Top Issue per Recovery Auditor (National Recovery Audit Program: FY 2010– June 17th, 2011)	
	Overpayment Issues
Region A: Diversified Collection Services	<b>Renal and Urinary Tract Disorders</b> – Medicare pays for inpatient hospital services that are medically necessary for the setting billed. Medical documentation for patients with renal and urinary tract disorders needs to be complete and support all services provided. <b>(Medical Necessity)</b>
Region B: CGI, Inc.	<b>Extensive Operating Room Procedure Unrelated to Principal Diagnosis</b> – The principal diagnosis and principal procedure codes for an inpatient claim should be related. Errors occur when providers bill an incorrect principal and/or secondary diagnosis that results in an incorrect Medicare Severity Diagnosis-Related Group assignment. <b>(Incorrect Coding)</b>
Region C: Connolly, Inc.	<b>Durable Medical Equipment, Prosthetics, Orthotics, and Supplies (DMEPOS) Provided During an Inpatient Stay</b> – Medicare does not make separate payment for DMEPOS when a beneficiary is in a covered inpatient stay. Suppliers are inappropriately receiving separate DMEPOS payment when the beneficiary is in a covered inpatient stay. <b>(Billing for Bundled Services Separately)</b>
Region D: HealthDataInsights	<b>Minor Surgery and other treatment billed as Inpatient</b> –When beneficiaries with known diagnoses enter a hospital for a specific minor surgical procedure or other treatment that is expected to keep them in the hospital for less than 24 hours, they are considered outpatient for coverage purposes regardless of the hour they presented to the hospital, whether a bed was used, and whether they remained in the hospital after midnight. <b>(Medical Necessity)</b>
