FY 2011 Reform Agenda

The FY 2011 Budget set forth an ambitious agenda to reform the Job Corps program. This agenda includes both the implementation of the Standards-Based Education and Training System and a full-scale evaluation of the program.

While all centers have been introduced to standards-based instruction, Job Corps, as part of the Reform Agenda, will be fully implementing the standards-based education and training model into the academic, career technical, and employability skills training at designated "Centers for Excellence." Beginning January 2011, Pinellas (Florida), Denison (Iowa), and Long Beach (California) Job Corps Centers will serve as pilot sites for this comprehensive approach of merging academic and career technical instruction in two industry sectors (construction and health care).

Additionally, Job Corps will undergo a comprehensive review of external and internal factors that affect program performance. This long-term evaluation, to be conducted by IMPAQ International, Decision Information Resources, and Battelle Memorial Institute, will focus on identifying areas of operations and management, including the remediation of poor-performing centers.
