




Emerging Security Environment Sources of Stress



Competition for resources; natural disasters; social unrest; hostile cyber activity, violent extremism (criminal, terrorist, religious); regional conflict; proliferation of weapons of mass destruction and advanced weaponry in the hands of the irresponsible are becoming all too common. These challenges are harbingers of potential crisis around the world, and more specifically for naval forces in the littoral regions.

US Defense Strategy...some thoughts

"...Our strategic guidance rightfully focuses our attention on the Pacific and Central Command regions."

Matters worth considering:

- Economic engagement is important
- Freedom of navigation/commerce is important
- China is not the USSR
- China and the US are inextricably linked
- US Military posture must be...
 - Geographically distributed...operationally resilient...politically sustainable
- US must develop allies and coalitions
- Cyber security critical to mil opns & defense of homeland



2012 Strategic Pivot to Asia-Pacific

From 2001-2010, ~70K people/ year were killed in the Asia Pacific region due to natural disasters, resulting in 65% of world's total death from such causes and ~\$35B of economic damage per year

13 of the 15 Megacities in Asia-Pacific are within 100 km of the sea

15 of the world's 28 Megacities are in the Asia Pacific region


12 of the top 15 U.S. trading partners (import / export) are in Asia-Pacific

U.S. maintains 5 security treaties in the Asia-Pacific region

Asia Pacific region contains 61% of the world's population
