Administrative Decision

Plenary has received the reports of the Working Group on Monitoring (WGM), Working Group on Statistics (WGS) and the report of the review mission to Zimbabwe which took place from 30 June to 4 July 2009. Plenary has also reviewed the responses by Zimbabwe to the review mission report including the various presentations to Plenary for implementing the recommendations of the Review Mission.

Plenary welcomes the acknowledgement by Zimbabwe that certain challenges have been experienced in complying with the minimum standards of the KPCS and further welcomes Zimbabwe's stated commitment to address urgently the issues identified in the above mentioned reports. Plenary concludes that, as found by the Review Mission, there are "credible indications of significant non-compliance" by Zimbabwe with the minimum requirements of the KPCS. Plenary also welcomes Zimbabwe's willingness to receive KPCS monitoring visits to assess progress in this regard, as well as to receive follow-up review missions in terms of Section VI, Paragraphs 13-15 of the KPCS framework document and Section III, paragraph (a) of the Administrative Decision on Implementation of the Peer Review in the KPCS.

Plenary stands ready to engage with Zimbabwe to address the issues identified in the above mentioned reports of KPCS experts and, to this end, adopts the Joint Work Plan developed by Zimbabwe and the KPCS for implementing the recommendations of the above mentioned 2009 Review Mission, for the purposes of working with Zimbabwe toward full compliance with the minimum standards of the KPCS. The Joint Work Plan is to be supported by technical assistance from Participants and Observers in the KPCS. In this regard, Plenary also calls upon KPCS Participants and Observers to promote strengthened regional cooperation and outreach in support of the implementation of the Joint Work Plan.

The above mentioned Joint Work Plan is appended as an annex to this Administrative Decision.

The Intersessional and Plenary Sessions of the Kimberley Process in 2010 are to review the implementation of the Joint Work Plan. As stated in the Joint Work Plan a KP Monitor is to examine shipments of rough diamonds from the Marange area; if the KP Monitor is not able to fulfil the tasks set forth in that section of the Joint Work Plan, the KP Chair is to take appropriate action to address the situation. Shipments of rough diamonds from the Marange area require certification by the KP Monitor prior to export.

Plenary requests the WGM to monitor on an ongoing basis progress in Zimbabwe's compliance with the minimum standards of the KPCS and the implementation of the measures contained in the Joint Work Plan and to inform Participants and Observers, through the Chair, about developments in this regard.
