New Policy on ENERGY STAR Certification for Plants

Please note an important upcoming change to the way EPA will assign a label year for certified plants. Starting on January 1, 2012, the year on your plant certification label will be based on the year in which your application is *approved*, regardless of the period ending date on your Statement of Energy Performance (SEP).

• EXAMPLE: A plant submits an ENERGY STAR application in December 2011 with data for the 12-month period ending November 30, 2011 on their SEP. The application is reviewed by EPA and approved in February 2012. The plant receives a 2012 ENERGY STAR certification.

Application deadline to earn 2011 ENERGY STAR plant certification:

The deadline for applying for the 2011 ENERGY STAR certification is **September 15**, **2011.** This deadline is to ensure that EPA has sufficient time to process all applications and compliance screens prior to the close of 2011. This deadline will also hold in future years (e.g., September 15, 2012 will be the deadline for submitting an application for the 2012 certification).

For plants that received the 2010 ENERGY STAR certification, but have not yet applied for 2011 certification:

EPA understands that this new policy may affect the timing of your internal data tracking procedures and your eligibility for a 2011 certification if you had planned to apply for your 2011 certification after September 15th. To ensure that your plant is able to earn a 2011 certification, you will be eligible to apply for the ENERGY STAR using a 12-month period that may overlap with data submitted for the previous year's certification by up to six months. Data overlap will only be permitted for the 2011 label year so that you are able to reset the data period for your plant. We encourage you to take advantage of this opportunity to continue to demonstrate your superior performance with 2011 ENERGY STAR certification.

• EXAMPLE: A plant submitted an ENERGY STAR application in December 2010 with data for the 12-month period ending November 30, 2010 on their SEP, and received a 2010 ENERGY STAR certification. If that plant waits until December 2011 to submit its next application, it will miss the 2011 certification deadline. Therefore, for 2011 only, this plant may use up to six months of data from the previous year's application. This plant might choose to submit an application covering August 1, 2010 through July 31, 2011 (so the four months of data covering August-November 2010 is used for both 2010 and 2011 certifications), thus enabling that plant to earn 2011 certification.

When choosing your 12-month data period, please keep in mind that your application for certification must be submitted within four months of the end of your 12-month data period.
