PODCASTS

What are podcasts?

Podcasts are audio or video files that you can listen to or watch on your computer or on a variety of portable media devices. They are often free and usually short and part of a series. You can subscribe to receive new podcasts and download them from a website or a variety of podcast directories such as <u>iTunes</u> or <u>Zune</u>.

Podcasts can be an easy and inexpensive way to provide information to your target audience(s). They also offer an alternative to text.

Who is listening to podcasts?

- 12.2 billion videos are viewed on YouTube per month in the US; and
- 182 online videos are viewed by the average Internet user a month. ¹
- 19% of internet users have downloaded a podcast. ²

Podcasts in response to HIV

- Educate target audiences about HIV prevention, testing, treatment, and research.
- Interview scientists, healthcare professionals, policymakers, and people living with HIV.
- Provide information about national HIV/AIDS awareness days.
