ready to lead our great country upon graduation."

Kazlauskis, known as "Coach Kaz,"

is a 1991 Academy graduate and has logged six years as an assistant coach here. He is the first Academy graduate to become head baseball coach and was the program's first military coach since 1988 prior to his retirement.

Kazlauskis came to USAFA baseball as a walk-on and started all four years. At the time of his graduation, he held eight career records and still ranks among the top six in nine of the 13 offensive categories. A two-time all-Western Athletic Conference selection, Kazlauskis led the Falcons in batting in 1989 and 1991.

After a standout baseball career with the Falcons, he spent three seasons from 1993 to 1995 as an assistant coach to former Falcon head coach Paul Mainieri, now the skipper at LSU. During this time, the Falcons posted three consecutive winning seasons. The 1994 team led the nation in batting average, slugging percentage and triples. The

1995 team won 29 games, the second most in school history. After leaving the Academy in the summer of 1995, Kaz spent four years at Charleston Air Force Base, S.C., as a pilot in a C-17 Globemaster III.

He later returned to the Academy in the fall of 2000 as an evaluator pilot in the TG-4 sailplane, T-41 Mescalero and Cessna 150 aircraft in the 94th Flying Training Squadron. In addition to his flight duties, he also served as the volunteer baseball coach for the Falcons and the Preparatory School head baseball coach. During his tenure, the 2002 Falcons set the school record for most Division I victories, and two Falcons were drafted into the minor leagues.

In 2007, Kazlauskis was inducted to the Lake County Hall of Fame in Lake County, Ill., for outstanding achievement. In 2008, he was inducted into the 14th Airlift Squadron Hall of Fame in Charleston, S.C.

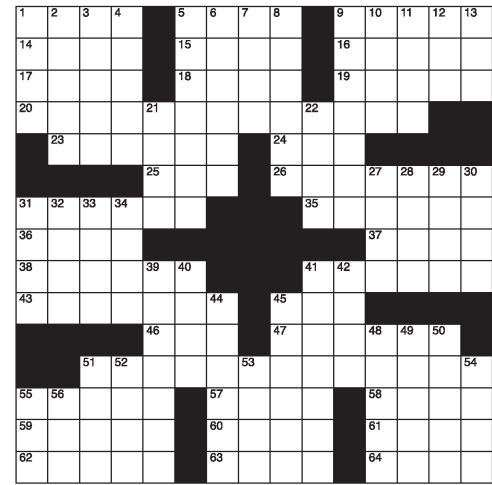

Track athletes head to NCAA championships

Cole, Tyner advance to national meet, Palicia in decathlon finals

Three track-and-field athletes traveled to Drake Stadium in Des Moines, Iowa, Wednesday for the 2011 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

Junior James Cole and senior Justin Tyner advanced to the national meet based on their finishes at the

NCAA West Preliminary Meet May 26-28; senior Noah Palicia will compete in the finals-only decathlon.

Tyner, a native of Baxter, Minn., won the steeplechase at the preliminaries with a time of 8:44.86, besting 47 others to earn an automatic berth in the national championship.

Cole, a native of Bozeman, Mont., finished 11th in the discus throw with a distance of 179 feet, the second-best throw in the Academy's history.


Palicia, a Stoneboro, Pa., native,

set the Academy's decathlon record for the 400-meter dash at the Mt. San Antonio College California Invitational Events Meet decathlon in April with a time of 48.70 seconds. He also recorded career bests in the 1,500-meter run (4:26.03), 110-meter hurdles (14.96), high jump (6' 2"), pole vault (16' 4¾") and discus throw (117' 7").

The NCAA and Drake University will webcast the championships, while CBS and CBS Sports Network (Comcast Channel 170) will

broadcast two two-hour blocks of coverage. CBS Sports will broadcast live coverage from 5:30-7:30 p.m. tonight, while CBS will air the final two hours from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday. Results will also be available on the Air Force Athletics website, www.goairforcefalcons.com.

This is the first NCAA outdoor championship meet for all three cadets. Tyner previously claimed All-America honors at each of the last two NCAA indoor championships.
