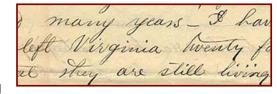

# Online Description in the U.S. Archival Community

## Virginia's Freedmen's Bureau Records Now

**Available Online:** Last month, Governor Timothy M. Kaine announced that the historic Virginia <u>Freedmen's Bureau</u> <u>records</u>, the earliest major compilation of information on the African-American community, are now available online. Under the direction of the Black History Museum and Cultural



Center of Virginia and in collaboration with FamilySearch, volunteers indexed the records of names, marriages, educational pursuits, labor contracts, health care and legal services and other important information from the Virginia Field Office Records of the Freedmen's Bureau. The records can now be viewed temporarily at the <a href="FamilySearch website">FamilySearch website</a>, and negotiations are currently ongoing to permanently host the records through the Smithsonian Institution's <a href="National Museum of African">National Museum of African</a> American History and Culture.

This online publication is the ultimate goal for a <u>five-year effort on the part of the National Archives</u> to preserve and microfilm all 1.2 million document pages of the field office records of the Freedmen's Bureau. The microfilm was digitized by the FamilySearch organization in Utah, and now allows access to historical data which was never before available. Building on Virginia's trailblazing effort, the project now moves to the remaining states in which the Freedmen's Bureau had established headquarters. FamilySearch will provide direct administrative support for this important second phase of the freedmen project.

→ "America's Newsreel Album" (RG 428, item numbers 9457A through 9457Z; ARC ID 74354):

Tucked within the numerous motion picture series here at the National Archives lies a group of 26 black-and-white newsreels produced in 1959 by Gotham Recording for the U.S. Marine Corps, entitled "America's Newsreel Album." These 15 – minute newsreels were hosted by TV



announcer and personality Dennis James, and consisted of three feature stories (including a guest interview) that included some amazing footage of political, sports, and entertainment personalities dating back to the earliest "flickers." Interspersed within these stories were recruitment spots for the Marine Corps.

Viewers can see profiles of political personalities such as Theodore Roosevelt, Wendell Willkie, General John Joseph Pershing, and Fiorello La Guardia; sport icons such as Mildred ("Babe") Diedrickson, Babe Ruth, and Jesse Owens; and aviators Amelia Earhart, Wiley Post, and Douglas G. ("Wrong Way") Corrigan. Momentous events such as the Scopes Monkey Trial are explored, with footage of William Jennings Bryan, Clarence Darrow, and the defendant John Scopes; as are stories that capture the humor and inventiveness of our country's early daredevils, fashion designers and fads.

Full descriptions of the newsreels can be found in ARC by searching within the series "Commercial Motion Picture Films, compiled ca. 1967 - ca. 1978" (ARC ID 74354) or by entering the search string "Americas Newsreel Album" OR "America's Newsreel Album" in the main ARC search box.

#### Online Description in the International Archival Community



University of Saskatchewan Archives- "Persuasion: Print Advertising and Advocacy on the Prairies": The University of Saskatchewan is home to a great new online archival source. Their online exhibit, Persuasion: Print Advertising and Advocacy on the Prairie, explores the different forms of advertisement in newspapers, magazines, billboards, and other types of printed material from the first three quarters of the 20<sup>th</sup> century in Canada. Easily navigated, this site not only boasts quality scans of images, but also includes archival metadata and descriptions, including a curator's note (similar to a scope and content note). Pamphlets that are more than one page in length are scanned individually, allowing the viewer to explore the entire document. A nice feature of the site is the "Random Images" search, which presents a dynamic cross section of the documents available from all the categories on the website.
