## **Mountain Gorillas** GREAT APES CONSERVATION FUND

Mountain Gorillas lead a fragile existence. Confined to the transboundary area of Uganda, Rwanda, and the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) known as the Albertine Rift, Mountain Gorillas are threatened by habitat loss due to expanding human populations, illegal charcoal production, poaching and continued disturbance from civil conflict.

These remarkable primates share almost 98% of their DNA with humans, live in stable family groups, and have primarily vegetarian diets, comprised of leaves, shoots, and stems of herbaceous vegetation. Only 700 Mountain Gorillas survive today, spread among four national parks: Virunga National Park (DRC), Volcanoes National Park (Rwanda), Mgahinga Gorilla National Park and Bwindi Impenetrable National Park (Uganda). The indiscriminate killing of Mountain Gorillas in 2007 focused worldwide attention on the need to do more to protect these highly intelligent and unique apes.



The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) supports conservation efforts to protect Mountain Gorillas and other ape species across Africa via the **Great Apes Conservation Fund**.

The USFWS support emphasizes direct action in the field including: building institutional and human resource capacity, improving law enforcement, outreach to local communities, providing economic incentives for conservation, and applied research to provide scientific information for conservation and management.



Designed to respond rapidly and efficiently to high priority conservation needs, the Great Apes Conservation Fund provides direct field support to those organizations best placed to achieve results.

Of particular importance is our collaboration with the Central African Regional Program for the Environment (CARPE) of the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), through which the USFWS receives a portion of funding for the Great Apes Conservation Fund. Our conservation efforts in the Congo Basin are closely coordinated with CARPE partners' activities and governmental and NGO conservation partners. The commitment and expertise of our collaborators in Africa, are instrumental to the success of all USFWS-supported projects on the continent.


