

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



OPERATION DIAMONDBACK

HHQ COMPANY 108TH ARMOR LEARNS TO WORK A CROWD AT OPERATION DIAMONDBACK

he closer the training is to reality the better. In Operation Diamondback at Camp Blanding, FL, the 108th Armor from Calhoun, GA received training that may save the lives of Soldiers, as well as civilians.

With the help of JMDS (a Department of Defense contractor that trains AD, NG and Reserve Soldiers around the country), over 500 Iraqi-Americans are employed for the purpose of human interaction on the battlefield. This training gives Soldiers a chance to think about how to handle civilians on the battlefield.

"Traditionally Soldiers are taught to shoot a target when it pops up and then that's it", said John M. Duffey, president of JMDS. "Soldiers get a 'deer in the headlights' look when they are confronted with human interaction situations," Duffey explains. When civilians approach Soldiers there are the obvious language barriers and cultural differences that add confusion to situations. Soldiers need to know how to deal with crowds, both hostile and non-hostile, since they are part of the everyday situation.

There were seven Iraqi-American citizens on hand to make the training more realistic. One of the Iraqis was acting as an Imam religious leader, two were interpreters, one was a tribal leader, one was a student at the village school and two were assigned to play roles. Twenty-four members of the FLARNG's 3/24th Infantry Battalion were on hand to role-play as civilians on the battlefield and add bulk to the masses.

The 3/124th Infantry returned from Iraq in February and March of this year. "The best S-2 and G-2 information for Soldiers who are preparing to go over comes from the unit they will be replacing", said 1LT Luis Sierra of the 3/124th. "The situations over there are constantly changing."

Operation Diamondback training involves the use of an interpreter who is assigned to the unit commander. The unit is then faced with the challenge of dealing with crowds in a village situation. As the scenario unfolded, the 108th convoy approached the village and encountered the crowd standing in the roadway. The commander then assessed the situation and stopped the convoy at a security halt. At this point the commander utilized the interpreter to communicate with the village leader to allow the setup of a traffic checkpoint and non-hostile passage through the town.

These are the kinds of things Soldiers have to adapt to and react to in order to be as safe as possible while completing their missions. "This training better prepares the Soldiers to stay alive", said CPT Brad Buek commander of HHQ 108th Armor.

Operation Diamondback also teaches the basics of convoy operations and reacting to various improvised explosive devices.



HOME DEPOT AND STOCKTON, CALIFORNIA REMEMBER A FALLEN LOCAL GUARD HERO

n unusual memorial has brought a community together. In June, several hundred volunteers gathered in Louis Park in Stockton, CA to build a playground, which will serve to commemorate the sacrifice made by 1LT Michael Vega, who was mortally wounded when his vehicle rolled over during an ambush near Baghdad in early March. 1LT Vega was the first Home Depot employee to die while on active duty.

In just a few hours, using materials donated by Home Depot through its non-profit partner KaBOOM!, the workers were able to turn a bare park into wonderful play area.

Several members of Vega's family were present for

the construction. Laurie Morales, 1LT Vega's sister, said her brother would have been particularly proud that the project had brought so many people together. "[He] just wanted to make a difference."

1LT Vega's mother, Maria Nothnagel, was also on hand for the dedication. "He'd be thrilled to know it's happening for him." Although still deeply pained by the loss of her son, Nothnagel seemed to feel a certain pride and gratitude that he would be remembered in this way. "I have great grandchildren; we'll bring them here to play."

Home Depot and KaBOOM! have built nearly 200 playgrounds around the country at a cost of about \$150,000 each. Home Depot is a recipient of the 2004 Secretary of Defense ESGR Freedom Award.

4TH INFANTRY DIVISION COMMISSIONS SOLDIER MEMORIAL

arlier this year, Saddam Hussein was cut into pieces and melted down. Well, two massive, bronze statues of him were. anvway. The 555th Engineer Group dismantled the statues at the request of the 4th Infantry Division, who then commissioned Tikrit sculptor, Khalid Alussy,

to turn the bronze into a new work of art - an American Soldier kneeling before a Soldier memorial consisting of a pair of combat boots, a rifle, and a helmet. Beside the kneeling Soldier, stands a young Iraqi girl with her hand on his shoulder.

"It's about freedom for this country, but it's also about the children who will grow up in a free society," says SGM Chuck Fuss, 4th Infantry Division. Another interpretation and more obvious purpose of the statue is as a monument to all our fallen Soldiers in Iraq. "Really that's what it's for - a tribute to all the Soldiers over here who lost their lives," says 1SG Mark Anderson, Headquarters and Headquarters Company.

An interesting side note on the original Saddam statues is that Alussy created them, with the help of another local artist. However, adapting quickly to the true spirit of capitalism, Alussy had no problem sculpting over his previous work for a price. The final cost of the American Soldier and Iraqi girl was \$18,000, paid for by donations from Soldiers, and took Alussy four months to complete.

After a brief stay at the 4th Infantry Division's headquarters in Tikrit, the sculpture was transferred to the 4th Infantry Division Museum in Fort Hood, TX, where it can be seen today.

More than 15 months ago, a global coalition ended the brutal regime of Saddam Hussein and liberated the people of Iraq.

As in all conflicts, this has come at a cost in lives. Some of your comrades made the ultimate sacrifice. For your sacrifices, our country and the President are deeply grateful.

In a free, democratic country we have vigorous debates over important public policy issues – none more heated than a decision to go to war. But this should not distract us from the mission at hand or lessen the magnitude of your accomplishments.

The United Nations and the U.S. Congress shared the view that Saddam's regime was a threat to the region and the world. Indeed, in 1998, our congress passed a resolution calling for the removal of the regime. And over the years the U.N. passed 17 resolutions condemning Saddam's regime.

By your skill and courage, you have put a brutal dictator in the dock to be tried by the Iraqi people and restored freedom to 25 million people. By helping to repair infrastructure, rebuild schools, encourage democratic institutions and delivering educational and medical supplies, you have shown America's true character and given Iraq a chance at a new start. But most importantly, your fight – and ultimate victory – against the forces of terror and extremism in Iraq and the Middle East will have made America safer and more secure.

You are accomplishing something noble and historic – and future generations of Americans will remember and thank you for it.

MOARNG EXCEEDS CERFP STANDARDS



sixty-eight members of the Missouri National Guard demonstrated they are ready to help fight the global war against terrorism on a rain-chilled Saturday morning in late July.

They passed, with flying colors, an Army evaluation that determined their ability to care for and decontaminate victims of a toxic chemical agent attack. And they did it two months earlier than originally scheduled.

"Everything here went great. These guys actually surprised me. They surprised everyone on my line," said MAJ Rich Ward, chief of the 5th Army's nine-member team that evaluated the morning exercise.

The 52 Army Guard Soldiers and 16 Air Guard medical personnel belong to Missouri's new Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear or High Yield Explosive Enhanced Response Force Package (CERFP), a group trained to help local, state or federal authorities in case of a terrorist attack. The team will have at least 104 people when fully staffed.

In the exercise, a plane had sprayed a toxic agent over a county fair and crashed into the crowd during its second pass. The incident commander called for the CERFP to

help triage, care for and decontaminate the casualties.

The team arrived at the field, set up a 100-yard decontamination line of 13 tents and shelters, suited up and was ready to receive casualties in 90 minutes.

All told, MOARNG Commander LTC William Johnson reported that his team processed and decontaminated 171 casualties in 2 hours and 11 minutes. That included scanning everyone for chemical and radiological agents and taking the time to make sure that one mother and her two daughters went through the line together.

That number is small compared to the casualties that such a team might be expected to deal with in a real crisis. But it was enough to convince the Army evaluators that the Guard people know what they are doing.

"They easily exceeded the standard that we set for them," said MAJ Ward. \blacksquare

DC, MD, VA NATIONAL GUARD LEADERS SIGN EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT ASSISTANCE COMPACT

ASHINGTON - Had terrorists crashed an airliner into the U.S. Capitol or the White House, in the District of Columbia on Sept. 11, 2001, the DCARNG could not have legally asked for National Guard reinforcements from another state.

Likewise, there was no legal means for DCARNG troops on Title 32, or state duty status to roll out to support the VAARNG after the Pentagon was attacked on Virginia soil.

That all changed on July 15 when leaders of DC, MD and VA National Guard forces signed an historic mutual aid agreement making it possible for their people to respond to a "critical incident" in the National Capital Region.

The Memorandum of Understanding was signed by MG David Wherley Jr., commanding general of the DCARNG, MG Bruce Tuxill, adjutant general for MD, and MG Claude Williams, adjutant general for VA, during a brief afternoon ceremony at Fort McNair in Washington. The document immediately makes it possible for National Guard troops to serve together, without having to be mobilized for Title 10 federal duty, in the National Capital Region that encompasses DC, the MD counties of Prince George's, Montgomery and Frederick, and, in VA, the counties of Fairfax, Arlington, Loudoun and Prince William and the cities of Alexandria, Fairfax, Falls Church and Manassas.

WARRANT OFFICERS CHANGE INSIGNIA


RLINGTON, Va. - On July 9, the Army National Guard's 6,998 warrant officers observed their corps' 86th birthday in an unusual way: most of them replaced their distinctive "Eagle Rising" collar insignia with the insignia for their career branches. And the highest-ranking members of the relatively small corps, the CWO5's, pinned on new rank insignia: a silver bar with a single black stripe centered along the length of the bar.

Why the changes?

"This is to make us more closely associated with the commissioned officer corps," explained CW5 Poyas Haynes, the Army Guard's command chief warrant officer, "We're a small force, and we do tend to be forgotten. This will improve our visibility."

Most of today's warrant officers come from the enlisted ranks, CW5 Haynes pointed out. "We can't forget where our roots are," he said. "Our inculcated values came from the NCO corps. That's where we were born. We cannot move so far that we forget our birthplace. But the demands being placed on all warrant officers are changing."

"As I have come up through the ranks, warrant officers have changed their roles over time. They have been regarded as expert technicians over a period of years," LTG Roger Schultz, the Army National Guard's director said. "Today we ask more of our warrant officer team. It's called leadership. Warrant officers are serving everywhere, and [their] contributions are unquestioned."



NVARNG MEDIVAC CREW WINS AWARD FOR LIFE-SAVING IDEA

ilot Richard Ferguson of the NVARNG and his unit, the 126th Medical Company (Air Ambulance) were recently given the Association of Medical Directors of Information Systems Award for 2004. The award salutes organizations that improve medicine by the direct use of information technology.

While deployed to Afghanistan, Pilot Ferguson and his team encountered a difficulty familiar to many medivac crews: communicating over the wall of noise generated by a helicopter's massive engine and rotors.

"In the bustle of trauma, a lot of information would get lost because everyone is in such a rush. A lot of times, it would hurt the patient." Pilot Ferguson came up with the idea of using Palm Pilots to store vital information such as preliminary diagnosis, medications given, the patient's stability and vital signs. Upon arrival at a hospital, all the stored information could be printed out and handed over with the patient, or if the situation was critical, the crew could just give the Palm Pilot itself to hospital staff.

"We'd do what's called a run sheet. It's basically a diagram of the human body, showing, you know, laceration here, hole here, burn here," Pilot Ferguson said.

The hand-held computers made a difference - medics estimated they increased the speed of data transfer by 60 percent.

In January of 1945, a Sikorsky YR-4 helicopter was dismantled, flown from Wright Field (Dayton, Ohio) to North Burma, and reassembled to evacuate Private Howard Ross, a wounded medical observer. It was the first time an American air vehicle was used for the purpose of rescuing and transporting a wounded patient.



OPERATION PURPLE TAKES MILITARY CHILDREN CAMPING

n August, about 50 children, ages 10-16, with one or more parents serving as active duty, reserve or National Guard members, completed a week's stay in the rustic North Carolina woods at a 4-H camp located outside Ellerbe, NC.

Fifteen-year-old Travis Hellermann told other campers and visiting dignitaries at the camp that he's had "a long, hard year," since his father, a member of the Army's 82nd Airborne Division, was killed in Iraq on Aug. 6, 2003. Hellermann said his father died "doing what he loved." And "instead of sitting around feeling sad," he'd gone to camp and "had fun" while sharing his feelings with other campers.

Initiated by the National Military Family Association (NMFA, a non-profit group in Alexandria, VA), the camp is one of the many Operation Purple camping programs held this summer across 11 states and Guam. Operation Purple was developed to help children cope with the stress of a deployed parent. It is co-sponsored by the Department of Defense and Sears, Roebuck and Co., which donated \$2 million to the NMFA to develop and enhance programs that address the unique challenges faced by military families.

Julia Pfaff, executive director of NMFA, pointed out that it is important for parents to closely observe their children's emotional health while a

loved one is deployed.

According to Pfaff, some children don't want to upset their parents, so they try to hide their anxieties.

Camp with Operation Purple offers group discussions, as well as horseback riding, canoeing, and archery. "You have to help your children put words" to their feelings, Pfaff explained, noting that her own son had developed insomnia when her husband had been deployed to Kuwait.

Attendance at Operation Purple's closing ceremony included Mary Easley, wife of NC Gov. Michael Easley; Secretary Bryan E. Beatty, NC Department of Crime Control and Public Safety; MG William E. Ingram Jr., adjutant general of NC; Jan Witte, director of the Pentagon's Office of Children and Youth; Robert J. O'Leary, Sears' senior public relations executive; and Candace Wheeler, NMFA president.

Witte saluted the great strength of military families, stating that Operation Purple is receiving "wonderful response" from participants and parents. "We're really very excited about all of this," Witte added.

O'Leary said Sears will support an expanded Operation Purple for next year, noting his company's sponsorship of the program "is the right thing to do."

EAGLE SCOUT SENDS 90 CARE PACKAGES TO THE TNARNG 278TH

o complete his Eagle Scout leadership project, Daniel Tucker, 12, of Tennessee's Boy Scout Troop 406 assembled 90 care packages for the TNARNG 278th Calvary Regiment, which was deployed this past summer.

When asked how he came to this idea, Tucker replied:

"Mom said they [Troop 406] all know *of* someone overseas, but don't *personally* know someone," explains Tucker.

Mom (Shellie Tucker) read about the 278th needing care packages and asked her son if he'd be interested. Tucker took to the idea immediately and stirred up the community for help.

After receiving an overwhelming response from local residents, it was now up to Tucker to package the dozens of notepads, magazines, candy, etc. Undaunted, Tucker drafted his fellow scouts.

"If ya'll have questions, ask," Tucker declared to Troop 406, as they filled shoe box after shoe box for the 278th, currently stationed in Fort Irwin, CA, for desert training.

In an inspiring display of gratitude, the 278th Commander mailed a medallion to Tucker. And since Tucker's packages were sent, articles have popped up in area newspapers, prompting other Boy Scouts troops to do the same.

Well ahead of his peers (the national average age of an Eagle Scout is 15 - 16 years old), this recent care package success is just another notch in Tucker's belt. His USSSA baseball team, the Hendersonville Lightning, are World Series champs two years running, with Tucker alternating between 3rd Base, Catcher, Pitcher, and Short Stop. When he grows up, Tucker plans on becoming a pro ball player.

We're willing to bet that with this much ambition at 12, Tucker will no doubt be a success in whatever road he takes in the years to come.

COLLEGE STUDENT QUILTS FOR FAMILIES OF FALLEN HEROES

essica Porter, 20, of Hudson, FL, was quilting and watching the news on the war with a friend in May 2003. The two, like many others across the country, wanted to do something to support the troops. Together, they decided to make a quilt for each of the families of troops who lost their lives while serving their county. Although the friend moved away before the first quilt was mailed out, their idea stuck with Jessica, and she carried it through.

Jessica, a student at Pasco Hernandez Community College, didn't realize how big Operation Homefront Quilts would become.

To date, over 500 40-inch- by 60-inch quilts have been made and sent. Over 300 are still needed. Out of the 500, nearly 50 quilts have been made for members of the National Guard. Each quilt can take up to 10 hours to make on a machine, longer if all done by hand. Yet, Jessica is determined to finish what she started.

Since May, the operation has grown far beyond the Porter home. Once word got around about the quilts through interviews and ads in quilting magazines, people from around the world wanted to help.

"Many people want to show their support of the troops, but there aren't enough avenues to do so," said Joanne Porter, Jessica's mother.

Money for postage and mailing supplies, quilt-tops, fabric and more arrive daily at the Porter's residence. Supplies have even come in from Guam and Korea. Perhaps one of the most generous donations came from a quilting company. The Porter's were loaned a \$16,000 quilting machine. The company told Jessica to use the equipment for as long as she needed it.

"Jessica has quilted probably around 150 quilt tops so far on it, and we would have never gotten this far without it," said Joanne.

Special thought is put into each quilt,

and none of them are the same. "We don't just pick up fabric and make one," she said.

If they find information on the news or Internet about the deceased Airman, Marine or Soldier, they tailor the quilt and make it more personal.


"If the troop had a baby, then we make it a patriotic baby quilt," said Jessica.

"In remembrance and gratitude" with a name, rank and year is also embroidered on each lap-sized quilt. In addition, a hand-written note from the Porters is included with each quilt, showing their appreciation for the sacrifices that the deceased service member has made for freedom.

Recently, the Porter's were granted next-of-kin releases through the Army and are now able to send the quilts directly to the family.

"Jessica is proof one person can make a difference," said Joanne.

Thanks to her skill and determination, a little warmth is brought home to the family members of troops who made the ultimate sacrifice to support their country.

TRICARE EARLY BENEFITS

EARLY BENEFITS

n July 23, the Department of Defense announced the start of a new temporary program authorized under section 703 of the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2004, which provides Guard members activated in support of a contingency operation for more than 30 days and Guard families "early" access to TRICARE medical and dental benefits. Benefits under this program are effective until Dec. 31, 2004, the date the temporary benefit ends, unless extended by law.

To be eligible for the temporary benefit, Guard members and their families must be registered in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS) and be TRICARE eligible. The member's Service personnel office is responsible for determining eligibility for the early TRICARE benefit. TRICARE eligibility for the Guard sponsor and families begins either on the day the Guard member receives delayed-effective-date active duty orders or 60 days before the Guard member reports to active duty, whichever is later.

Guard members eligible for the early TRICARE benefit will be notified by their Service personnel office when they receive their delayed-effective-date active duty orders.

Members may verify their eligibility through the secure Guard and Reserve web portal at www.dmdc.osd.mil/Guard-ReservePortal. Members who require assistance to verify eligibility for the "early" TRICARE benefit may contact their Service personnel office. A list of Service contacts is available on the TRICARE web site at www.tricare.osd.mil/ reserve/reservepoc.cfm.

QUICK TIPS FOR GUARD BENEFITS



Guard members and their families who have employer-sponsored health insurance are strongly encouraged to consider retaining the employer's health care coverage until the Guard member actually reports for active duty, at which time the member and their family would be fully covered by USERRA.



Guard families who are eligible for the "early" TRICARE benefit may receive care under TRICARE Standard, TRICARE Extra and the TRICARE Reserve Family Member Demonstration Project. Benefits under the demonstration, which waives the TRICARE Standard deductible and authorizes higher payments to nonparticipating civilian providers, will end Oct. 31, 2004.



Guard members eligible for the "early" TRICARE benefit who are currently enrolled in the TRICARE Dental Program (TDP) will be disenrolled from the TDP upon receipt of their delayed-effective-date orders.

Guard families eligible for the "early" TRICARE benefit may enroll in the TDP and pay premiums at the active duty family member rate. To enroll, families may contact the TDP administrator, United Concordia Companies, Inc. (UCCI) at (800) 866-8499 or www.ucci.com.

ANTI-TERRORISM TRAINING

ANTI-TERRORISM TRAINING

fter Sept. 11, 2001, the lives of Americans were changed forever. An attack so close to home by terrorists brought home a new realization, that every man, woman and child is a potential target. How do we know who terrorists are, what they look like or where they will strike? None of these questions can realistically be answered, but everyone should be aware of signs of terrorist behaviors.

"Family members can become the target and need to protect themselves," said a Department of Defense official. "Their vigilance can also be the key in helping commanders protect the mission and resources of the installations and facility."

For interested family members, the Department of Defense offers the anti-terrorism training on-line which can be taken at home from a family computer. The objectives of this training are to understand terrorist threats and how to employ situation-based measures to lower vulnerability, recognize proper responses to threat actions and understand how to support unit security.

The slideshow presentation informs family members on everything from picking a seat on an aircraft to booking hotel rooms to dining out safety measures. "Taking the online course will allow you to become familiar with various techniques to reduce your vulnerability to becoming a target," a department official said.

To take the training, log on the Awareness Web site at www.at-awareness.org and follow the instructions. It will ask for a password that can be obtained from the service member's unit anti-terrorism officer.

"Service family members need to be aware there is a terrorist threat, no matter where they are in the world," the department official said. "They need to be constantly vigilant to ensure the safety of their families."

FPCON Normal

Normal means there is general threat of possible terrorist activity, but requires only a routine security posture.

FPCON Alpha

Alpha means there is a general threat of terrorist activity against personnel and installations, the nature of which is unpredictable.

FPCON Bravo

Bravo means there is an increased and more predictable threat of terrorist activity.

FPCON Charlie

Charlie applies when an incident occurs or intelligence is received indicating some form of terrorist action against personnel and installations is imminent.

FPCON Delta

Delta applies when the immediate areas where a terrorist attack has occurred or when intelligence has been received that the terrorist action against a specific location or person is likely.

With each heightened level of FPCON, security entering and leaving base will be greater. Family members should pay attention to the levels and always be aware of their surroundings.

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ALWAYS PREPARED

SSG KEN WEICHERT

SSG Ken Weichert and his wife Stephanie were driving on I-5 when they came upon the scene of a horrendous accident. One vehicle was burning and several others were smashed up nearby.

SSG Weichert, a trained Combat Lifesaver, told his wife to pull over, leaped out of the car, grabbed his first aid kit and the pair ran to offer assistance. Stephanie began doing assessments looking for critical cases. Her husband had taught her the drill: Responsiveness, Breathing, Pulse, Bleeding, Shock, Bones, Burns, Head injury- don't waste time.

"Slow down, learn first aid, stock up your first aid kit... Be safe, be alert, and be alive!"

The Staff Sergeant ran toward three children who had been thrown from a vehicle and began bandaging wounds. By this time paramedics had arrived on the

scene and told him that a helicopter was in route. They prepped the children for transport and loaded them onto the helicopter. As the children flew to a nearby hospital, the Weicherts accepted the thanks of the police and the Med Techs and headed off. They didn't make it very far.

Four hundred meters past the first accident was a second, much worse, multi-vehicle pile-up. The couple unhesitatingly threw themselves into the scene. Stephanie once again began conducting triage and searching for scattered victims. SSG Weichert began treating injuries, directing medically inexperienced police officers and firemen, and even leaving triage cards on the people he had helped.

Although three lives were lost in the two accidents, many more were saved. For their unhesitating service, Stephanie Weichert was awarded the Good Samaritan Medal and SSG Ken Weichert was awarded the Knight of Justice Medal. SSG Ken Weichert was awarded the "Knight of Justice" medal and his wife, Stephanie, was awarded the "Good Samaritan Medal" by the California Highway Patrol.

A NEW NATIONALISM

Since early 2002, the Army National Guard has been building the foundation for the new free nation of Afghanistan, working towards the nation's first direct presidential election on October 9. This election, described by President Bush as "a critical step forward in Afghanistan's transition to democracy," will be possible, despite terrorist threats, largely because of protection by the Afghanistan National Army (ANA), which has been trained almost exclusively by National Guard Soldiers.

Assembling a unified National Army has proved a significant challenge primarily because the Afghan people's loyalty historically has been first to their tribe. However, Coalition forces are confident that Afghanistan will succeed, as the new ANA is training not only in combat, but also nationalism and its role in the greater good of Afghanistan's future.

Tribal culture, however, is not the only challenge facing ANA training. Combating desertion and instating crucial

ethnic diversity also proves significant. To rectify this, recruitment centers have been established around the nation to draw a force more representative of the Afghan people. Additionally, recruiter training is now underway with recruiters expected to enlist 350 new recruits every three weeks.

"The Afghan people could have no better partners in building their new army than these National Guard units of the United States Army" declared MG Craig Weston, Chief of the Office of Military Cooperation during the Aug. 5 ceremony in which the INARNG assumed control over the ANA from the OKARNG.

COMMITMENT

Operating under the name Task Force Phoenix II, the OKARNG grew the ANA to almost

14,000 Soldiers - a huge step up from the ANA's humble beginnings of just 350 in their first 2002 graduating battalion. The long-term plan set by the U.S. administration and the UN organizers is for U.S. and Coalition forces to train up to 18 battalions for the ANA (70,000 Soldiers by 2009).

One Guard Soldier who recently visited the Kabul ANA recruitment camp reports, "The recruiter has no car and is totally reliant on COIs and VIPs to help bring kids in. Once he gets them to sign, he houses them in the recruiting station until he has, literally, a bus load, and then he takes a 12-14 hour bus ride to get them to MEPS. The record, here in Kabul, is 29 enlistees for one recruiter in a day." He added, "The recruiters here are doing a tremendous job, and it is an honor to be able to assist, even in small ways, to help build the first National Army in this country."

With Afghanistan's first presidential election just over the horizon and boiling tensions erupting in violence, the importance of the ANA is underlined. Dozens of civilians and electoral workers have died this past summer in election-related, terrorist attacks carried out by the Taliban, who continues to "warn" the Afghan people against voting. October 9, 2004, will no doubt prove to be a monumental day in Afghanistan's history - whether or not that is in infamy or celebration has yet to be seen. However, the ANA, backed by the Army National Guard, are determined to give freedom and democracy a chance to take root.

"Weekend Warrior... I have always felt those two words are the most insulting thing one can say to any Soldier."

Excerpted from a piece by Trudy Marshall-Bowler, wife of a serving Guard Soldier:

One Sunday evening [my husband and I] were driving home. Somehow we ended up on the topic of my greatest pet peeve: the phrase "Weekend Warrior." I have always felt those two words are the most insulting thing one can say to any Soldier. I knew the men and women of his unit; I knew about their past military history. They had served in combat, and still most Americans had no idea that any of them have ever done anything but assist during a flood or a local crisis. Somewhere in that conversation my husband had become very quiet. He looked over at me, "A Weekend Warrior but a full-time Soldier. When I was at BNOC, there was a Colonel there who spoke at graduation. He told us that he saw his civilian job as his part-time job and the Guard was his fulltime job. At the time I thought he was crazy. The check I got each month didn't feed my family or pay my bills. But now..."

This man is a Soldier at heart. It is who he is; it defines him. He is a carpenter by trade, an incredibly talented craftsman, yet he does not take even a fraction of the pride in his skill as he does when he puts on his uniform and shines his boots. When a friend questioned his reasoning for choosing a unit that is already on alert, he explained: "The easiest thing in the world is knowing what is right; the hard part is doing what is right."

I absolutely believe in the cause of why we are here. Each time a young kid gives me thumbs up, or an old man shakes my hand amiably, I feel absolutely that we are doing something right...

[Before being deployed to Kuwait], a war was watching Platoon or Full Metal Jacket. It never really occurred to me that a simple guy from Utah would be sent into the lions' den. But this is not just my story. I came over here with a battalion of Soldiers from Utah, to join 140,000 troops already on the ground...

Regardless of the politics and the opinions of the men who sent us, the fact is that we are here right now, and "right now" is all that matters.

Shots are coming in your direction; you respond by quickly identifying your target, followed by two quick taps on the trigger; identify a new target and repeat until all threats are eliminated. You must be lethal when you shoot. There is no exception...

The Iraqi way of life seems unchanged by Soldiers who have walked these lands for thousands of years. But I feel changed. Many of us over here have changed. Most friends we had before we left have simply become old acquaintances. The "Dear John" letters from home have changed us. Adjusting and adapting to each new occurrence changes us. Saddam has been captured, yet our main mission continues.

Ours is a life of constant change. Our roots come from the military code that bonds us. It's a connection that has made brothers and sisters out of everyone who wears the uniform. Someday we will leave. Other soldiers will take our place, just as they have throughout the ages.

"It's very rewarding to know that you can make a difference" said CPT Hazel Williams, NCARNG, part of a medical assessment team that came to the remote village of Docker, Iraq. One of his duties is coordinating contract work and purchases within the local community.

During a community outreach project at Docker, CPT Williams was searching for laborers needed for the upcoming Multi-National Forces irrigation canal project in the Diyala province. "I needed about 100 men" said CPT Williams. Although more men applied than CPT Williams had positions for, he did his best to employ them all, saying, "My intent is to try to hire all of these men and find a way to pay them."

Funding for the project, like many others, comes from Multi-National Forces funds that are spent on improving the Iraqi infrastructure and, whenever possible, using local labor and contractors.

Diyala is an agricultural region in Iraq, and the network of irrigation canals are critical for the farmers. However, years of neglect have left the canals in need of repair and overgrown with weeds. "The weeds and grass are creating a lack of water flow for the farmer's fields" added CPT Williams. The completion of the canal repairs will help feed and employ Iraqis in the region.

The rate and effects of unemployment in this remote area are evident. Young men between the ages of 18-25, who are not working are prime recruits for militant extremists in Iraq. "When we can hire them and give them a job, we are giving them another choice" added CPT Williams.

"A lot of news shows violence in Iraq; however, there are lots of good projects that don't make the news. Projects like renovation of schools for example," stated CPT Williams. "We are also starting a trade school to help offer masonry training and that will provide local contractors with skilled labor," said CPT Williams.

Growth and prosperity are choices Iraqi citizens are free to make now. Multi-National Force projects like these managed by CPT Williams are destined for success as Iraqi community leaders add their support.

Heading down Route 873 on a pre-dawn Pennsylvania morning, SPC Damian Smith (HHC 213th Area Support Group), 20, was on his way home after a night out when flames caught his eye in the road ahead. As SPC Smith drove closer, he saw a silver SUV, wrapped in fire against a tree. Without hesitation, SPC Smith dialed 911 and slammed a U-turn.

"The driver was unconscious and totally pinned against the dash," SPC Smith recounts. "I was talking to the dispatcher... when I heard these boys screaming... saying 'Help! Help!"

Despite any fear of flames igniting the SUV's gas tank, SPC Smith pulled at the doors where two young boys, 9 and 10, were trapped in the back seat. Their father, Michael McCormick, Sr., 38, lay unconscious in the front of the car.

Unable to release the SUV doors, SPC Smith managed to pull the boys through a side window one by one, and set them down safely away from the vehicle. With his Guard instincts racing, SPC Smith gave the boys a once-over

for injuries and turned his attention back to the remaining passenger.

By now, the flames had risen waist-high. SPC Smith reached

for McCormick anyway, burning his hand. Armed with fire extinguishers, a nearby resident ran to help. Yet despite the two men battling the flames, McCormick could not be rescued.

The two boys were unharmed, except for minor injuries. SPC Smith, who had returned from a tour in Afghanistan this past April, remained distraught for not being able to get to their father in time.

"It was a nasty fire," said Barry Reitz, the property owner where the crash occurred. "If anyone deserves to be commended, he's the guy," Reitz said of SPC Smith. "He risked himself to get the two kids out."



SPC Donald Prichard (FLARNG) is a 22-year-old combat wounded veteran returning home from a 14-month deployment supporting Operation Enduring Freedom in Jordan and Operation Iraqi freedom in Ar Ramadi. Skills and experience from his civilian job as a deputy sheriff for the Broward County Sheriff's Office prepared him well for his mission working with Iraqi police, but more than anything else SPC Prichard says, "You've got to have respect."

"When we first arrived in Ar Ramadi, I developed a relationship with the local police force," said SPC Prichard. "Others were criticizing me for developing relationships with the Iraqi police, but whenever I needed something, I was able to get it within minutes.

"The Iraqi police were volunteering to go on walking tours with us, provided us with vehicles, information pertaining to possible Syrian or Fedayeen insurgence, brought me home-cooked meals and even invited me to their homes," he explained. "In our area of responsibility we experienced much more cooperation because we developed relationships with the police." SPC Prichard served on a Mobile Task Training Team created to reproduce the results that were achieved with the Ar Ramadi police force. The team was tasked to train police officers in Fallujah, Ubaiti, Usable and Al Chiem.

SPC Prichard explained that the team noticed a significant increase in the confidence and self-esteem of the police officers they trained. "It made me feel good seeing the difference. When we first took the police out on patrol in the city with the local force, the people would hide, but when they realized we were here to help, they started coming to us, telling us their problems and reporting suspicious people," he said. "We assured them that if they needed anything, to call the police, and they did."

SPC Prichard returns home a hero, his actions merited submission for a Purple Heart, Silver Star, Bronze Star and Flying Cross. While he appreciates the awards, they were not his motivation. "I was just doing my job," stated SPC Prichard.

UNCONVENTIONAL WARFARE

For more than 100 Special Forces soldiers from the Florida National Guard, serving in Afghanistan on the "frontlines" in the Global War on Terrorism was a grim, dangerous reality.

Two members of the Ocala-based A Company – CWO Mark Jensen and MSG Dan Kinkel – were among the unit's Green Berets who were scattered throughout Afghanistan's remote eastern provinces. Their mission: aid the Afghan National Army in combating insurgent guerillas and establish friendly relations with the local population.

According to both CWO Jensen and MSG Kinkel, they accomplished both objectives. As a two-person team they operated mainly near the border with Pakistan, first serving

as advisors to the Afghan National Army, and later conducting combat operations in the dangerous area.

DEVOTION

"I was really surprised to get

there and realize 'They're going to give us opportunities and let us do our mission'," recalled CWO Jensen, a 12-year veteran of the Guard.

"We got to do some unconventional warfare," MSG Kinkel, a 20-year-military veteran, noted. "We actually got to do what we were trained to do: take indigenous forces on combat operations."

Those operations took the team into about a dozen firefights with enemies. Eventually the number of attacks by enemy insurgents dwindled off, due mainly to the Special Forces' increasing reputation in the area. "Our goal was to deny sanctuary to the enemy by going

into this unfriendly area and living there," MSG Kinkel said, "and making the people there stand up and fight against the insurgents who were putting pressure on them."

The Special Forces and the Afghani Soldiers moved deep into the lawless regions on the eastern frontier of Afghanistan and established a small camp where they lived with the locals and began developing relationships. There they helped develop a rudimentary village council and encouraged the locals to elect a mayor and police chiefs.

"We used those tactics to the best of our ability to create... law where there was none," CWO Jensen said.

"At first they wouldn't even look at you, but eventually locals were inviting us over for dinner at their houses," MSG Kinkel explained. "We definitely won over their trust."

"Places that no one could ever go before without getting attacked became peaceful," CWO Jensen said.

CWO Jensen explained his team's presence in the region was needed to pave the way for upcoming national elections in October – the country's first post-Taliban elections. Without the lasting peace in the region that had been established by the U.S. forces, he said, "They're not going to hold an election in an area that is dangerous."

THE DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE'S NEW ONLINE DATABASE FOR GUARD EMPLOYMENT DETAILS

Defense Department (DoD) reporting system has begun so members of all seven reserve components can register their employers.

The database is called the Civilian Employment Information Program, and it is the way for all Guard and Reserve members to comply with the law that requires them to inform DoD of who employs them and how they are employed when not performing their military duties.

"DoD decision-makers need to know [about your] employers," officials explained. The database will, among other things, give DoD a better idea of who should, and should not, be mobilized for national emergencies.

"This program will make it possible for defense officials to know who can be called up for active military duty without jeopardizing the civilian forces responsible for safeguarding our country," explained David Chu, undersecretary of defense for personnel and readiness.

Members of the ARNG, Air National Guard, Air Force Reserve and Navy Individual Ready Reserve can now enter their employment data on the new Defense Manpower Data Center Web site. Members of the Army Reserve. Navy Selected Reserve, Marine Reserve and Coast Guard Reserve will be able to enter their employment data on their existing personnel reporting systems.

"The goal is to maintain a 95% accurate data base for the Selected Reserve," explained Thomas Hall, assistant secretary of defense for reserve affairs, "and to maintain 75% accuracy for the Individual Ready Reserve database. The department is required by law to maintain adequate and current personnel records on members of the reserve components, including each member's civilian occupational skills."

MTU: MARKSMANSHIP TRAINING UNIT GX GOES TO SCHOOL

"Our history teaches two very profound lessons about marksmanship. First, it is an acquired skill which is developed through practice and training. Second, a battlefield is a very unforgiving classroom."

There are no 'born shooters.'" A flat statement of fact from SFC William C. Rayner. "It's all about trigger time." The Sergeant should know. He's one of the dedicated instructors at the National Guard Marksmanship Training Unit (MTU) at Camp Robinson in North Little Rock, Arkansas, whose job it is to make sure that soldiers aren't trying to learn weapons skills while under enemy fire. *GX* was invited to the base to observe training exercises and see a little of what it takes for troops to become combat ready.

MTU builds weapons proficiency and thus battlefield survivability through a dual mission: Marksmanship Competitions and Training.

Competitive Shooting plays a key role in the development of critical marksmanship skills at MTU. Since any serving Guard member has a chance to participate, competitions like those building up to the Winston P. Wilson National Championships stand as an open invitation to improve proficiency in pistol, rifle and light machinegun. As such events gain in popularity and participation, spreading the competitive spirit to units across the country, more and more soldiers choose to spend time on the range sharpening their aim.

Recently, Guard shooters and teams have also been using their range skills to claim some hard-earned respect from their "full-time" service compatriots. The All-Guard team took 1st and 2nd in individual and 2nd in team at the Interservice Rifle Championship, beating out the Marines and finishing close behind the Army team.

Training, which takes the form of a number of courses covering subjects from small arms expertise to advanced sniper skills, is provided to members of all service branches not only at Camp Robinson but throughout the country and around the world through the use of Mobile Training Teams. [See Recon, GX1] These programs are a mixture of intense classroom study, field training, and live fire exercises.

The two most impressive class-related displays we were present for were a night fire exercise and a trip to the M-203 grenade launcher range. While sights like this may be commonplace to trained warriors, as outside observers, we were impressed. The night fire (M-16s with tracers every 3rd round) took place under a moonless sky rendering the targets invisible to our eyes, but not to the shooters. Although clearly a difficult task, we were able to see some impressive hits when phosphorous rounds would lodge in a pop-up target and ignite it.

In stunning contrast, when we saw the same class on the grenade range, they made firing the M-203 look simple. They seemed to think nothing of lobbing rounds through a window-sized opening at 50m or dropping them onto mark-

ers at 100-150m. It seemed almost absurd when more than a few smashed into an APC at 300m. After a synchronized airburst volley which formed a near perfect line over the target, all we could do was shake our heads in wonder at the weapon mastery being exhibited.

"We spend a lot of time on weapons maintenance as well as actual marksmanship," SFC Rayner explained, "The best marksman in the world isn't much good if his weapon won't fire." Since several of the rotating staff of instructors have recently returned from deployment, the curriculum is able to go beyond basic instruction and adapt to actual field conditions. Whereas it might take months or years to update official field manuals, MTU trainers can easily pass on the latest life-saving tips from the field like the advantages of graphite over grease in a desert environment (sand can accumulate in a wet lubricant). As the war on terrorism has expanded and more Guard members have been deployed, the need for combat weapons training has grown dramatically. The committed professionals at MTU have risen to the challenge, going to great lengths, working long hours at home and abroad trying to ensure that every soldier they can reach is a confident and professional warrior.

Under the Select, Train, Promote, Assign Program (STPA), you can earn points toward promotion by qualifying on most weapons systems. The different levels of qualification and the corresponding are: Marksman - 25 points, Sharpshooter - 50 points, Expert - 75 points.

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

JUST THE FACTS THE TRUTH ABOUT PROMOTIONS WHILE DEPLOYED

OFFICERS

Mobilized officers failing to complete Officer Education System (OES) prerequisite training for promotion remain non-promotable while mobilized.

Exceptions to policy of OES system training requirements are considered for Warrant Officers on a caseby-case basis. Reference ARNG PPG Annex F.

Reserve Component Officers are not authorized to attend professional education courses while deployed OCONUS.

ARNG officers may continue to be considered for promotion under the unit vacancy promotion process IAW NGR 600-100. However, only officers within the mobilized unit may be considered for unit vacancy promotion while the unit is mobilized. Note: ARNG officers are not authorized unit vacancy promotions in non-deployed units.

ARNG officers DA selected for promotion by a DA mandatory promotion board, but not promoted before being mobilized, or who were selected for promotion by a DA mandatory promotion board while mobilized, will have the following options:

(a) Officers may be promoted immediately when appointed in the state against a position, of the higher grade, the officer will occupy upon demobilization. This policy applies only to DA mandatory promotion selectees; it does not apply to unit promotions or to officers selected for promotion to Captain who do not possess a baccalaureate degree. While this is authorized, the states are not required to promote individuals utilizing this procedure. Guidance on the procedures to be utilized for promotion of officers was published in the Memorandum, NGB-ARH, subject: Promotion of Mobilized ARNG Officers who are Selected for Promotion by a Department of the Army (DA) Mandatory Promotion Board, dated 30 January 2004.

(b) Delay the promotion for up to three years for LTC and below. Upon approaching his/her maximum time in grade (TIG) date while still mobilized, the officer can request a delay of promotion IAW AR 135-155, Chapter 4, Section IV. This may be to the officer's advantage if the officer's maximum TIG date is late in the period of mobilization,

affording the officer a longer period to find a suitable position in the selected reserve. Those officers DA-selected for promotion to COL (O-6) should refer to the Memorandum published on an annual basis.

(c) Decline the promotion. At any time prior to or upon reaching maximum TIG date, the officer can choose to decline the promotion. Upon doing so, the officer's name will be removed from the promotion list and the officer will be considered to have been non-selected for promotion. The provisions of AR 135-155, paragraph 4-28, apply.

(d) A mobilized officer who is selected for promotion by a DA mandatory promotion board and is on an approved promotion list shall (if not promoted sooner or removed from the promotion list by the President or declination) be promoted without regard to the existence of a vacancy, on the date on which the officer completes the maximum years of service in grade as indicated on table 1. (The reference for this is section 14304(b) title 10).

ENLISTED SOLDIERS

Enlisted Soldiers have the same opportunity to compete for unit vacancies regardless of their deployment status. Deployed Soldiers have an even greater advantage for vacancies within the deployed unit; they only compete with Soldiers assigned within the deployed unit. However, deployed Soldiers on the States' enlisted promotion lists remain eligible for unit vacancies based on their elections on the NGB Form 4100. If selected, they will be promoted against that vacancy and reassigned to the new position after they are released from active duty.

The time required to produce promotion orders is the same during deployment as for Soldiers in units that are not deployed. Commanders of mobilized units must coordinate and receive approval from the United States Army Human Resources Command-Alexandria (referred to HRC-Alexandria), before States may issue promotion orders. The coordination process normally takes 2-3 days.

Soldiers assigned to a non-deployed unit in the rear, can only compete for promotion against vacancies within non-deployed units in their assigned State.

Only deployed Soldiers in grade E3 are authorized advancement to E4 without regard to duty qualification or position vacancy upon reaching 26 months time in service.

ARNG Soldiers either deployed or non-deployed must be selected and promoted against a valid vacancy.

Mobilized SGT through SFC who are fully qualified in their current grade, including NCOES, are authorized to be promoted while mobilized without completion of the next level of NCOES. However, they must complete the NCOES requirements for their new grade within 24 months after REFRAD before eligible for further promotion. The first general officer in a Soldier's chain of command may extend the time requirement for one additional year based upon extenuating circumstances. Reserve Component Soldiers with reporting dates greater than two months will deploy with their unit and may be rescheduled for a course upon tour completion. Mobilized Soldiers may attend NCOES courses while deployed with approval of their commander in theater.

All NCOES requirements for the rank in which promoted must be fulfilled before further promotion consideration.

Soldiers who completed the common core (Phase 1) of BNCOC or ANCOC prior to being called to active duty under 10 USC 12302 or12304 will attend the next phase with 24 months after REFRAD. Waivers are authorized for an additional one year.

1. The Global War on Terrorism has seen the greatest use of the National Guard since WW II. How do you see the National Guard's Mission evolving over the next several years?

JK: In order to lead abroad we must be secure at home. The National Guard has played an important role in our operations both in Iraq and Afghanistan. They have made tremendous sacrifices, all in the name of freedom. When I am Commander in Chief, I will make sure the National Guard, as an important additional duty, is part of an integrated homeland security strategy.

GB: The war on terror has helped transform the mission of our military, and we are actively working to enhance our readiness, responsiveness, and capabilities. There is an ongoing process of moving some skill sets from the active force to the National Guard and Reserve while taking other skill sets that are in the National Guard and Reserve and moving them to the active force. We are looking at the long-term implications of longer deployments to help us understand adjustments in programs and forces that may be needed.

2. Do you favor expanding the U.S. Military in order to better respond to the Global War on Terrorism?

JK: Yes, I believe we must add 40,000 troops to the activeduty Army to prevent and prepare for other possible conflicts and win the war on terror. As President, I will ensure that our military has sufficient troop strength to protect our national security without placing an undue burden on the men and women of our armed forces. As part of this increase, I will double overall Army Special Forces capabilities, and I will increase by 1,200 the number of civil affairs personnel - 200 active-duty and 1,000 reserves.

Currently, the Bush administration is relying on temporary solutions including "Stop Loss" orders, recalling the Individual Ready Reserve and extending tours to meet our commitments. These temporary measures have increased the burden on our troops and their families without addressing the underlying reality: we need more troops. **GB:** Military commanders in the field tell me they have the personnel and resources they need. If they need more, I will make sure they get it. We have the resources now to meet current and potential threats. I have great confidence in the men and women of our armed forces, and our nation greatly appreciates their service and honors their sacrifices. In my role as Commander in Chief, my pledge to our Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen, and Marines is that they will have what they need to get the job done. Our enemies need to know that we are determined, and any effort to test us will draw a strong response. We will meet any test with all the might of this great country.

CANDIDATES RESPOND

3. How do you propose to deal with Iran's pursuit of nuclear weapons, and how does our involvement in Iraq help or hinder that growing threat?

JK: The Bush administration has been on the sidelines while Iran has advanced their nuclear program. America needs to lead - a nuclear armed Iran is unacceptable.

I have proposed a realistic strategy for international action against Iran -- organizing a group of states that will offer the nuclear fuel they need for peaceful purposes and take back the spent fuel so they can't divert the nuclear fuel to build a weapon.

We must make clear to Iran that we will lead an international effort to push for tough measures including sanctions if they do not accept this offer and give up their uranium enrichment program and allow verifiable assurances that they are not trying to develop nuclear weapons.

We rushed into war with Iraq because George Bush told the American people that Saddam Hussein possessed weapons of mass destruction and had ties to Al Qaeda - neither proved to be true. The Bush administration has demonstrated time and time again their incompetence in dealing with the real threats that we face, and we are less safe because of it. **GB:** The United States has been very actively and aggressively mobilizing the international community to join in our efforts to eliminate the threat of nuclear proliferation that Iran poses to the world. Already our allies have begun to respond. Through the influence of European countries, we have obtained a commitment from Iran to comply with the additional International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) demands. And the IAEA is beginning to take stronger action against Iran, bringing us closer to ending its uranium enrichment and reprocessing activities.

A free Iraq will send a clear message to people in Iran that free societies are possible. As we pursue the war on terror, our actions prove our resolve, and we will continue to work with the international community to eliminate these threats.

4. How do you propose to reduce the threat of North Korea's nuclear capability, and in what capacity should our allies in the region (such as Japan and South Korea) participate?

JK: I will not ignore growing nuclear dangers. As President, I will work with our allies to reduce tensions and get the six-party talks back on track - I applaud the efforts of South Korea in trying to move this process forward. We must be prepared to talk directly with the North Koreans as part of the six-party talks. This problem is too urgent to allow China, or others at the table, to speak for us. We must work together with our allies to get a comprehensive agreement that addresses the full range of issues of concern and with rigorous verification for the complete and irreversible elimination of North Korea's nuclear weapons program.

GB: We are also pursuing threats posed by nuclear arms proliferation in North Korea. We have created the six-party framework in which all of North Korea's neighbors have firmly stated that North Korea must end its nuclear weapons programs in order to be a part of the international community. We are pleased that China, which has long been North Korea's only benefactor in the international community, has joined its fellow nations in placing diplomatic pressure on North Korea.

5. The current administration has announced its intention to remove troops from Germany and South Korea. How should those troops be redeployed?

JK: As for President Bush's plan to withdraw 70,000 troops from Asia and Europe, nobody wants to bring troops home more than those of us who have fought in foreign wars. But it needs to be done at the right time and in a sensible way. This is not that time or that way. Let's be clear: the President's vaguely stated plan does not strengthen our hand in the war against terror. And in no way relieves the strain on our overextended military personnel. And this hastily announced plan raises more doubts about our intentions and our commitments than it provides real answers. For example, why are we unilaterally withdrawing 12,000 troops from the Korean Peninsula at the very time we are negotiating with North Korea – a country that really has nuclear weapons? This is clearly the wrong signal to send at the wrong time. **GB:** As part of our entire global posture realignment process to meet new and emerging threats, our military leaders have determined that the 2nd Brigade of the 2nd Infantry will be relocated from South Korea to Iraq. Any redeployment of a brigade from South Korea does not in any way diminish our commitment to South Korea and the region. We believe the remaining forces along with our South Korean partners are in a high state of training and readiness and can address any threats on the peninsula.

6. What, if any, role should the U.N. play in shaping our foreign policy?

JK: I will never give any nation or international institution a veto over our national security. However, I will launch and lead a new era of alliances to defeat terrorism. We can not win war on terror without allies and without help from institutions like United Nations.

GB: I have great respect for institutions like the United Nations that promote our shared international goals of peace, security, and prosperity.

The U.N. must fulfill its mission by holding outlaw states to account, by aiding the rise of stable democracies, and by encouraging development and hope as alternatives to stagnation and bitterness. The U.N. is serving these great purposes in many places. America supports all of these efforts, and we know that more will be necessary. We will work closely with the U.N. to confront terror and to fight the suffering and despair that terrorists exploit.

Protecting the American people and our homeland is my most important job and responsibility as President. I am all for united action, yet America must never outsource our national security decisions to the leaders of other countries.

7. How do you see using the U.S. military for ongoing peacekeeping/humanitarian missions in Somalia, the Sudan, and similar countries that may not directly affect our national interest?

JK: I believe that U.S. engagement in Africa should reflect the continent's vital significance to U.S. interests as well as the moral imperative to help a continent struggling with the scourge of disease, persistent poverty, and instability.

As President, I will work with the United Nations and Africa's regional organizations to address Africa's persistent, disproportionate share of the world's weak, failing states and chronic armed conflicts. I will support effective relief efforts when there is a humanitarian crisis - particularly at this moment in Darfur, Sudan, where genocide is underway. In this case, we should contribute sufficient funds and the logistical support the African Union needs to accomplish this mission. **GB:** Our nation condemns the atrocities that have occurred in nations such as Sudan and Somalia and encourages an international diplomatic approach to pursuing freedom and peace in these nations. The State Department is pursuing a comprehensive approach to creating peace in Africa that does not, at present, include a major commitment of U.S. troops. We played a key role in negotiating the April 8 ceasefire in Darfur and in negotiating the entrance of African Union monitors. We are working with the United Nations to organize an international humanitarian force, and we will consider sanctions on the Sudanese government if they fail to cooperate with international peace efforts.

8. How do you balance the pursuit of greater domestic security with the threat it imposes on personal privacy rights?

JK: I believe in an America that is safe and free. I believe we must always remember that terrorists do not just target our lives - they target our way of life. As President, I will defend our liberty and our security at home and will appoint an Attorney General who values and protects civil liberties.

GB: My administration is preserving the rights of Americans while protecting them from the acts of terrorists.

The PATRIOT Act, passed with sweeping bipartisan support, is helping to track down terrorists and prevent terrorist attacks. By extending to terrorism investigations the same tools that have been used for years to fight organized crime, drug kingpins, and child molesters, this law is proving to be a powerful tool in the fight against terror. Safeguards for civil liberties are built into the PATRIOT Act every step of the way, such as requiring prosecutors to obtain advance approval from a judge, and the Inspector General of the Department of Justice has reported to Congress that the Act has not been shown to be responsible for a single documented civil liberties violation. In August, I created the new President's Board of Safeguarding Americans' Civil Liberties, which will add even more focus to my commitment.

9. How do you balance the wartime needs of the nation and the emergency preparedness needs of the states with regard to the use of the National Guard?

JK: As President, I will integrate the National Guard into our broader homeland security strategy. To accomplish this goal, I will make homeland security an important additional mission of the National Guard. Large deployments of Guard members to Iraq have actually weakened local defenses because so many members of the Guard are first responders in their communities - fire fighters, police officers, and emergency medical technicians.

GB: Across the country, the men and women of the National Guard are answering the call of duty, fighting the forces of terror in Iraq and Afghanistan, and helping Americans contend with natural disasters here at home. I know that call-ups and mobilizations are difficult for Guard members and their families. America is grateful for the service of the Guard, their sacrifices, and the sacrifices of their families. Since the attacks of September 11, thousands of Army and Air National Guard members have been called up to provide important homeland security measures. such as additional airport security, flying air patrols, and protecting critical infrastructure and nuclear facilities. My Administration is working to reduce the stresses being placed on members of the Guard and Reserves. We are minimizing the number of extensions and repeat mobilizations by cross-training and retraining some of our forces. Our strategy also includes making use of available military personnel assets, civilian personnel at the Department of Defense, and contractors.

10. Several states have implemented a tuition-free partnership between state universities and the National Guard, and in some cases, the Reserves. Would you support a bill that guarantees all Guard, Reserve, and Active Duty Members of the military free education at state universities, colleges, and community colleges?

- **JK:** Almost every state has some form of post-Secondary educational incentives for qualified members of their National Guard. I understand that the few states that do not have this incentive are working on it and I applaud and support these efforts. As President, I will fight to improve Guard and Reserve educational benefits under the Montgomery G.I. Bill to better reflect the realities of service and shared sacrifice.
- **GB:** I value the courage and honor the sacrifice of the men and women of the National Guard and Reserve, and I strongly support the Montgomery G.I. Bill education assistance programs since it demonstrates the nation's gratitude for service. I signed into law H.R. 1292 – the 21st Century Montgomery G.I. Bill Enhancement Act – which increased the rates of basic educational assistance for eligible veterans and active-duty personnel. I have also called on Congress to increase the monthly educational benefit for Guard and Reserve forces mobilized for more than 90 days in the war on terror by 40 to 80 percent, depending on the length of their mobilization. Congress must pass this piece of legislation.

11. Would you support a bill that provides all National Guard members and their families free health care regardless of whether or not the military member is employed?

- **JK:** TRICARE must be expanded for members of the National Guard and Reserves. Anytime a Soldier is called to active duty only to discover an untreated illness is a waste of taxpayer dollars. It disrupts the units with which he or she has trained. And it makes us less ready. I have been proud to co-sponsor measures in the Senate to expand TRICARE to the Guard and Reserve and have great difficulty understanding the administration's willingness to veto defense spending over this issue. In cases where it is impractical for Reservists to use TRICARE, I support government payment of COBRA fees so reservist families can keep their civilian insurance. This is a readiness issue that we must address.
- **GB:** Our nation has called on the men and women of the National Guard and Reserve more than ever in the war on terror, and we honor their service. My administration has also worked to address the effects of active duty on members of the Guard and Reserve and their families. We have expanded health care benefits for Guard and Reserve forces and their family members, giving them access to the military's TRICARE system for up to 90 days before they report and 180 days after deactivation – and I will ask Congress to make that expansion permanent.

- 12. What would you tell a recently deployed member of the National Guard to encourage them to continue their enlistment after having endured the hardship of months away from their families?
- **JK:** You are now members of a group of heroes which enrolled its first members on the Lexington Green in my home state of Massachusetts, on the morning of April 19th, 1775. Your recent service to the Nation is as meaningful as all those who entered this hallowed society before you.

Your country still needs you. We need your skill, your experience, your courage. We need the National Guard to keep America strong and free. Every president has a responsibility to the men and women of the American military, and to you I make this solemn pledge: to lead this country as best I can, to employ every tool of American power with the wisdom the Lord shares with me; and to act decisively when America is imperiled. But our security begins with you, and the men and women like you who wear the uniform and serve our country.

GB: Our Reservists and National Guardsmen and women are serving superbly, and their sacrifice and courage are honored and appreciated by the American people. When tragedy came on September 11, 2001, the response of the Guard was outstanding. A thousand Guard volunteers came forward to help that day, and by sunrise on September 12, 2001, more than 5,000 Guard volunteers were on the job. In the past three years, Guard units have defended the American homeland against further attack and taken the battle to our enemies abroad. The National Guard has played a critical role in every aspect of Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi Freedom. More than 185,000 Guard members have been called up to serve on every front in the war on terror.

Being separated from family is one of the most difficult sacrifices that a person can make, and we are maintaining our commitment to our troops by ensuring that they have the resources they need to fight and complete this mission as quickly as possible, and that their families are provided for in their absence.

To the men and women of the National Guard and Reserves: your cause is just and your sacrifice has earned you the gratitude of your nation, and the respect of the entire world.

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

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



Defend Your Actions" was blinking on the wall sized projection in front of us. We glanced quizzically at SFC Rayner. He was shaking his head in disgust. "Good job guys, you just violated the Geneva Convention.", he sighed. The younger brother looked puzzled then responded slowly, "But we aren't signatories to the Geneva Convention. Heck, we've never even been to Switzerland."

"Riiiight," SFC Rayner answered after a brief pause, "Let's check the playback". A few clicks later and it was painfully apparent that we had just rained hell down on an irate but unarmed civilian (but he looked really guilty). The elder brother guipped: "Ah well. I hear that the Hague is nice this time of year."

SFC Rayner, the combat weapons instructor for Camp Robinson's Marksmanship Training Unit (MTU) had been running us through scenarios on the latest and greatest in virtual training devices: the Engagement Skills Trainer 2000 (EST). The EST is not something you can buy down at your local computer store (we checked). It is available only in advanced training facilities like the MTU. It takes up an entire room and consists of a 14m by 4m projection screen, an integrated computer system that details your success or failure in nauseating detail and actual decommissioned weapons that have been equipped to recoil like the real thing, as our sore and bruised shoulders will attest.

The EST scenarios run the range from "Shoot, Don't Shoot" missions like the one we Ramboed our way through to free fire simulations of an armored assault on your position (we

highly recommend the rocket launcher). They simulate weather and lighting conditions which, along with a brutal sound system, go a long way to recreate combat conditions in a controlled environment.

"Let's try you guys out on something a little easier." SFC Rayner suggested as he pointed the younger brother to the 240 Bravo and the elder to an M-16. "Anyone coming over that hill is a bad guy. Hold this position!" he ordered. A new scenario flickered into existence in front of us. Nine minutes later we grinned at each other over blistered trigger fingers. Mighty warriors we were, holding back wave after wave of vicious pixilated enemies. Our chests swelled with pride.

Then SFC Rayner ran the playback. "That's pretty good shooting boys," he said. "Of course, you expended the battalion's ammunition allotment for the year, but you did stop them." Our egos promptly resumed their normal size as we realized this sort of work is best left to the experts in uniform.

While virtual training is no substitute for real trigger time it provides a unique opportunity to train for various situations that you may not get elsewhere. If you get a chance to spend any time on one of these simulators we highly recommend it. Not only is it an excellent training aid that will allow you to sharpen your skills before you need them on the battlefield, it is without a doubt the best video game. Ever. 🗗

Fighting through the nightmarish environments of this shooter has been one of the most immersive gaming experiences we've ever had. The graphic engine, level designs, and lighting and sound effects work together to create an environment that sucks you in from the moment the lights go out and keeps your pulse pounding well after you've shut your computer down for the night.

Be warned, the A.I. on this game isn't really all that great. The bad guys charge at you; you duck around a corner and greet them with a 12 -gauge in the face when they follow. Events feel heavily scripted and after several hours of game play, it tends to get a bit repetitive.

Finally, what almost ruined the game for us: You start alone in the dark with a handgun and a flashlight, but you can't use both at the same time. Our grandmother, God rest her soul, could use her pearl handled .25 and a Ray-O-Vac flashlight to plug varmints in the middle of the night, so why can't a marine work it out? Download one of the mods available on the internet to fix this or it'll wear you out.

Overall, this is a good game and despite the flaws we recommend it to anyone whose PC can handle the hefty system requirements.

t's football season, baby – and that means tailgate parties. So forget the usual witty introduction, we'll have to pass this month on saluting all you fine National Guard men and women, because we need to get straight to the food and drink.

Everything here is easy, and you can do it all with nothing more complicated than a mini grill, a hot plate, and a gaspowered blender. That's right – a blender with a pull-starter. But we'll get to that later.

You already know to bring plenty of burgers and bratwursts

to grill, but what are you going to munch on while you wait for the charcoal to burn?

Answer: Paula's Football Cheese Dip.

You'll need:

- ✓ 1 cup each of shredded Cheddar and Velveeta
- ✓ 1 small can of good red salsa
- ✓ 1 chopped jalapeño
- ✓ 1 or 2 or 9 dashes of Tabasco
- ✓ 2 big bags of sturdy corn chips

Heat it, stir it, dip your chips in it. It's that simple. And when no one is looking, feel free to pour a little of your beer in there. Doing so adds a certain special something: Genuine beer flavor.

Everybody already knows how to grill burgers and brats, but not everyone knows how to make them great. The secret is in the onions, and Shel-Bar Onions are the best.

You'll need:

- ✓ 1 large white onion, sliced thin
- ✓ 1 stick unsalted butter
- ✓ 1 tablespoon (guestimate is fine) Lawry's Seasoning Salt
- ✓ 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- ✓ A small cast-iron skillet
- ✓ More of your beer

You'll need:

- ✓ 9 ounces gold tequila
- ✓ 3 ounces brandy
- ✓ 1 6-ounce can frozen limeade concentrate
- ✓ 3 cans of water (use limeade can)
- ✓ 3 ounces Cointreau
- ✓ Salt

That makes a good-sized pitcher, but feel free to double it. Measure it at home, make it at the stadium. Pour everything but the salt into a sealed container and put in the cooler.

Fill the blender with ice, pour in the mixture, and let'er rip. If you're really using a gas blender, 10-15 seconds on high speed is all it takes. Behold the power of the internalcombustion engine. Salt the rims of your cups or margarita glasses, pour and enjoy.

Add some good company and your favorite team to the mix, and that's all there is to throwing the biggest, baddest tailgate party ever. Don't forget to bring plenty of soft drinks for the kids, and make sure you've got a designated driver.

One last thing. To everybody at the Denver National Guard Armory: Go Broncos!







LTG H STEVEN BLUM TALKS CANDIDLY ABOUT THE PAST, PRESENT, AND FUTURE OF THE ARNG

n September, *GX* sat down with Chief of the National Guard Bureau, LTG H Steven Blum, presidentially appointed principal advisor on all National Guard issues to the Secretaries and Chiefs of Staff of the Army and of the Air Force. We interviewed LTG Blum for a "State of the Guard" report and an update on "The Way Ahead" - LTG Blum's initiative to handle the reorganization of the Guard as an operational force, rather than a strategic reserve.

"We have Citizen-Soldiers deployed all over the world doing everything from support for civil authorities to high-end, close combat, joint operations in Iraq and Afghanistan. Our Soldiers are also involved in peace-keeping operations and all these things are happening simultaneously and being done in the most superb manner. So, if you can't tell, I'm awfully proud.

We're talking about a force where people used to question whether the Guard was relevant. And now they answer that question by saying, 'They're essential. We couldn't do what we're doing without them.' We are operating and deploying at a rate unprecedented in the history of our organization. And the Guard's been an all-volunteer recruited force since day one, for 367

years. Not one single Army or Air Guard Soldier that's been called to duty has failed to show up since 9-11. And we have called upon over 200,000 since 9-11. They've signed up to be the 21st Century Minuteman. They're willing to transition from Citizen to Soldier in a matter of minutes, especially if it's for protecting their hometown America.

Homeland Defense is the Guard's number one priority. They're really ensuring that we have 4th's of July in the years to come. They are the guardians of freedom. And we like to defend our freedom as far away and in as much depth as we can, in what I call the 'scheduled away game against the terrorists.' But sometimes you've got to be ready for an 'unscheduled home game,' like 9-11.

The Guard was magnificent on 9-11. We had 8,300 respond in New York, most of them without orders. The first people who responded at the Pentagon were D.C., Virginia, and Maryland National Guard. They didn't wait to be mobilized; they just reported and did what needed to be done. The Air National Guard went from single-digit, I think it was six or seven airplanes on alert around the whole country, to 400 armed combat air patrols over every populated part of our country within 24 hours. There's not another air force in the world that can do that. It's just remarkable. They called in and said, 'We're ready. Tell us what you want us to do.' These kids are a national treasure; there's no question about it.

When you call out the Guard, you're calling out America's hometowns. And when America's hometowns send their

Guard unit to war, the churches, the schools, the businesses, their friends, and neighbors all go there to fight with them. That's a very strong message to send to our adversaries; and it's a great combat multiplier for our troops. It really sustains our troops, knowing that somebody cares and values what they're doing. Almost everybody knows somebody that's over there. The Guard connects the American people with the American military.

These are great kids. They don't quit. These young men and women that are answering the call to the colors are showing patriotism and commitment. They truly live the Army and Air Force values every day. There's the man who pulled the kids out of the car and saved them, he's applying his warfighting skills and training to add value to his community here at home [See "Overcoming Fear," Page 45]. Whether they're back here in the communities, in their hometowns or when they're serving overseas, they're invaluable.

Now, my job is to make sure they get the money, the training, and equipment that they need to get the job done and make the right changes to the promotion policies, and the enlistment and reenlistment bonus policies, benefits and compensation to become more realistic for an operational force. The Guard was built for a strategic reserve. We're no longer a strategic reserve. The same skills and the same training and equipment that you need to be successful in accomplishing your mission overseas are exactly what you need to be able to defend the homeland or to respond to catastrophes brought on by Mother Nature.

I think I owe these young Citizen-Soldiers and their families and their employers some predictability as to what they can expect, how frequently they can expect to be called. We need to work very hard to shorten the length of tours ... maybe boots on the ground for six to nine months. They should have some predictability in their lives so they can manage their careers and their families and their education. I think, if we can get equity on the benefits and entitlements to reflect the amount of sacrifice and service they're making, I think the National Guard will be a strong and viable organization forever."

And in 25 words or less, a summation of "The Way Ahead"?

"I can do that in probably four words. A Guard that is *ready*; a Guard that is *reliable*, *accessible* and *essential*. If we're ready, reliable, accessible to the governors and to the President, and essential to the Air Force and Army, the future of the National Guard looks very, very bright to me. The opportunities for these young Soldiers are enormous. There are opportunities for experience and training that were unavailable to their Guard predecessors. This is a whole new world opening up for them."

Appointed by the President, LTG Blum is the principal adviser to the Secretary and Chief of Staff

of the Army, and the Secretary and Chief of Staff of the Air Force on all National Guard issues.
