- 1. **Introduction.** This Directive and Standard provides the text for Standard Article 32 and addresses related requirements. Paragraph 6 of PEC P10 indicates which contracts require Standard Article 32. Standard Article 32 describes the Contracting Officer's responsibility and authority related to water shortages affecting the contract and limits the United States' associated liability.
- 2. **Applicability.** This Directive and Standard applies to Reclamation staff and officials involved in the contracting process, as defined at Paragraph 3.A. of PEC P10, for contracts requiring Standard Article 32 under Paragraph 6 of PEC P10.
- 3. **Definitions.** See Paragraph 3 of PEC P10.
- 4. **Responsibilities.** See Paragraph 4 of PEC P10.
- 5. Text of Standard Article 32.

CONSTRAINTS ON THE AVAILABILITY OF WATER¹

(a) In its operation of the Project, the Contracting Officer will use all reasonable means

to guard against a condition of shortage in the quantity of water to be made available to the

Contractor pursuant to this Contract. In the event the Contracting Officer determines that a

condition of shortage appears probable, the Contracting Officer will notify the Contractor of said determination as soon as practicable.

(b) If there is a condition of shortage because of errors in physical operations of the Project, drought, other physical causes beyond the control of the Contracting Officer or actions taken by the Contracting Officer to meet current and future legal obligations, then no liability shall accrue against the United States or any of its officers, agents, or employees for any damage, direct or indirect, arising therefrom.
