ANNOUNCEMENT

National Education Standards and Improvement Council: Nominations from the Goals Panel

The National Education Goals Panel today submitted to President Clinton its list of 12 nominees to a new National Education Standards and Improvement Council.

The Goals 2000: Educate America Act creates the National Education Standards and Improvement Council to review and certify education standards voluntarily submitted to it. These standards will play an important role assisting communities to improve student achievement and preparing students for citizenship, employment and further learning. The Council is expected to help schools, communities, scholars, and businesses consider what we expect children to know and be able to do.

The Goals Panel is the first of four groups submitting a slate of nominees to the President. The Council is to be composed of 19 members selected from lists submitted by the National Education Goals Panel, the Speaker of the House of Representatives in consultation with the Majority Leader and Minority Leader of the House of Representatives, the Majority Leader of the Senate in consultation with the Minority Leader of the Senate, and the Secretary of Education. Candidates will be proposed in four categories specified in the law. One candidate will be selected from the slate of three nominated in each category by the Goals Panel.

In March the Goals Panel collected nominations of over 200 potential candidates suggested by Panel members and organizations or associations representing the professional roles called for in the legislation. Between April and July the Panel undertook a deliberative review process and agreed upon the following slate of nominees.

The candidates nominated by the Goals Panel in each of the four categories called for in the legislation are: 1) as professional educators - Iris Carl, Judith Lanier, and Richard Mills; 2) as representatives of business, industry, organized labor and post-secondary institutions - Ed Bales, Diana Natalicio, and Al Shanker; 3) as representatives of the public - Ja Net' Crouse, Wilhelmina Delco, and Hillary Pennington; and 4) as education experts - Laurie Chivers, Robert Linn, and James Yaseldyke. See attached for further biographic information.

The Goals Panel is pleased to nominate highly qualified individuals representing a wide range of the competencies and role types called for in the law. Combined with the lists of candidates nominated by the Senate, House, and Secretary, we anticipate the appointment of a Council of outstanding individuals.

BIOGRAPHIC INFORMATION REGARDING GOALS PANEL NOMINEES TO NESIC**PROFESSIONAL EDUCATORS**

"Including elementary and secondary classroom teachers, preschool educators, related services personnel, and other school-based professionals, State or local education agency administrators, and other educators"

IRIS CARL was president of the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics (NCTM) while they developed the academic content standards other disciplines are now seeking to parallel. A past Teacher of the Year, she was also a member of the NCTM Commission on Standards for School Mathematics, the National Council on Education Standards and Testing (NCEST), and the Goals Panel's Goals 3 and 4 Technical Planning Group. She is currently Director of Mathematics for Houston Independent School District, and a member of the National Academy of Education Panel's Trial State Assessment Project.

JUDITH LANIER is president of the Michigan Partnership for New Education, a coalition of state government, business and labor, and K-12 and postsecondary educators that develops programs to improve teacher education. A former teacher, she is currently the President of the Holmes Group, a board member of Educational Testing Services, and a member of the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards. Dr. Lanier is the former Dean of Education at Michigan State University, and former Director of the Institute for Research on Teaching.

RICHARD MILLS has been Vermont's State Commissioner of Education since 1988. Among the strategies on his agenda to restructure education for high performance are education goals, a common core of learning, a student performance assessment based on portfolios, and a teacher majority Professional Standards Board. He currently serves on the boards of the National Center for Education and the Economy, the New Standards Project, and the National Assessment Governing Board.

JA NET CROUSE is Chairman of the National PTA Education Commission. Previously, she was Vice President for Region 2 of the National PTA and president of the Delaware PTA. Dr. Crouse has been a school board member and chaired an education committee for the League of Women Voters. She is currently a member of both the Delaware Math Coalition and Social Studies Commission.

WILHELMINA DELCO is a state legislator in the Texas House of Representatives. She is former vice-chair of the National Assessment Governing Board, and serves on many other state and national education groups. She is dedicated to education reform and an advocate for minority education.

HILARY PENNINGTON is president and co-founder of Jobs for the Future. She is one of the chief architects of the American youth apprenticeship movement which has worked to improve the school-to-work transition. She has advised federal and state legislators in their attempts to draft school-to-work transition legislation that offers work-based learning opportunities and career pathways for all youth.

"Including experts in measurement and assessment, curriculum, school finance and equity, and school reform"

LAURIE CHIVERS, as the Deputy State Superintendent of Public Instruction for the State of Utah, develops budget and legislative recommendations for public education in Utah. She works with the governor, state legislators, and local school districts and boards to ensure that the needs of students and school districts are reflected as legislation and budgets are developed. Dr. Chivers was the Minority Education Policy Director for the United States Senate, and also served as the Director of Finance in the Utah State Office of Education.

ROBERT LINN is Professor of Education at the University of Colorado and co-director of the National Center for Research on Evaluation, Standards, and Student Testing. He is former president of the Division of Evaluation and Measurement of the American Psychological Association as well as the National Council on Measurement in Education. Presently he is the co-chair of the National Academy of Education's evaluation of the trial-state NAEP and chair of the standards subcommittee of the National Academy of Science's Board on Testing and Assessment.

JAMES YSSELDYKE is director of the National Center on Educational Outcomes for Students with Disabilities. He was also director of the University of Minnesota Institute for Research on Learning Disabilities for six years. Dr. Ysseldyke possesses extensive background and recognized leadership in areas of student evaluation, program evaluation, special education policy, and nonbiased assessment.

He is a leader in developing education/business partnerships in this country and abroad. Beginning in 1990, Mr. Bales has continuously expanded Motorola's role in the application of principles which have made the corporation a world-class organization against which others benchmark their programs.

DIANA NATALICIO is President of the University of Texas at El Paso, a leader in developing strong relationship between the university and the local elementary and secondary education system. An applied linguist, Natalicio has degrees in Spanish and Portuguese. She has served on the US-Mexico Commission for Educational and Cultural Exchange, the Texas Business and Education Coalition and many other education and civic groups.

ALBERT SHANKER is president of the American Federation of Teachers and senior vice-president of the AFL-CIO. A former teacher, Mr. Shanker is a strong advocate of national education standards and standards-driven reform. He is presently involved in a number of activities that link directly to the standards issue, including the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards and the National Academy of Education's evaluation of the trial-state NAEP.

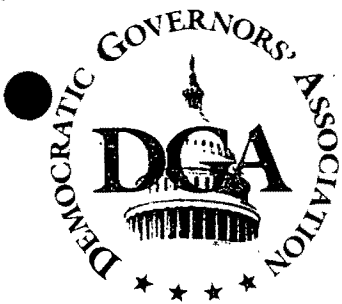

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NATIONAL GOVERNORS' ASSOCIATION

The National Governors' Association, founded in 1908, represents the Governors of the fifty states, the commonwealths of the Northern Mariana Islands and Puerto Rico, and the territories of American Samoa, Guam, and the Virgin Islands. Its missions are to influence the shaping and implementation of national policy and to apply creative leadership to the solution of state problems. The association's operations are supported by member jurisdictions, and its policies and programs are formulated by the Governors.

Organization

The association meets twice a year, during the winter and in the summer, to develop policy positions and discuss common problems. The policy positions are the policy base for the association's legislative and information efforts.

The NGA chair, vice chair, and other members of the nine-member Executive Committee are elected annually. The Executive Committee supervises the association's operations, on behalf of the entire membership, between its meetings. Bipartisanship is ensured by the Articles of Organization, which require that the chairmanship alternate annually between the two major parties and that a majority of the members of the Executive Committee be of a party other than the chair's.

Structure

The NGA membership is organized into three standing committees: Economic Development and Commerce, Human Resources, and Natural Resources.

Through NGA's committees, the Governors examine and develop policy and address key state and national issues. Special task forces often are created to focus gubernatorial attention on federal legislation or on state-level issues.

The association works closely with the administration and Congress on state-federal policy issues through its offices in the Hall of the States in Washington, D.C. The association serves as a vehicle for sharing knowledge of innovative programs among the states and provides technical assistance and consultant services to Governors on a wide range of management and policy issues.

The staff is organized around five office areas and three standing committees.

The Office of State-Federal Relations maintains regular contact with congressional leaders and key administration officials to ensure that state concerns are heard in the shaping of national policy.

The Office of State Services provides individualized technical and informational assistance to Governors and their staffs on important governance issues such as management improvement, policy management, and the organization and management of the

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Governor's office. The office coordinates transition assistance for newly elected Governors and sponsors the New Governors' Seminar.

The Office of Public Affairs coordinates the association's media and public information activities and publications, which convey timely, in-depth analysis and background information on NGA positions and issues of interest to the states.

The Office of Administration and Finance supervises the financial management and administrative functions for the association.

The Center for Policy Research manages the association's overall research and development program, which is guided by the association's priorities established by the Governors. The center supports the committees through the development of background material, issue analysis, and technical assistance in the management arena. Demonstrations are sponsored within the states to promote innovation in government.

NGA committee staff work with the standing committees' staff advisory councils, composed of state government staff appointed by Governors to represent them in their work with the association, and on policy analysis, development, and implementation.

**Affiliated
Organizations**

The Council of Governors' Policy Advisors is a membership organization composed of the policy and planning staff of the nation's Governors. As an affiliated organization, CGPA provides technical expertise, analysis, and information to further the objectives and effectiveness of NGA in representing the interests of state government.

The National Association of State Budget Officers performs research and educational activities in state budgeting. NASBO helps further the objectives of NGA by providing assistance on matters such as analysis of the federal budget and fiscal management issues of both intra- and interstate concern.

As director of the Illinois Department of Corrections, Peters has provided one of the fastest-growing inmate populations in the country with alternatives to incarceration.

Conrad, director of the Ohio Department of Administrative Services, founded the Office of Customer Service and has been a strong leader and able administrator.

Manny Martins, Tennessee
The assistant commissioner and director of the Tennessee Department of Health, Martins led Tennessee's efforts to abolish a \$3 billion Medicaid program and replace it with TennCare, a new health care program.

Private Citizen Winners

Sandy Snider, Indiana
The mother of ten-year-old Zachary, who was abducted and murdered by a convicted child molester, Snider pushed state legislators to pass a law to create a statewide registry of convicted child molesters and require all state employees who work with children to be screened for prior convictions.

Father William T. Cunningham, Michigan
Founder of Focus: HOPE, Detroit's civil and human rights organization, Father Cunningham and his organization have provided food, job training, and employment for over 100,000 inner city inhabitants.

Annette Wright, Vermont
Wright, foster parent of 100 children, biological parent of nine, and adoptive parent of one, has given her time, energy and love to all these children, and is the reason they have grown to be caring, competent adults.

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Artistic Production**Bruce Marks, Massachusetts**

As artistic director of the Boston Ballet, Marks has transformed the company by attracting the world's finest dancers, expanding the company's repertoire and founding CITYDANCE, a tuition-free ballet training program for inner-city youth.

Arts Support**Terry Haller, Wisconsin**

Haller, a volunteer leader and arts benefactor, has donated money and time to help community arts organizations. He pushed for the opening of the American Player's Theatre, and developed a partnership between the Dane County Cultural Resources Commission and the Madison Community Foundation.

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NATIONAL GOVERNORS' ASSOCIATION

The National Governors' Association, founded in 1908, represents the Governors of the fifty states, the commonwealths of the Northern Mariana Islands and Puerto Rico, and the territories of American Samoa, Guam, and the Virgin Islands. Its missions are to influence the shaping and implementation of national policy and to apply creative leadership to the solution of state problems. The association's operations are supported by member jurisdictions, and its policies and programs are formulated by the Governors.

Organization

The association meets twice a year, during the winter and in the summer, to develop policy positions and discuss common problems. The policy positions are the policy base for the association's legislative and information efforts.

The NGA chair, vice chair, and other members of the nine-member Executive Committee are elected annually. The Executive Committee supervises the association's operations, on behalf of the entire membership, between its meetings. Bipartisanship is ensured by the Articles of Organization, which require that the chairmanship alternate annually between the two major parties and that a majority of the members of the Executive Committee be of a party other than the chair's.

Structure

The NGA membership is organized into three standing committees: Economic Development and Commerce, Human Resources, and Natural Resources.

Through NGA's committees, the Governors examine and develop policy and address key state and national issues. Special task forces often are created to focus gubernatorial attention on federal legislation or on state-level issues.

The association works closely with the administration and Congress on state-federal policy issues through its offices in the Hall of the States in Washington, D.C. The association serves as a vehicle for sharing knowledge of innovative programs among the states and provides technical assistance and consultant services to Governors on a wide range of management and policy issues.

The staff is organized around five office areas and three standing committees.

The Office of State-Federal Relations maintains regular contact with congressional leaders and key administration officials to ensure that state concerns are heard in the shaping of national policy.

The Office of State Services provides individualized technical and informational assistance to Governors and their staffs on important governance issues such as management improvement, policy management, and the organization and management of the

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Governor's office. The office coordinates transition assistance for newly elected Governors and sponsors the New Governors' Seminar.

The Office of Public Affairs coordinates the association's media and public information activities and publications, which convey timely, in-depth analysis and background information on NGA positions and issues of interest to the states.

The Office of Administration and Finance supervises the financial management and administrative functions for the association.

The Center for Policy Research manages the association's overall research and development program, which is guided by the association's priorities established by the Governors. The center supports the committees through the development of background material, issue analysis, and technical assistance in the management arena. Demonstrations are sponsored within the states to promote innovation in government.

NGA committee staff work with the standing committees' staff advisory councils, composed of state government staff appointed by Governors to represent them in their work with the association, and on policy analysis, development, and implementation.

**Affiliated
Organizations**

The Council of Governors' Policy Advisors is a membership organization composed of the policy and planning staff of the nation's Governors. As an affiliated organization, CGPA provides technical expertise, analysis, and information to further the objectives and effectiveness of NGA in representing the interests of state government.

The National Association of State Budget Officers performs research and educational activities in state budgeting. NASBO helps further the objectives of NGA by providing assistance on matters such as analysis of the federal budget and fiscal management issues of both intra- and interstate concern.

The NGA Distinguished Service to State Government Awards program was established in 1976 to recognize the contributions of state officials and private citizens to state government. Individuals are then selected who best exemplify the vitality and creativity state employees and residents bring to state government. Each year, awards are given to five state officials and five private citizens, and awards are given in two arts categories. The award winners will be recognized during the plenary session on Sunday, July 17.

State Official Winners

Howard A. Peters III, Illinois
As director of the Illinois Department of Corrections, Peters has provided one of the fastest-growing inmate populations in the country with alternatives to incarceration.

James Conrad, Ohio
Conrad, director of the Ohio Department of Administrative Services, founded the Office of Customer Service and has been a strong leader and able administrator.

Manny Martins, Tennessee
The assistant commissioner and director of the Tennessee Department of Health, Martins led Tennessee's efforts to abolish a \$3 billion Medicaid program and replace it with TennCare, a new health care program.

Private Citizen Winners

Sandy Snider, Indiana
The mother of ten-year-old Zachary, who was abducted and murdered by a convicted child molester, Snider pushed state legislators to pass a law to create a statewide registry of convicted child molesters and require all state employees who work with children to be screened for prior convictions.

Father William T. Cunningham, Michigan
Founder of Focus: HOPE, Detroit's civil and human rights organization, Father Cunningham and his organization have provided food, job training, and employment for over 100,000 inner city inhabitants.

Annette Wright, Vermont
Wright, foster parent of 100 children, biological parent of nine, and adoptive parent of one, has given her time, energy and love to all these children, and is the reason they have grown to be caring, competent adults.

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Artistic Production**Bruce Marks, Massachusetts**

As artistic director of the Boston Ballet, Marks has transformed the company by attracting the world's finest dancers, expanding the company's repertoire and founding CITYDANCE, a tuition-free ballet training program for inner-city youth.

Arts Support**Terry Haller, Wisconsin**

Haller, a volunteer leader and arts benefactor, has donated money and time to help community arts organizations. He pushed for the opening of the American Player's Theatre, and developed a partnership between the Dane County Cultural Resources Commission and the Madison Community Foundation.

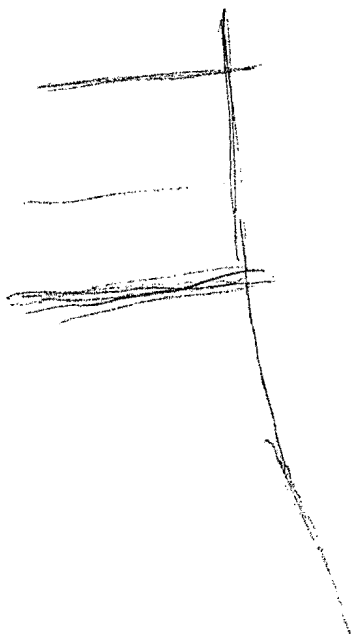
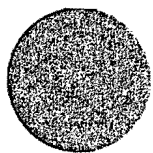
