

APPLICATION KIT INFORMATION

Thank you for your interest in the Joint Venture Construction Program (JVCP). Enclosed is a complete application kit for the Indian Health Service (IHS) fiscal year (FY) 2010 JVCP. The selection of projects to participate in the FY 2010 JVCP involves (1) a two-step application phase, (2) the preparation and submission of planning documents for IHS approval, and (3) the negotiation and execution of a JVCP agreement. This application kit contains four sections: (I) Program Announcement; (II) Selection Process; (III) Application Review Process; and (IV) Application Checklist.

The Pre-Application will be used to determine if the proposed project is eligible for consideration and has the potential for successful competitive selection. The Final Application will be used by the applicants to provide documentation of their administrative and financial capabilities to accomplish the proposed JVCP project.

An **original** and **two copies** of each part of the application must be submitted, with all required documentation and signatures. By the **CLOSE OF BUSINESS on August 14, 2009** the **Pre-Application** is to be **submitted to** the **IHS Area having jurisdiction** for the proposed project.





RESPONSIBLE OFFICE: Division of Facilities Planning and Construction, Office of Environmental Health and Engineering, Indian Health Service (IHS), U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS).

PROGRAM TITLE: Fiscal Year 2010 Joint Venture Construction Program

<u>PURPOSE OF PROGRAM</u>: Under the Joint Venture Construction Program (JVCP), federally recognized American Indian and Alaska Native tribes can acquire a tribally owned health care facility, in exchange for the IHS providing the initial equipment, then operating and maintaining the health care facility for 20 years.

PURPOSE OF ANNOUNCEMENT: This announcement provides notice of the availability of funds for the IHS fiscal year (FY) 2010 JVCP, and affords eligible tribes the opportunity to apply pursuant to the Application Kit issued. The FY 2009 Congressional Language Directive states that the Joint Venture Program and the Small Ambulatory Program "have broad support, and the Service is directed to initiate new solicitations for both in this fiscal year. As in the past, the Service is encouraged to provide additional credit to tribes that are willing to provide full funding for facility equipment in addition to providing full funding for facility construction when determining priorities for project funding under the joint ventures program for hospitals and clinics." Note that the directive does not mention funding for this year. No projects will be awarded under the FY 2009 directive, but will be subject to the language in the pending FY 2010 legislation.

NUMBER OF PROJECTS ANTICIPATED FOR SELECTION: Approximately two annually.

SUMMARY: The IHS announces its FY 2010 JVCP.

This Program Announcement (PA) consists of four parts. PART I - PROGRAM DESCRIPTION provides the statutory authority for the program, describes what is authorized, provides the conditions of the authorizing legislation, and identifies the program concepts and competitive selection process to be followed. Part II - APPLICATION PHASE describes the two-step application phase and provides a tentative FY 2010 Program Schedule. Part III - EVALUATION CRITERIA FOR APPLICATIONS provides information about how the two parts of the application phase

will be evaluated. **Part IV - PROJECT SELECTION** describes the completion of the selection process. All forms necessary for the application are to be generated by the applicant following the instructions in the Application Kit.

<u>APPLICATION KITS</u>: Application Kits will be available for distribution by July 8, 2009. Application Kits may be obtained by downloading the document from the internet from a link off the IHS, OEHE web site at http://www.dfpc.ihs.gov.

<u>APPLICATION DEADLINE DATES</u>: **Pre-Applications** in response to this PA are to be submitted by the close of business on **August 14, 2009**. The Final Application due date will be established after the processing of the Pre-Applications. Summarized in paragraph II.C. below is a tentative schedule for the FY 2010 program.

<u>APPLICATION RECEIPT POINT</u>: Pre-Applications and Final Applications are to be sent to the respective IHS Area that has jurisdiction for the proposed project. See Appendix 1 of the Application Kit for IHS Area JVCP Points of Contact information.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE REQUIREMENT: All documents used for this program are to be in the English language.

METRIC REQUIREMENT: The Metric Conversion Act of 1975, P.L. 94-168 (15 U.S.C. 205a et seq.), as amended by Section 5164 of the Omnibus Trade and Competitiveness Act of 1988, P.L. 100-418, requires the use of System International (SI) metric units for all Federally-assisted construction. However, in accordance with IHS Technical Handbook Chapter 21-8, "Metrication", tribally-owned facilities are exempted from the metric requirement.

PROGRAM INFORMATION

PART I - PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Pursuant to the authorizing legislation, as amended by the FY 2009 appropriation, the IHS FY 2010 JVCP is being implemented in FY 2009, as herein described below.

A. STATUTORY AUTHORITY

The statutory authority for the JVCP is contained in the Indian Health Care Improvement Act, Title III, Section 818(e), P.L. 94-437, as amended, as codified and implemented by 25 U.S.C. 1636h(e), and as further amended by language in the FY 2009 appropriation House Report 1105, Public Law 111-8.

B. **AUTHORIZATION**

The IHS, under the FY 2009 JVCP, is authorized to establish projects where American Indian and Alaska Native tribes can construct or acquire a tribally owned outpatient health care facility, in exchange for the IHS providing the initial equipment, then operating and maintaining the health care facility for 20 years under a no-cost lease.

C. CONDITIONS OF AUTHORIZING LEGISLATION

- ♦ The tribe must have the administrative and financial capabilities necessary to complete the acquisition in a timely manner.
- ◆ The tribe must expend tribal, private, or other available non-tribal funds for the acquisition.
- ♦ The tribe is to lease the tribally owned health care facility to the IHS for 20 years under a no-cost Government lease.
- ♦ In exchange, the IHS is to provide the initial equipment, then the supplies and staffing for the operation and maintenance of the health care facility for the lease period. Although the calculated RRM staffing number is determined based upon the user population projected 10 years into the future, the actual number of staff to be funded will be 85% of the calculated total RRM for the facility opening date.
- A tribe, who has entered into an agreement with the IHS under this program, who breaches or terminates without cause such agreement, will be liable to the U.S. Government for the amount paid by the Government.

D. FY 2010 PROGRAM CONCEPTS

- ♦ INITIAL ELIGIBILITY: Federally recognized tribes planning to construct or acquire an inpatient or outpatient health care facility are eligible.
- ♦ **FUNDING PLANS:** The FY 2010 JVCP is a result of congressional direction to the IHS to "initiate new solicitations ... this fiscal year." As joint venture projects are acquired, subsequent appropriations requests will address the funding needs for staffing, operations, and maintenance of the tribally owned health care facility being leased by the IHS.
- ◆ ACQUISITION: The new outpatient health care facility acquired pursuant to the JVCP may be through new construction, renovation of an existing health care facility, or the acquisition and renovation of another suitable facility.
- ◆ PROJECT PRIORITY: Priority is to be given to tribes that currently have no existing federally-owned health care facility. Additional priority is to be given to tribes who agree to fund the equipment portion of the project.
- ◆ NO RETROACTIVE PROJECTS: Projects that have already been acquired by a tribe will not be considered retroactively. Where new construction is involved, only projects that have not entered into a construction phase, i.e. have not been given Notice To Proceed with construction, will be considered.
- ◆ TRIBAL ABILITIES: The tribe must be able to manage and fund the acquisition of the proposed project in a timely manner.
- ◆ CONFORMANCE WITH IHS AREA MASTER HEALTH PLAN: The proposed project is to be consistent with the applicable IHS Area Health Services-Facilities Master Plan, in order to maximize the efficient use of the funding.
- ◆ PJD AND POR REQUIREMENTS: Since IHS funding can support only space and staffing needs that can be verified under the existing IHS Health Facilities Construction Priority System methodology, a Program Justification Document (PJD), a Program of Requirements (POR), a combined Phases I and II Site Selection and Evaluation Report (SSER), which includes full compliance with National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) requirements, and a Government cost estimate prepared in accordance with the IHS Facilities Budget Estimating System (FBES), will be required to be prepared in accordance with the planning criteria specified in the IHS health facilities planning process. The projected workload must be validated by the IHS data system. The IHS supported staffing requirements will be determined in accordance with the IHS Resource Requirements Methodology. These approved planning documents will be the basis for providing the initial equipment funding and for the space, staffing, and the operation of the health care facility under the lease.

- ◆ STAFF QUARTERS: Any staff quarters needed to support the health care facility are to be a part of the project and are to be a part of the planning documents. All staff quarters approved in the planning documents are to be constructed and are to be available for use when the health care facility is ready for operation. However, the tribe will be the owner of the staff quarters and responsible for all costs for their construction and the subsequent operation and maintenance. Once constructed, staff quarters are to be self-supporting from revenues generated from the rental fees.
- ◆ SUSTAINABILITY: The facility will comply with all requirements of the IHS Technical Handbook Chapter 33-2.4 "Lease Sustainability Requirements for GSA and IHS Direct Leases." This Chapter is currently being finalized and will be available during Part II -- prior to completion of the planning documents.

E. SELECTION PROCESS

The selection of projects to participate in the IHS FY 2010 Joint Venture Construction Program (JVCP) involves (1) an application phase, (2) the preparation and submission of planning documents for IHS Headquarters approval, and (3) the negotiation and execution of a JVCP Agreement

PART II - APPLICATION PHASE

There will be a two-step application phase.

A. PRE-APPLICATION

In Part One, the Pre-Application will be used to determine if the proposed project is eligible for consideration and has the potential for successful competitive selection under the JVCP, in compliance with the authorizing legislation, as amended by the fiscal year (FY) 2009 appropriation language. Tribes, having the top ranking projects in the Pre-Application part of the application phase, will be requested to complete and submit Final Applications.

B. FINAL APPLICATION

In Part Two, the Final Application will be used by the applicants to provide documentation of their administrative and financial capabilities to accomplish the proposed JVCP project.

³ SSER approval by IHS Area includes NEPA approval. If an Environmental Assessment is required and is not complete, the Tribal Applicant must include all environmental compliance documentation completed to date and state when the EA is expected to be approved.

PART III - EVALUATION CRITERIA FOR APPLICATIONS

A. PRE-APPLICATION

The Pre-Application will be reviewed for compliance with the eligibility requirements, including the prior fiscal year congressional guidance that priority be given to tribes who currently do not have existing federally owned health care facilities available for their use and/or agree to fund the equipment portion of the project. Using the scores recorded on the JVCP Phase I Data and Computation Forms, a rank order will be established for the Pre-Applications received.

B. FINAL APPLICATION

An IHS - Tribal review panel will evaluate and rate the Final Applications using established rating factors. The applications will be rated on (1) relative need, (2) ability to fund project, (3) ability to manage project, and (4) ability to complete project on schedule.

PART IV - PROJECT SELECTION


Final project selection occurs after all planning documents have been approved by the IHS and the joint venture agreement is executed after negotiations.

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SECTION II SELECTION PROCESS FY 2010 JOINT VENTURE CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

SELECTION PROCESS

The selection of projects to participate in the IHS Joint Venture Construction Program (JVCP) involves (1) an application phase, (2) the preparation and submission of planning documents for IHS approval, and (3) the negotiation and execution of a JVCP Agreement.

- 1. **APPLICATION PHASE.** The application phase is in two parts:
 - a. PRE-APPLICATION. The first part of the Application Phase is in the form of a Pre-Application, which will be used to determine if the proposed project is eligible for consideration and has the potential for successful competitive selection under the JVCP, in compliance with the authorizing legislation, as amended by the fiscal year (FY) 2010 appropriation language. Tribes, having the top eight ranking projects in the Pre-Application part of the application phase, will be requested to complete and submit Final Applications.
 - **b. FINAL APPLICATION.** The second part of the Application Phase includes a Final Application, where applicants will provide documentation of their administrative and financial capabilities to accomplish the proposed JVCP project. An evaluation panel will evaluate the Final Application packages to establish a ranking of applications at this stage.

PUBLIC REPORTING BURDEN FOR INFORMATION COLLECTION (OMB Control Number: 1076-0136)

- 1. PLANNING DOCUMENTS PHASE. Tribes having projects selected as candidates for the JVCP will be requested to prepare, in concert with the applicable IHS Area, the planning documents required for the projects. The planning documents include the Program Justification Documents (PJD), Program of Requirements (POR), and Site Selection and Evaluation Reports (SSER), including the Phase I and Phase II SSER and the NEPA determination which are to be prepared in accordance with the IHS <u>Technical Handbook for Environmental Health and Engineering</u>, and submitted to the IHS Area for approval no later than the specified date in Section I, Part II.C. (Note, joint venture projects have Federal involvement requiring full compliance with National Environmental Policy Act procedures for the Phase II SSER, which is the same as those required for direct Federal projects.)
- 2. **JVCP AGREEMENT.** Once the planning documents have been approved, the JVCP Agreements will be negotiated and executed. An agreement model will be provided to the selected candidates.

CONTENT OF APPLICATIONS

PRE-APPLICATION

The Pre-Application is to be prepared by the eligible federally recognized Indian tribe. Each IHS Area has a JVCP Point-of-Contact (POC) available to assist the applicant with the preparation of the Pre-Application. Appendix 1 contains the list of IHS Areas POCs.

The Pre-Application is to be **submitted to** the office of the **IHS Area having jurisdiction** for the proposed project. The Pre-Application is **due** on **August 14, 2009**. See the Program Announcement, in Section I for details.

The IHS Area is responsible for reviewing and validating the Pre-Application; then, if all is in order, providing a recommendation signature, and forwarding the Pre-Application to the Division of Facilities Planning and Construction, Office of Environmental Health and Engineering, Indian Health Service, Suite 600C, 12300 Twinbrook Parkway, Rockville, MD 20852.

The Pre-Application is to contain, as a minimum, the following identified elements, and is to be assembled in the order shown below:

- Pre-Application Cover Sheet. The cover sheet is to identify that the document is a Pre-Application for the FY 2010 Joint Venture Construction Program, show the name of the applying tribe, and reflect the submission date. See Exhibit I for a sample.
- 2. **Signature Sheet:** A signature sheet is to be signed by the tribal leader for the proposed project. This sheet is to be signed also by the applicable IHS Area Director, recommending consideration. See Exhibit II for a sample.
- 3. **Table of Contents.** All pages of the Pre-Application are to be numbered. The Table of Contents is to list all sections in the Pre-Application, with the corresponding starting page numbers.
- 4. **Project Summary:** A two-page summary of "who-what-when-where-how-and-cost" is to be provided for the proposed project, including the project short and long term objectives.
- 5. Federally Recognized Tribe Documentation: Documentary proof that the applicant is a Federally recognized Indian tribe or tribal organization is to be provided. [This can be documented by providing a copy of the applicable page from the Federal Register that provides the Department of Interior, Bureau of Indian Affairs, Indian Notice, entitled "Indian Entities Recognized and Eligible to Receive Services From the United States Bureau of Indian Affairs," with the name of the applying tribe circled and/or highlighted. (The latest Federal Register edition is Volume 73, Number 66, dated Friday, April 4, 2008 / Notices) -- 73 FR 18553]
- 6. **Tribal Commitment:** A signed tribal resolution, certifying the tribe's commitment to participate in the JVCP, with the project identified therein, is to be included.
- 7. **JVCP Phase I Data and Computation Form:** A completed IHS JVCP Priority System Phase I Data and Computation Form is to be included. See Exhibit III for a copy of this form, and Exhibit IV for the form instructions.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE JOINT VENTURE CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM PHASE I DATA AND COMPUTATION FORM

Projects in the Pre-Application part of the Application Phase will be competitively selected based on the need for additional space as reflected on the IHS Joint Venture Construction Program Priority System Phase I Data and Computation Form, which is provided in Exhibit II. Instructions, by line item number, for the completion of that form are below. Supporting tables follow the instructions.

PART 1 - JVCP SCORE CALCULATION

- **A.** Enter the total **Projected User Population**, as provided by the IHS data system.
- **B.** The **Required Space** is determined by the calculation of the average projected size in one of two ways, depending on the service provided.

If no inpatient services (beds) are included, it is equal to the sum of 200 m² plus 0.8 times the **Projected User Population** [Line A].

If inpatient services (beds) are included, it is equal to the sum of 5,500 m² plus 3.5 times the facility's **Inpatient Bed Days**.

- **C.** The **Total Weighted Average Facility Age** is calculated in Part 2 of the form. Use Part 2 to list each and every component building in the health care facility complex, then, calculate the weighted age as indicated in the format.
- **D. Existing Space** of IHS owned health care facilities is the total gross space in square meters (m²) of **all** permanent health care buildings listed on the IHS Real Property Inventory for the facility (all except staff quarters). For tribally owned health care facilities, the gross area used is to be validated by the cognizant IHS Area Facilities Manager.
- **E.** The **Unit Cost to Replace** is calculated using the applicable outpatient facility unit cost figure times the location factor used in the current annual update for the IHS Facilities Budget Estimating System. Table A contains the current unit cost figures to be used. Table B contains the current location factors to be used.

- **F.** For the **Cost to Repair**, when the replacement of an existing health care facility is being proposed, enter the costs to correct the deficiencies identified in the Facilities Engineering Deficiencies System (FEDS) for the codes listed in Line F, then enter the sum in the extreme right box. If FEDS costs are not available, costs generated by another condition survey for the same categories used for the FEDS in this form may be used. If no health care facility exists, or for a health care facility for which no FEDS or another survey has been completed, enter zero.
- **G.** For cases where an existing health care facility applies, the **Unit Cost to Repair** equals the total FEDS [Line F] divided by the **Existing Space** [Line D]. If no health care facility exists, enter zero.
- **H.** For cases where an existing health care facility applies, the **Condition Factor** equals the **Unit Cost to Repair** [Line G] divided by the **Unit Cost to Replace** [Line E]. If no health care facility exists, enter zero.
- I. Determine the Adjusted Existing Space by multiplying the Age and Condition Factor (obtained from Table C) times the Existing Space [Line D] and subtracting that value from the Existing Space [Line D]. Using Table C, enter the value of Line H for Condition Factor, then the Age of Facility to read the Age and Condition Factor.
- **J.** Obtain the **Urgency of Need Factor** from Table D. Using Table D, enter the value of Line B for **Required Space**, then, the value of Line I for the **Adjusted Existing Space** to read the **Urgency of Need Factor**. [ALTERNATE CALCULATION FOR SMALL FACILITIES: If Line I exceeds Line B, enter zero. If Line I is less than Line B but Table D indicates zero, assign a value of 1.00 for Line J.]
- **K.** For the proposed standalone outpatient health care facility, enter the road **Distance** in kilometers (km) to the nearest health care facility having a level 1, 2, or 3 emergency room. If actual measured distances are not available, the most recent edition of the Rand McNally Road Atlas, state road map, or web-based map system such as GoogleMaps are to be used in determining the distances. Document the source and if maps are used, provide legible copies of the applicable map excerpts, with appropriate map source credit.
- **L.** Obtain the **Isolation Factor** from Table E. Using Table E, enter the value of Line K **Distance** to read the outpatient **Isolation Factor**.
- **M.** To determine the **Need**, multiply 70 times the **Urgency of Need Factor** [Line J] times the **Isolation Factor** [Line L].
- **N.** To factor in Tribal provision of equipment funds, multiply 30 times the % of the equipment funds the Tribe will provide.

O. To determine the Joint Venture Construction Program Phase I Score, multiply the sum of the Need [Line M] and % Equipment Funding [Line N] times the Planning Completion Factor from Table F times the Financial Commitment Factor from Table G.

PART 2 - WEIGHTED AVERAGE AGE OF HEALTH COMPLEX WORKSHEET

For existing health centers having more than one structure in the standalone facility, enter each building component, its gross area and age, then calculate the weighted age of each portion of the total facility to come up with the total weighted average facility age. Also, enter the result on Line C of Part 1.

FINAL APPLICATION

For short-listed projects selected in the Pre-Application part of the Application Phase, applicable tribes will be requested to submit Final Applications. Each IHS Area has a JVCP Point-of-Contact (POC) available to assist the applicant with the preparation of the Final Application. Appendix 1 contains the list of IHS Areas POCs.

The Final Application is to be submitted to the office of the IHS Area having jurisdiction for the proposed project. The due date for the Final Application will be prescribed when candidates are notified of their selection to proceed with the Final Application.

IHS Area Review and Endorsement. The IHS Area is responsible for reviewing and validating the Final Application. If all is in order, the IHS Area is to prepare an endorsement letter that certifies that the information in the Final Application has been reviewed and validated, and that the proposed project is consistent with the respective IHS Area's Health Facilities Master Plan.

The Final Application and endorsement letter is to be forwarded promptly to the Division of Facilities Planning and Construction (DFPC), Office of Environmental Health and Engineering, Indian Health Service, Suite 600C, 12300 Twinbrook Parkway, Rockville, MD 20852.

An evaluation panel convened by DFPC will evaluate the Final Applications to establish a ranking for this phase.

The Final Application is to contain, as a minimum, the following identified elements, and is to be assembled in the order shown below:

- Final Application Cover Sheet. The cover sheet is to identify that the document is a Final Application for the FY 2010 Joint Venture Construction Program, show the name of the applying tribe, and reflect the submission date. See Exhibit I for a sample.
- 2. **Signature Sheet.** A signature sheet is to be signed by the tribal leader for the proposed project. This sheet is to be signed also by the applicable IHS Area Director, recommending consideration. See Exhibit II for a sample.
- 3. **Table of Contents.** All pages of the Final Application are to be numbered. The Table of Contents is to list all sections in the Final Application, with the corresponding starting page numbers.
- 4. **Project Summary.** A two-page project summary of "who-what-when-where-how-cost" is to be provided for the proposed project, including the project short and long term objectives. This Project Summary can be the same used in the Pre-Application or can reflect any changes or updates needed for the Final Application.
- 5. **Project Narrative.** The proposed project is to be presented, including, as a minimum:
 - a. Name of Tribe sponsoring the proposed project.
 - b. Proposed geographic location of project. Supporting documents could include, for example, IHS Service Unit, IHS Service Area and general vicinity maps.
 - c. Estimated gross size in square meters of proposed new health center.
 - d. Description of proposed health care services to be provided in proposed new health center.
 - e. Certification that the proposed project is consistent with the applicable IHS Area Health Facilities Master Plan.
- 6. Project Management Plan. The administrative capabilities to complete the project in a timely manner are to be documented. This is to include the proposed method of managing the design and construction, with details about the proposed project management organization, including the design and construction managers, project team and other appropriate points of contact. Documentation could include resumes of proposed key staff members, position descriptions of proposed key staff positions, and a proposed organization chart for project administration.

- 7. **Project Budget Estimate.** The estimated cost for the proposed health center project is to be provided. The estimate is to include cost element summaries for site survey and appraisal, site acquisition, design fees, design contingency, design administration, building construction, site work, site utilities, construction administration and inspection, special purpose and moveable equipment, and construction contingency. Building service equipment costs are to be included with the building cost. If any existing IHS buildings are to be replaced, demolition must be included. Any anticipated demolition and/or removal costs associated with any existing facility to be replaced are to be identified separately and not included in the new construction costs. It is preferred that the abridged spreadsheet version of the IHS Facilities Budget Estimating System be used for the project budget estimate. A total cost (except any demolition costs) and the above listed cost element summaries are automatically calculated upon entry of the gross square meters of the facility in the spreadsheet. This spreadsheet is available from the Area JVCP POC.
- 8. Financial Plan. Provide documentation how the tribe plans to finance the tribal portion of the proposed project. This financial plan is to include details about applicable financial elements such as available funds, assets to be converted to cash, proposed loans (type and amount), proposed or existing grants, and any other proposed funding sources. To support the financial capability of the tribe, the latest Single-Agency Audit Report is to be used as a measure. For this audit requirement, the tribe is to not furnish the entire audit report, but is to furnish a copy of the letter from the National External Audit Review Center (NEARC), Office of Audit Services, Office of Inspector General, Department of Health and Human Services, which provides a review of the audit report. Also, provide a copy of the summary of the findings and recommendations that is attached to the NEARC letter. If material weaknesses or repeat findings are shown in this attachment, provide a brief addressing what the tribe is doing to correct the items that would relate to the administration of the proposed joint venture construction project.
- 9. **Schedule.** Provide a proposed time schedule (number of days planned for each major component of the project).

COMPLETING AND SUBMITTING THE APPLICATION

PREPARATION AND ASSEMBLING

The Pre-Application and the Final Application are to be prepared in the English language. Avoid jargon and do not use abbreviations until they have been spelled out first in the text. To facilitate review, validation and selection, both parts of the application are to be prepared and submitted conforming to the below requirements:

- a. Standard size, 8-1/2" x 11," white paper is to be used.
- b. All parts of the application are to be typewritten, single spaced where possible, with a regular font style and not smaller than 12 pt font size.
- a. All four border margins are to be one inch.
- b. All documents are to be printed on **one side only**, with **black** ink.
- c. Application documents are to be loose and **not bound** or **stapled**.
- d. The Cover Sheet should identify that the Pre-Application or Final Application is for the "Fiscal Year 2010 Joint Venture Construction Program." Show the name of the applying tribe, and the submission date.
- a. All pages are to have a header or footer identifying the name of the applicant.
- b. All pages are to be consecutively numbered.
- c. The application components are to be arranged in the same sequence as listed above.
- a. The completed applications should be signed in black ink by the authorized official of the applying organization.
- a. An **ORIGINAL** and **TWO SIGNED COPIES** are to be clearly marked as such and submitted.

MAILING

Mail the completed **Pre-Application** and **Final Application** to the IHS Area having jurisdiction for the project. Appendix 1 contains applicable mailing addresses and points of contact.:

Mark on the Pre-Application envelope:

"Attention: FY 2010 JVCP PRE-APPLICATION"

Mark on the Final Application envelope:

"Attention: FY 2010 JVCP FINAL APPLICATION"

The Pre-Application and Final Application are to be mailed to meet the established deadline dates. The deadline date for the Pre-Application is shown in the Program Announcement. The deadline date for the Final Application will be established and provided with the notice of acceptance of the Pre-Application, following the processing of the Pre-Application.

LATE APPLICATION

Each part of the application will be considered to be "on time" if it is: (1) received by the applicable IHS Area on or before the established deadline date; or, (2) sent with a legibly dated U.S. Postal Service postmark on the envelope on or before the established deadline date. Private metered mail postmark will **not** be accepted as proof of timely mailing. A late application will **not** be accepted for processing and will be returned to the applicant.

NONCONFORMING APPLICATION

An application which is determined to be nonconforming will **not** be accepted for processing and will be returned to the applicant. An application may be classified as nonconforming if it does not meet the requirements of the Program Announcement and the submission requirements provided in this Application Kit.

<u>APPLICATION REVIEW</u>

An application will be reviewed, evaluated and processed in accordance with the criteria and priorities established for each application part. The Final Application will be rated and ranked in accordance with the criteria provided in Part III of this Kit.

UNSUCCESSFUL APPLICANT

After a decision has been reached to not fund the project proposed in an application, a written notice will be sent to the unsuccessful applicant within 30 days after the decision.

INABILITY TO AWARD

If a selected Tribe elects not to proceed with the JVCP award, regardless of the reason, the award shall be offered to the next highest ranking project.

PRIVACY ACT

The Privacy Act of 1974 (5 U.S.C. § 552a), with certain exceptions, permits individuals (U.S. citizens or permanent resident aliens) to gain access to information pertaining to themselves in Federal agency records, to have a copy made of all or any part thereof, to correct or amend such records, and to permit individuals to make requests concerning what records pertaining to themselves, are collected, maintained, used or disseminated. The Act also prohibits disclosure of individuals' records without their written consent, except under certain circumstances as prescribed by the Privacy Act.

FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT

The Freedom of Information Act (5 U.S.C. § 552) allows requesters to have access to Federal agency records, except those which have been exempted by the Act.

SECTION III APPLICATION REVIEW PROCESS FY 2010 JOINT VENTURE CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

PRE-APPLICATION

The Pre-Application will be reviewed and validated for compliance with the eligibility requirements as shown in Section I and the submission requirements as shown in Section II. Using the scores recorded on all of the JVCP Phase I Data and Computation Forms, a rank order will be established for the Pre-Applications received.

FINAL APPLICATION

The Office of Environmental Health and Engineering at IHS Headquarters will establish a review panel to evaluate the Final Applications. This review panel will be chaired by a representative of the IHS Headquarters Division of Facilities Planning and Construction and have a membership consisting of one representative from the program services components of IHS Headquarters, one representative from the Division of Engineering Services, three representatives from three separate IHS Areas, and three representatives from three separate federally recognized tribes, for a total of nine.

Rating and Scoring Procedures

The four rating elements to be used to rate the Final Applications are: (1) Relative Need, (2) Ability to Fund Project, (3) Ability to Manage Project, and (4) Ability to Complete Project on Schedule. Below is the rating criteria to be followed:

1. <u>Relative Need</u>: Using the Need Score reflected in Line M of the IHS JVCP Phase I Data and Computation Form submitted with the Pre-Application, rank the projects from the highest score down. The Relative Need Score for each application becomes the basis for this Final Application Rating Factor; i.e., the applicant with the highest score for Line M will have a Rating Factor of 5. The remaining applicants will receive a Rating Factor calculated according to the following formula: [Relative Need = (Applicants score from Line M) ÷ (Score from Line M of highest ranking applicant) x 5].

The remaining three rating elements (2) Ability to Fund Project, (3) Ability to Manage Project, and (4) Ability to Complete Project on Schedule, are to be rated based on a one to five scoring system with one being the lowest score and five being the highest. Scores in this range may also be developed to one decimal place (tenths; e. g., 2.2 or 3.5, etc.) A general description of the rating elements is offered in the following table.

- 2. <u>Ability to Fund Project</u>: Evaluate the information provided for the Project Budget Estimate and Financial Plan components of the Final Application, determine the applicant's ability to fund the project, and assign a rating factor between one and five.
- 3. <u>Ability to Manage Project</u>: Evaluate the information provided in the Project Management Plan component of the Final Application, determine the applicant's ability to manage the proposed project, and assign a rating factor between one and five.
- 4. <u>Ability to Complete Project on Schedule</u>: Evaluate the information provided for the Project Management Plan and Schedule components of the Final Application, determine the applicant's ability to complete the project on schedule, and assign a rating factor between one and five.

Calculating Final Scores

After rating the proposals, the review team will apply a weight factor to each assigned rating to come up with the final ranking for this phase of the selection process, as follows:

After coming up with a weighted rating for each project, the review team members will provide the original rating sheets for each project to the team leader, who will rank the results and provide all documentation to the IHS Headquarters Division of Facilities Planning and Construction. Section III, Exhibit II, contains the format for a suggested summary ranking sheet to be prepared by the team leader.
