


NONCOMBATANT EVACUATION OPERATIONS (NEO)





What is Noncombatant Evacuation?

- Department of State (Embassy) led
 - Department of Defense (United States Forces Korea) assisted
- Noncombatants at risk are evacuated
 - War
 - Political / Civil Instability
 - Natural Disaster
- Safe Haven or Repatriation

Who qualifies as an Noncombatant Evacuee?

- US citizens who may be <u>ordered</u> to evacuate
 - US Government civilian employees and dependents
 - US Armed Forces family members
 - Designated US Armed Forces military personnel

- US/non-US citizens who may be <u>authorized</u> assistance
 - Private US citizens and their dependents
 - Legal permanent residents of the US
 - Designated foreign national employees of the US Government and their dependents
 - Designated foreign nationals

U.S. Embassy (AMEMB) Seoul designates those authorized evacuation assistance



Steps in NEO that affect you!

- 1. Voluntary Departure
 - a. Noncombatants leave at their own expense

2. Authorized Departure


b. US Government (USG) affiliated Noncombatants leave at government expense

3. Ordered Departure

- a. US Government (USG) affiliated Noncombatants are ordered to leave (at government expense) per Status of Forces Agreement (SOFA)
- Note: Step #4 NEO includes evacuation of American Citizens (AMCITs) and select Third Country Nationals (TCNs) from Korea according to US Department of State.




Concept of Evacuation



APOE= Air Point of Embarkation SPOE= Sea Point of Embarkation



Evacuation Control Centers (ECC) offer more stations & services than Assembly Points (AP).

 - Little or no warning
 - Remain calm
 - Follow instructions

- **3.** Be proactive and cooperative!


"CRITICAL DOCUMENTS" NEEDED TO RESUME LIFE IN U.S.

MANDATORY ITEMS

- IDENTIFICATION CARDS
- PASSPORTS
- FAMILY CARE PLAN (Single and Dual Military Parents)
- PREPARED FORMS

RECOMMENDED ITEMS (Hard to replace items)

- BIRTH, MARRIAGE AND ADOPTION CERTIFICATES
- POWER OF ATTORNEY
- WILL
- INSURANCE POLICIES
- CHECK BOOK/BANK BOOK/CREDIT CARDS
- VEHICLE REGISTRATION AND TITLE
- SOCIAL SECURITY CARDS
- TAX RETURNS
- MEDICAL RECORDS





EACH PERSON IS ALLOWED ONE AIRLINE CARRY-ON & ONE CHECK-IN BAG TOTALING NO MORE THAN <u>66</u> LBS

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NEO Bags

- LIMITED CASH (~\$100-200)
- FLASHLIGHT AND BATTERIES
- BATTERY OPERATED RADIO
- FIRST AID KIT
- BABY & FEMININE ARTICLES
- TOILETRIES, TOWELS
- CHANGE OF CLOTHES (WARM)
- BLANKET
- PROTECTIVE MASKS
- (BABY, TOO!) • 30 DAYS MEDS (CONTINGENCY PRESCRIPTION)
- 3 DAYS FOOD / WATER







Pets

- PETS ARE CONSIDERED FAMILY MEMBERS
 - REGISTERED IN / TRACKED BY NEO TRACKING SYSTEM
 - DO NOT HAVE PRIORITY OVER PEOPLE
- IF <25lbs, EVAC WITH OWNERS (CARRY-ON)
 - LARGE PETS WILL BE SHIPPED LATER
- OWNERS MUST BRING FAA-APPROVED PET CARRIER AND 10 DAYS FOOD
- VET SCREENING / CARE AT EVACUATION CONTROL CENTER / RELOCATION CENTER
- PETS CANNOT BE ABANDONED
- THIS ONLY APPLIES TO USG NONCOMBATANTS

Family Force Protection Initiative

- Protective masks for non-combatants
 - ICAPS (Infant Chemical Agent Protective System) 0-10 years of Age
 - Joint Service Chemical Environment Survivability Mask (JSCESM) Adults/older children 11 years and up = M52
- Training Responsibility
 - MSC's are responsible for ensuring all authorized personnel are trained on each piece of protective equipment
 - All personnel will coordinate with their CBRN representative for training documents and aids.
 - Training Aids are available at area Training Support Activity - Korea (TSA-K) Centers
 - Training Video
 - Training ICAPS/ M52
- Sponsor responsibility
 - Sign for protective equipment at CIF
 - Available for:
 - Command Sponsored/ Non-Command Sponsored military dependents
 - U.S. DoD civilians/dependents
 - Not available for:
 - Contractors / Technical reps (Corporation holding contract must provide)

ICAPS Mask comes in a sealed box. The box can be opened and the contents can be used for training. The only portion that must remain sealed is the canister. Do not remove or tamper with the canister.




The Repatriation Process

The final link in the evacuation process



Repatriation is the process whereby American citizens are officially processed back into the United States subsequent to their evacuation from overseas

CONUS= Continental United States






Repatriation Centers

- 16 Repatriation sites in Continental United States, to include Alaska, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico
- Designed to process Department of Defense military and civilian family members, Private American Citizens (AMCITs) and Third Country Nationals (TCNs).
- Operations normally no more than 15 days; most completed within 24-48 hours






AFB= Air Force Base



Repatriation Center Services

- Assistance with orders, ID cards, etc.
- Medical care
- Counseling
- Temporary lodging
- General transportation and onward movement
- Legal assistance
- Financial assistance (receive safe haven entitlements)
- Emergency relief assistance, if needed
- Veterinary services
- Family/child care
- Family support center information (throughout the US)



- Annual NEO Field Training Exercise
- Noncombatant Evacuation Operation sites established and operated
- Relocation and evacuation training for military units and Noncombatants
- Department of Defense affiliated noncombatants must participate
- 30-45 minutes to participate (or even less!)
- Stay prepared and keep in contact with your NEO Warden, unit FRG, etc
