Community Disaster Action Framework

In order for communities to effectively prepare and respond to disasters, all stakeholders (governmental agencies, businesses and the nonprofit sector) must work together to develop a disaster action plan and a process for response. The following outline provides a framework for community partners to consider in developing appropriate plans and actions.

Identify the types of disasters a community might face

- Pandemic
- Weather related (Hurricanes, Tornados, Floods, Ice storms, Excessive snow, etc.)
- Fire
- Earthquake
- Bio-terrorism

Identify community partners for each type of disaster - Example: Pandemic

- Health Department
- City officials
- Hospitals and staff
- Community Service Agencies and Programs
 - Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)
 - Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC)

- Local businesses (restaurants, grocers, pharmacies)

Identify, define and describe levels of disaster

- Mild
- Medium
- Severe

* Identify action steps necessary to protect local community

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* Identify chain-of-command for each level of disaster

Identify vulnerable populations

- Infants and small children
- Senior citizens
- Low income

Identify contacts and communication plan

* Develop medical care plan

- Hospital care
- In-home care
- Quarantine procedures

* Develop feeding plan

- Food and water availability
- Utilization of USDA commodities
- Food preparation for those unable to prepare for themselves
 - Utilizing restaurants
 - Utilizing school facilities
 - Utilizing church facilities
- Transportation of food as needed
 - Local transit operations (buses and cabs)
 - Local school buses

* Develop shelter plan

- Utilization of public facilities
- Utilization of private facilities

* Develop and organize volunteer staff
