When we arrived at the village we immediately got to work. Vince gave a presentation on elder fall prevention and car seat safety. We also got to hike down to take a look at the camp grounds and the falls. They had just had a flood two days before we got there and the camp grounds were a mess. The falls were still so amazing to see and I am so happy that I got the opportunity to visit this tribe.

This has been the best experience of my life and everyone in this office has definitely made my summer amazing. I have learned so much from all of the surveys I have conducted (pools, stores, food establishments, juvenile detention center, and many more places) and the mosquito trapping we conducted.
